BIG SIR COMMENTS

Dear Fellow Members of Branch #20,

As we approach our Independence Day, it is remarkable how many historically significant events have occurred during the month of July. Most notably, our Declaration of Independence being signed on July 4, 1776. Beyond that, the agreement ending the Korean War was signed on July 26, 1953, and Hong Kong returned to Chinese sovereignty in July of 1997 after 150 years of British rule.

The first Moon Landing occurred on July 20, 1969, and Neil Armstrong was the first to walk on the lunar surface. Abraham Lincoln signed the first income tax bill and Congress established the Bureau of Internal Revenue on July 1, 1862. Income tax rates at that time were 3% for those earning \$600 to \$10,000., and 5% for those earning over \$10,000.

Louis Pasteur successfully tested the rabies vaccine in humans on July 6, 1885, and the iconic "Hollywood" sign was constructed in July of 1923 in the hills above Los Angeles. I wonder if it would be possible to get a building permit for that today.

Those born in July include song writer Stephen Foster, born July 4, 1826, in Lawrenceville, PA. He wrote 200 songs including Oh Susanna, Swanee River, Jeanie with the Light Brown Hair, and Beautiful Dreamer.

P.T. Barnum, born in Bethel, CT on July 5, 1810, opened "The Greatest Show On Earth" in 1871. Ernest Hemingway was born July 21, 1899, in Oak Park, Illinois. He authored "The Sun Also Rises" in 1926, "A Farewell to Arms" in 1929, "For Whom the Bell Tolls" in 1940, "The Old Man and the Sea" in 1952, and was awarded the Nobel Prize in 1954.

Born in Qunu, South Africa on July 18, 1918, Nelson Mandela was convicted in 1964 for sabotage against Apartheid, spent 28 years in jail, and was ultimately elected President of South Africa in 1994.

As we enjoy the remainder of our Summer, let us take heed of the historical events taking place right now. As an immigrant from The Netherlands myself, I never take for granted the freedoms and strength of the United States of America. Let us truly appreciate them.

JULY: DIGNITY AT THE END OF LIFE

Program: Kaysi Contreras

Location: Elks Club, 150 Jewell Street, Santa Cruz

Kaysi Contreras is an End-of-Life Doula and Educator, supporting people and their families in order to die with dignity. She works collaboratively with Palliative and Hospice teams to support not only the dying, but their loved ones. She was a case manager and primary caregiver for five years for a dementia/ Alzheimers client who inspired her passion for educating others in preparation for this disease specifically. Kaysi is actively involved with A Better Exit's mission to broaden California's End of Life Option Act so individuals struggling with irremediable suffering have the right to a peaceful death with Medical Aid in Dying. The dying process is unique to every individual, and their autonomy for what is important to them, their values, and faith can too easily be overlooked when illness is sudden, hard conversations are only happening under duress, and preparation has not been prioritized. The rain is gone, we look forward to a great summer. This year we have 12 different courses we play on. We had a note worthy



OR


Thursdays Afternoon Game We would play from 1:00pm to 4:00pm
