


FROM THE OFFICE OF BRANCH 163 BIG SIR

GOOD DAY from RON SCHILLING

Ron Schilling has been a dedicated SIR's member since October 2006 and has been serving as Branch 163 Treasurer where he maintains the accounting for branch assets especially our money. Ron collects and deposits our revenues, remits payments for expenses, keeps Hodel's paid and happy, and sends reports to the State Sir office.

We thank you for your diligence in meeting the needs of this important position.

Although Ron does not look his age he turned 90 on February 14 this year! Keep it up Ron.

He was born in Moline, Illinois in 1935 and lived in the East Moline district. His dad worked for John Deere Company in parts manufacturing and assembly. Though he did not much like his job, it paid well during the depression and the family lived as comfortably as possible and always had food on the table which many others did not.

Ron remembers his folks had an adjacent lot which they turned into a productive garden growing, berries, asparagus, corn, potatoes, beans, onions, carrots: just about everything one could get seeds for were planted. He said his Uncle helped tend the garden so it must have provided for several families. They canned a good portion of the produce and kept it in the cellar.

Ron also recalls they heated the house in the winter with a coal furnace in the basement. There was an outside chute that was used to dump coal down into a room in the basement. It was messy and always needed stoking. After WW II his dad bought a 'Stoker' Furnace that burned 'pea' coal. It was self-feeding and was cleaner burning plus easier to maintain.

Ron recalls his folks talking about how people made snide comments about his Dad not going into the war effort but he was classified as 'Vital—Industry' so he stayed with the factory. Deere had converted a lot of their production facilities into manufacturing of military equipment through the war years.

After the war Ron's Dad went into partnership with the local Deere dealer at Monmouth, Illinois but it didn't work out. His family were Pentacostal and attended church regularly. Ron can remember sleeping underneath one of the pews when the services ran too long! But since he had ended his employment at the dealership, his folks joined the California Evangelistic Association and they packed everything they had into a trailer and headed to Seal Beach where Ron attended 6th grade. The next year they moved and Ron attended Lindburg Junior High School in North Long Beach.

Then his Dad received an invitation to pastor a small church in Monitor Oregon so they moved up there where Ron attended 8th grade in a two room school house: 1st thru 4th in one room and 5th thru 8th in the next room. There were only five in his eighth grade class! But Ron had settled in, was playing football, and had met a girl friend; can't do much better than that right?

In his 9th grade year the family moved to Bakersfield where Ron's dad pastored the Rosedale Community Church. Ron was thrust into the big time attending Bakersfield High School with an enrollment of 2000 students! Ron was a good athlete and got to play his favorite sport football. In his senior year Ron played left tackle for Varsity, 'Go Drillers'!

While going to BHS, Ron got a part-time job at the "Q-NE-Q" drive-in root beer stand at 26th and Chester. This was his first real job in Bakersfield and Ron worked hard at it. By summer the owners made him 'Straw Boss' which meant he was a worker and a manager. About the same time Ron took a liking to "YOUNG LADIES"! And because he worked late in the evening he had chances to date girls without having to explain why he got home so late some nites!

He graduated BHS in 1953 and enrolled at Bakersfield College where he wanted to play for the JV team but because of class conflicts Ron had to sit out the year and never was able to rejoin the football team.

After two years at BC, Ron dropped out of school, got married In 1955, and started his work career. Like all new families Ron worked long hours, fathered three children, and his first big job was delivering milk door to door for the Teakwood Dairy which was a prominent dairy at that time. It later sold to Peacock Dairy which sold later to Meadow Gold. In the '50s and '60s dairy and cattle were good industries to find employment and so it was for Ron.

In 1961 Ron left Peacock and went to Porterville as an independent distributor of Carnation products. During a four year partnership and by 1965, door to door deliveries had nearly vanquished and became unprofitable. That same year Ron came back to Bakersfield and got a job with Carnation Company as a delivery driver to commercial accounts. This is when he met our member Sir Ron Huntington who was the new office manager. Ron retired from Carnation in 2002 but he kept his class A license and had other delivery jobs for a while.

When Ron was delivering product to Nelda's Diner in Lake Isabella, he met a woman named Kathy Hood and through what Ron says were God's miracles they both found each to be a perfect match and they married in December 1986.

During his years in Bakersfield Ron belonged to the Bakersfield Barbershop Quartet Society for which he was a member for 60 years. They sang locally in and around Kern County and It was their Director Don Newberry who invited Ron to a Sir Luncheon one Thursday. Don couldn't drive any longer and asked Ron to take him home which became a routine and Ron became kind of a 'nurse maid' for Don. During this time Dick Weigelt, Nominating Committee, kept pestering Ron to be an officer but Ron didn't want to be. So when the position of Treasurer came up Ron volunteered with one condition; Dick would 'stop bugging' him about being Little Sir!

Ron's favorite memories include 38 years of marriage to Kathy, helping his kids grow up, taking them to ball practice, vacation travels, and teaching

them good work ethics. He still enjoys watching their families grow and have families of their own. Ron says God has blessed him many times over.
