LARRY and BILLIE DOUGLAS

"A story of two converging paths of life"

Isn't it amazing, once you match a face with a name you realize who they are? Larry and Billie have been around for years but only their inner circle of friends really know them. That's why we like to profile our members so we know them more intimately.

Their story actually begins in Wasco where each was born and raised through high school as neighbors but not real friends. Larry played sports, loved baseball, and tinkered with electronics like radios which were complicated to many in those early

years. His Dad was head custodian and constable at Wasco Union High School. A constable represented the police department so everyone stayed 'in-line'! On top of that Larry's Mother was a teacher at Wasco Elementary school. Needless to say Larry stayed out of trouble, at least that what he tells us.

Larry remembers working in the fields picking cotton and potatoes for 25c a bag. He also worked at the local grocery store stocking shelves, cleaning the store at night, and working as a 'box-boy', and even check-out cashier. Although these jobs didn't pay a lot they provided Larry the necessary funds for his first car, a model A with a Ford V-8 engine! Now that sounds fun to me!

Graduating in 1958 both went their separate ways. Billie got married and started her family. At age 29 she completed her education at Bakersfield College and was employed for 36 years by the Bakersfield School district.

Larry went to Bakersfield College to pursue a degree in electronic engineering. He continued his major at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. After one year he decided it best to get his military requirements completed so he enlisted into the Air Force in 1961 at the age of 21. He was assigned to the Air Force's Radar Technician School at Keesler AFB in Biloxi, Ms., where he spent 10 months studying radar detection. Then off to an isolated site in Alaska where Larry found himself on top of a tall mountain at an isolated radar detection facility. The only way up or down was by the longest open-air cable platform in North America! They would spend 2 - 3 weeks there and then allowed to go down to the main base at the bottom of the mountain where they could get a shower, fresh clothes, and sundries. Then back to the top. Water, food, medicine, mail and supplies were carried up by cable as needed. I asked Larry what he actually did up there but he says he can't talk about it.

After Larry was discharged he got a job with Pac Bell Telephone in Oakland as a "Long Line Tech" assigned to C-1 Bay where they processed all Delta Water emergency calls 24/7. He received his FCC First Class License with a Radar Endorsement which was his ticket to work anywhere he wished with regards to electronics and support systems.

Larry began his electronics career in the Bay area while pursuing his college education, graduating in 1973 with a Bachelor of Science degree from San Jose State University.

In his career Larry worked for several companies that were technological leaders in the electronic industry. For example, ATI manufactured electronic countermeasure systems and Larry worked in a number of phases such as test and evaluation, writing proposals to the Air Force and Navy, and Field Engineer support for fight test programs.

Larry worked for Plantronics which manufactured miniature head sets and he was the manager of service and support for four years. He also worked for Cooper Medical which manufactured medical electronic equipment such as heart monitors and brain surgery monitoring systems. He also worked for ICT, Integrated Circuit Technology, where once again Larry was the service support manager both in the office and in the field.

Larry admits he was a 'Frustrated field engineer working as a service support manager' most of his career. He said he enjoys solving complex problems and delivering solutions to clients.

Married in 1967 to his wife Marian they lived in the Bay area for 44 years until Larry retired. They moved to Lacey, Washington (outside of Olympia) in 2011. Unfortunately, Marian passed away in 2012 leaving Larry alone in their new home.

As fortune would have it Larry came down to Wasco to celebrate the 100th Centennial of Wasco High School. At this reunion he met Billie and a friend who gave him a seat at their table for lunch. At this time Billie had been widowed for several years. They palled around in all the events and Larry invited Billie and some of his former classmates to come up and see what 'God's Country' really looks like.

Billie said something in her mind kept telling her to take Larry up on his offer which she did and which started their courtship. After several trips back and forth and much talking, deliberation, and compromising, plus knowing neither could afford this commuting between Bakersfield and Lacey for courting purposes they reached the same conclusion: get married! So they did and have been married happily for ten years. Together they have 5 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

They enjoy their lives, their family times, and friendships in Brighton Parks. Both concur that God brought them together and He Blessed them not to live single lives.

We thank you both, Larry and Billie, for your courage and determination in allowing God to bring your paths together in your seventies. You are a shining example of 'stepping out in faith'.
