TONY LAZZARINI. JULY 2019 SPEAKER. <u>HELICOPTER DOOR GUNNER.</u> 21 MONTHS AND 250 VIETNAM MISSIONS.

Never having served in the armed forces, I have often wondered, from the security of my Barcalounger, how I would behave in battle; would my attention be consumed by fear and futile attempts to hide from the painful mortal blow? How would I handle the stress of continuous 'fight or flight' reaction? With such questions I looked forward to hearing from our Sir, Tony Lazzarini, author, playwright, business man, racer of automobiles, and founder of the "51-50 Club" (in Novato for automobile enthusiasts)

Over 21 months he flew 250 Vietnam "door gunner" missions seated at the open door of a helicopter, shooting up to 500 bullets a minute into jungle holding an enemy responding in kind. Sometimes the mission involved landing under fire to deliver troops, or rescue those wounded or overrun. Other times acting as a decoy for the Viet Cong to shoot at and thereby reveal their positions for ambush. His talk and his 2003 book, "Hidden Traditions, Memories of War" did not lack for facts and shared raw experience.

After high school Tony joined the Army for three years hoping to learn skills useful in civilian life. He was assigned helicopter mechanic training, but this was fast tracked to assign him to Vietnam as helicopter crew. His duties included maintaining his machine gun and helicopter; sometimes he had to wash blood of the injured off the floor of the Huey. This is how he spent his 20th and 21st birthdays in "66 and '67. He was lucky; it is said, out of 2,594,000 US troops who rotated through Vietnam over 7 years, 58,000 US men died, (61% were 21 or younger), 300,000 were injured and 75,000 were severely disabled. About 12,000 helicopters served in Vietnam, 5,086 were destroyed, 2,165 helicopter pilots died as did 2,712 crew.

The crews were tightly bonded, closer than siblings, some with friendships that have survived the years. They drank a lot of beer and could (did) raise hell; they had a special and deserved reputation for crazy. (continued)

Supporting each other and their ground troops was their heartfelt mission. It was a positive goal in the negativity of war. And in the moment of action, they had little time to feel fear as they focused on this mission, on doing the job. They burned more brightly in the adrenaline high they found addictive.

So much so that when Tony's year was up, he enlisted for two more tours of six months each. He had found on his 30 day R&R in SF that he had little in common with civilian life and missed his companions. How could could ordinary folks understand the depersonalization, the cynicism, and the chaos of war? He knew where he was needed and where he could be with like minds. Maybe with a close family tie such as a wife, his decisions could have been different.

On discharge from his 3 year enlistment, Tony had wild years overcoming PTSD and horrendous nightmares. He now strives with veterans to ensure the sacrifices and lessons of Vietnam are not forgotten. The passage of 50 plus years allows some historical objectivity for our culture and participants. More healing is needed.

On page 148 of his book he muses positively:

"I had gone into combat and knew how I would react under fire. I was not a hero, but not a coward either. There would never be any doubt in my mind how I would react in a life and death situation. It gave me a tremendous amount of faith in myself. I know that whatever tragedy or catastrophe may strike I can save my family and friends."

I am not sure I can say that about myself with such conviction. But then again, I have not paid my dues.
