This is a one-way hike of about 6.3 miles long with an elevation loss of 1,200 ft. The hike will go through a redwood and oak forest along the Skyline to the Sea Trail, which follows Hwy. 9. Lunch will be at the Waterman Gap Trail Camp. Please try to ride-share because we will shuttle all hikers back to the Saratoga Gap parking lot at the end of the hike. Bathrooms are available 1- 3/4 miles into the hike and at the end of the hike at the trail camp. Lunch: Bring a lunch or snack and water. Fees: None required. Caution: Wear layered clothing appropriate for the weather. Hiking boots are recommended.
