

#### **TIMOTHY COX BIOGRAPHY**



Tim was born in Dameron Hospital in 1947 and raised mostly in the Patterson area. He graduated from Modesto Junior College with an AA degree in 1967 and then transferred to Fresno State College where he earned a BA degree in news editorial journalism in 1970. He completed an MA degree in Mass Communications in 1971 and continued his education at the University of the Pacific where he earned an EDD degree in higher education in 1987.

His first job out of college took him to the Merced Sun Star newspaper where he was hired as a general reporter and editor of the newspaper's education section. In 1973, he changed careers when he was hired as the public information officer at Monterey Peninsula College. In 1978 he worked for a short time at a community college advocacy association in Sacramento managing news media relations, marketing campaigns, and state conferences. He was selected for the public information officer position at San Joaquin Delta College in Stockton in 1979.

His role at Delta College was expanded to include the management of the college's community use of facilities, as well as managing the Performing Arts Center complex, the Clever Planetarium, and the print shop/duplicating center. He was active in numerous community organizations including the Stockton Arts Commission, the Stockton Symphony, the Stockton Choral Association, the Stockton Opera Association, the United Way of San Joaquin, the Chamber of Commerce and the Stockton Advertising and Media Club and the Business Leadership Summit.

That motivated Tim's course of life: As a youngster his interest in antique cars began as he saw old cars parked along his early morning paper route when his parents were living in the San Diego area.

When his father died in 1962, the family moved back to Patterson to be with relatives. In 1967, at the age of 18, he had enough money to buy on old 1931 Buick Convertible Coupe and began, what would be a restoration that would span 50 years. What parts he could not find at swap meets or through club members, he started to make to get the Buick back on the road. Along the way, he took machine shop courses to learn manufacturing processes.

The biggest challenge came about 1976 when the Buick was almost finished (mechanically) except for the replacement of the disintegrating tar paper firewall insulator panel, a part that every vehicle has, to keep engine nose and heat from entering the passenger cabin. With time, and a lot of experimenting with new materials, he was able to make a new panel for the Buick. After showing it to some Buck friends he started getting requests to make firewall panels for other Buicks as well as other cars and trucks. Through word of mouth and a little advertising, old, deteriorated firewall insulator panels started arriving from coast to coast to be remanufactured. The demand outgrew the two-car garage, and he soon found warehouse space in South Stockton.

Tim met his soon to be wife, Jackie, in 1986 at Delta College. They were married in 1988 and she immediately became an integral part of the hobby-turned-business, managing the finances and HR activities and keeping the focus on "family activities." Together, they have four children and now have eleven grandchildren and one great grandchild.

With the help of family and some dedicated employees, the company, QuietRide Solutions, was officially formed just after his retirement from the college in 2000. Over the next twenty years, the business expanded its product offerings from firewall insulators to include other insulation products for antique, classic and newer cars, and trucks 1928 through 2015. The company developed about 10,000 vehicle specific products over the course of the years. Cox sold the business in 2021. The company remains the leader in aftermarket automotive insulation products. That old Buick found a new home in an automotive history museum in the Netherlands.

#### **Autobiography of Steve Costa**

Steve was born in Berkeley, Ca. but his parents moved to Lodi when he was 13.

Steve attended Tokay High, where he lettered in both baseball and basketball, and graduated in 1975.

He achieved an Associate's degree from Delta College with a Major in Natural Sciences, and a minor in agricultural science. Steve worked for Brea Agriculture in Stockton for 10 yrs.

He was picked up by the Clorox Company and spent 30 years with Clorox working in their many divisions (of which there are 65). Steven retired as a Senior Scientist. He was only one of 2 hires, without a prior Master's Degree, to achieve that positon out of 2000 scientists. Most all his training was internal with Clorox. His job required extensive travel all over the world. He most often would leave from the Sacramento airport on Monday and be gone all week. He acquired 3 patents while with Clorox, which, of course, he turned over to Clorox upon retirement. Steve retired in 2017 at age 60.

After retirement Steve served on the Board of Directors of Pixie Woods, for 6 years, which turned into an almost full time position. Steve also was a volunteer with Hospice of San Joaquin.

Steve has 3 adult sons from a previous marriage and is getting married again, to the love of his life, Judy, in March. Steve did a romantic proposal to Judy, last summer in Budapest, Hungary.
