Fun Facts submitted by Eric Measles

During WWII U.S. airplanes were armed with belts of bullets which they would shoot during dogfights and on strafing runs. These belts were folded into the wing compartments that fed their machine guns. These belts measure 27 feet and contain hundreds of rounds of bullets. Often times, the pilots would return from their missions having expended all of their bullets on various targets. They would say, "I gave them the whole nine yards", meaning they used up all of their ammunition.

Common entertainment included playing cards. However, there was a tax levied when purchasing playing cards but only applicable to the Ace of Spades. To avoid paying the tax, people would purchase 51 cards instead. Yet, since most games require 52 cards, these people were thought to be stupid or dumb because they weren't "playing with a full deck."

One more: bet you didn't know this! In the heyday of sailing ships, all war ships and many freighters carried iron cannons. Those cannons fired round iron cannon balls. It was necessary to keep a good supply near the cannon. However, how to prevent them from rolling about the deck? The best storage method devised was a square-based pyramid with one ball on top, resting on four resting on nine, which rested on sixteen. Thus, a supply of 30 cannon balls could be stacked in a small area right next to the cannon. There was only one problem...how to prevent the bottom layer from sliding or rolling from under the others. The solution was a metal plate called a 'Monkey' with 16 round indentations. However, if this plate were made of iron, the iron balls would quickly rust to it. The solution to the rusting problem was to make "Brass Monkeys". Few landlubbers realize that brass contracts much more and much faster than iron when chilled. Consequently, when the temperature dropped too far, the brass indentations would shrink so much that the iron cannonballs would come right off the monkey; thus, it was quite literally, "Cold enough to freeze the balls off a brass monkey." NASCAR/INDY CAR Report by Barrie Lee



August 26th held the last regular season race for the cup series. A friend of mine asked me about the race on Friday night. Yes, there was a Nascar race on the 25th but it was the XFinity series race. There are three main race series in Nascar. The Craftsman Truck series, the XFinity Series and the cup series. The Cup Series is the Big Event in Nascar. The other two series are teaching experiences for future cup drivers. One or both of the other series are normally run on the day before the Cup at the same venue. This gives the fans added value for their ticket purchases and has proven to be a good product for Nascar. The Cup cars ran at Daytona Saturday night and it was action packed. Toyota has been leading most of the races recently but Ford seems to own the Super Speedways like Daytona. I picked one of my favorite drivers to win the race but thanks to Christian Bell and Ty Gibbs (both JGR drivers) my driver was taken out on the last lap of the second stage. I'm referring to Ryan Blaney (#12) driving for Team Penske. He was leading and stood the best chance

Eric Jones of the Legacy Motor Club spun Ryan Preece and his teammate Chase Briscoe off the race track and out of the race. Preece's car flew through the air and barrel rolled more times than I could count. He was taken to the infield care facility and then taken to a local trauma center, then released the following morning to return home. It was a very good race.

Chip Ganassi driver Scott Dixon won with fantastic pit strategy and fuel mileage savings to win with three stops compared to four or more. He finished 22 seconds ahead of second place finisher Pato O'Ward in his Arrow McLaren #5 with Chevy power. David Malukas in his #18 car, driving for Dale Coyne Racing with HMD Motorsports, finished in third place. This team has been racing for years but doesn't have the budget of the bigger teams. Portland is next week and it's followed by Laguna Seca in Monterey, which wraps the 2023 season.

It was a fun event which saw Alex Palou win the race with great strategy and also capture the Indy Championship all in the same day's race. His teammate, Scott Dixon finished third to finish second in the championship, both driving for Chip Ganassi Racing. Felix Rosenqvist came in second for the Arrow McLaren team and his teammate, Pato O'Ward finished fourth, and Josef Newgarden was fifth for Team Penske. It was an interesting experience.

Darlington, SC. was the sight of the Nascar race this weekend, and I felt it was too long and troublesome. Lighting at the historic track was a problem and Nascar spent way too much time dealing with the problem in the turn two area. Many laps under yellow, followed by a red flag stoppage to fix the problem. I lost interest in the outcome as I was eating dinner but did see the end where Tyler Reddick was chasing Kyle Larson for what seemed like forever to finish second to Kyles #5 Chevy for RHM. Chris Buescher was a close third to Reddick and proved what Brad Kesolowski did for Jack Rousch/Fenway Motorsports by becoming a part owner just a year and a half ago. The team, now known as RFK Racing, has improved immensely with Chris winning three times this year and Brad finishing consistently in the top ten. Toyotas did really well early, but many failed to finish well in the end. Kyle Larson will move on to the round of twelve with his win today.

I cover Nascar and IndyCar for the membership, but I encourage all our members to try other events also. This series is just like IMSA with several classes of racing cars and is the controlling body for LeMans and Sebring. They're racing at the Fuji race circuit in Japan today, and #6 Porsche Penske has led the race from the
