July 24, 2018 Luncheon Speaker Review

While Alan Olson, today's speaker, may not yet be a household name to most of us, he may well soon be. He's the guy who is responsible for the *Matthew Turner*, a 132 foot brigantine that was launched on April 1, 2017 and is currently floating in San Francisco Bay just out front of the Bay Model in Sausalito. Alan has so many creds that I can't list them all here, so I'll just present a few. In 1985 Alan and a group of local sailors and marine enthusiasts founded the "Call of the Sea" (COTS), a Sausalito educational non-profit organization whose "mission is to inspire youth to unleash their potential through experiential education under sail. Our vision is to empower generations of students to become environmental stewards and transform their world through sailing." In 2015, COTS merged with "Educational Tall Ship Inc. " (ETS), the organization Olson created to build the *Matthew Turner* in Sausalito. The overall idea is "to cultivate the maritime tradition of the San Francisco Bay by engaging people with their local waters." COTS also merged with The Golden Gate Tall Ship Society, another non-profit "dedicated to raising on-board scholarship funds for students and bringing awareness of tall ships to the Bay area." So you can see that Alan's efforts are primarily educational, best summarized this way: "investigate the local marine environment, connect to the Bay's rich maritime history, and inspire [area youth] to be stewards of the sea and earth." In a few months, Alan hopes, the *Matthew Turner* will be finished and ready to do its job.

I should mention that Alan's bio is as impressive as his brigantine. At the age of 22, he built his first boat and now has over 60 years of boatbuilding and sailing experience. He has worked for Greenpeace, restored many ships, and in 1992 completed a 15,000 mile voyage. Alan shared with us a lot of interesting information you might otherwise have some problems digging up. He confesses that the *Matthew Turner* is "a step back in time" even with its classic design which was based on various 19th century records, photos, paintings, and surviving blueprints. He'd been thinking about this project since 2001 or even earlier (1985), but it wasn't until 2011 that the decision was made to go ahead with it and 2016 proposed as

She is scheduled to sail to Mexico in December, and she might be OK, it's a couple years "off," but Alan and others who know, believe that she'll be totally operational by October (2018). even be out in full regalia for Fleet week. . Let's hope!

Here's some interesting stats and facts. She cost about 6.5 million to build, 4 years to build it, and over 120,000 volunteer hours. 75% of the workers were volunteers. Most of the donated funds came from Marin donors. She will be the first tall ship to set sail in Marin in more than 200 years. You may be wondering: what exactly is a "Brigantine"? Well, it's not too much of a mystery. It's a two-masted square-rigged ship that was fast and efficient, especially for cargo hauling along our coasts. From what I've read, there are actually a fair number of them left in various conditions in west coast harbors, but not too many seaworthy specimens. Many are mere tourist attractions. The *Matthew Turner* will be a working ship—and a lot more, a real asset for the Bay area. She should be able to carry 85 passengers for day trips and 39 combined crew and passengers for overnights. Best of all, perhaps, she will be the "greenest" wooden tall ship ever built. No fossil fuels will be used for its operation, just wind and electric motors when there is no wind. Only FSC certified lumber and the latest non-toxic paints were used in its construction. Icing on the cake!

Finally, a few facts about *Matthew Turner*: He was from Ohio, born in 1825. He designed and launched his first ship on Lake Erie in 1848. In 1849 he heard about the gold rush and ended up in Calaveras, California where he was quite successful. He bought cargo ships and shipped lumber along the coast and set up a shipyard at Hunter's Point. In 1883 he formed the *Matthew Turner Shipyard* in Benicia and constructed at least 154 wooden-hulled ships there. Altogether, he built at least 228 sea going vessels in a period of 37 years from 1868 to 1905, more than any other American shipbuilder. He also built sealing boats and racing yachts and designed some of the most advanced sails and hulls. Need I add that he was a charter member of the San Francisco Yacht Club? He died in 1909. Amazing man! And so, we trust, will his namesake brigantine the *Matthew Turner*, be just as amazing.

Thanks Alan for bringing the *Matthew Turner* closer to us. It will be inspiring to view it sailing around the Bay!

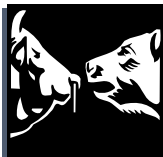
