Lodi Mayor - District 3 Term: November 2022 - December 2026 Born and raised in Lodi, California, Cameron Bregman is the son of a teacher and a financial advisor. He is actively involved in civic and business groups in Lodi and the surrounding areas. Mayor Bregman has served as President of the Lodi Rotary Club and as Noble Grand

of a local IOOF lodge. He attended Delta College and established his first business, Bregman Services Inc., a small landscaping company, in 2019 at the age of 18.

Grandson of Peter Bregman, a Dutch immigrant, Mayor Bregman now continues the family tradition by working in retirement and insurance services as the third generation to do so. He currently holds the title of the youngest elected official in Lodi's history, youngest Mayor in the history of Lodi, and youngest Mayor in the history of San Joaquin County.

Originally campaigning on three key issues—decreasing homelessness, tackling crime, and making Lodi more affordable—Mayor Bregman takes pride in his commitment to community engagement, public involvement, and education. Additionally, Mayor Bregman serves as the Northern California Power Agency (NCPA) Alternate Commissioner for the City of Lodi Electric Utility.

Checking-Out What's "Under the Hood"

Thoughts & Feelings of ~80-Year-Old Men

The University of Southern California (USC) Leonard Davis School of Gerontology is the largest gerontology program in the U.S. and a global leader in gerontology education, research, and policy.

From a broad survey of the gerontology literature over the last 20 years, USC gerontologists assembled a list of important issues that previous research had identified as important to men around age 80. The final list, shown below, included issues of concern for men between ages 78 and 81.

Using these issues, researchers surveyed more than 16,000 men between ages 77 and 84 across all 50 U.S. states to understand what is important to them. The percentage of men in the survey from each state was roughly the same as that state's percentage of the U.S. population.

The participants reviewed the list of issues and selected those of concern to them personally. Next, they distributed 100 points among the issues they chose. The data for all the respondents were combined to generate the cumulative percentage of concern for these issues. Here are the results:

- 14% Physical health and sustaining it
- 11% Social isolation and loneliness
- 9% Financial security for a lifetime
- 9% Mental stimulation and maintaining cognitive function
- 8% Physical independence and mobility
- 7% Maintaining a sense of dignity and autonomy
- 7% Sense of purpose or meaning in life
- 6% Managing personal safety and risk of injury
- 6% Managing changes in living conditions and environment
- 5% Maintaining a sense of control and engagement in life
- 4% Navigating and adapting to changes in roles and identity
- 3% Concern for future generations

The top 5 issues consumed 51% of the total interest, and the next 7 issues expended an additional 38% of the total concern — together the top 12 issues in the left hand column absorbed 89% of the total thoughts and feelings of the ~80 year-old men who were surveyed.

These data answer an important question. Are

~80-year-old men focusing on the most important issues? Several large validated

- 3% Intergenerational communication and relationships
- 2% Personal identity and self-perception
- 2% Leisure and recreational engagement
- 1% Adaptation to aging-related changes in appearance
- 1% Digital literacy and access to, and quality of, technology
- <1% Identity and self-expression
- <1% Spirituality and inner fulfillment
- <1% Community involvement or contribution
- <1% Creativity and cognitive engagement
- <1% Connection to nature and the outdoors
- <1% Legacy and the passing down of knowledge or personal stories

(peer reviewed) research studies have repeatedly shown that older adults can ensure the best possible quality of life by maintaining physical health, mental sharpness, social connections, and emotional well-being.

The data is clear. In the population as a whole, ~80-year-old men are focusing most of their attention on the issues that make the greatest difference in the quality of their lives.
