BIG SIR JEFF USTICK SEZ:

Each month it seems there is some significant holiday or celebration. Obviously, July has the 4th and November Thanksgiving. This month we celebrate Labor Day. For many, Labor Day provides an opportunity to gather for a picnic with friends and family. This celebration seems to mark the end of the summer season, and in years past, the



time for youngsters to return to school. I believe we seldom reflect on the significance and background of Labor Day.

The Labor Day holiday grew out of the late 19th century organized labor movement, and it quickly became a national holiday as the labor movement assumed a prominent role in American society. In September 1882, the unions of New York City decided to have a parade to celebrate their members being in unions, and to show support for all unions. At least 20,000 people were there, and the workers had to give up a day's pay to attend. (There was also a lot of beer involved in the event).

Labor Day, began as a local and state celebration that became a national holiday in 1892 when President Grover Cleveland designated the first Monday in September as the official day of celebration. During this era, the plight of workers and the challenges of work conditions were key social issues that often pitted the workers
