SIR, Inc.* State of the STATE and Other Branches April 2023

STATE NEWS: 2023 brings significant change to the SIR organizational structure. First off, the Region Director position will be discontinued. Secondly the title Area Governor will be replaced by Area Representative with major changes in the job description. Without a Region Director and with Area 8s continuing Area Governor vacancy there are concerns about the communication link between the Area 8 branches and those at the state level in SIR. It has been recommended that the branches in Area 8 elect an Area Representative ASAP. The new Area Representative reports to the Vice President of SIR. Please note it puts the new position in a less controversial position than the old A.G. requirements. There are no compliance issues to be dealt with, all overdue reports and documents required in our incorporation business will be done by another.

So far Group 8 (that is us) is the only Group to not yet elected such a representative and there is no news of a plan to do so!



"A Death in Tuscany" by Michele Giuttari 2005 Crime/Thriller genre

Michele Ferrara, Chief Inspector of the Florence crime squad, is called into the case of a




near dead adolescent female found by a country road, who later dies in the hospital of a drug overdose. Ferrara is not convinced that she is an addict, and he is led to believe she was murdered, but has difficulty convincing his superior.

This complicated mystery includes suspects at all levels of society: The Mafia, the Masons, doctors and miscellaneous others. A second seemingly unconnected story is the murder, in Piersanti, of a prominent business man, and the Carabinieri suspect his wife and her lover, who happens to be Ferrara's lifelong friend. He and the deceased's wife have disappeared. The story takes place on the Italian Riviera coast, the surrounds of Carrera, and in Florence.

Giuttari is stated to be the most popular crime novelist in Italy, a former policeman himself, and he has written many Inspector Ferrara novels later than this copyright date. This is great reading for thriller lovers, with the bonus location in Tuscany.

"April in Spain", by John Banville, 2021; Crime/Thriller genre

One April in the early seventies, the Quirks, an elderly Dublin couple, decide to vacation



in San Sebastian, Donostia, the idyllic Basque country of Spain. While there Quirk hears a Dublin accent, and believes he recognizes a young woman doctor who is supposed to be dead. His intuitive curiosity, honed as a former pathologist, cannot let it rest. Earlier chapters reveal a killerfor-hire in London, and introduction to the police, politicians and bureaucrats in Dublin, many of questionable character. There is a dark back story in Dublin that slowly comes to light.

The Irish author has written many novels, including earlier novels with Quirk, and he is the recipient of many awards. His writing is in the finest Irish tradition, amongst the best in the genre. Mystery lovers are bound to enjoy this story, suspenseful, and placed in a lovely corner of Spain as well as in Dublin.





IRS announces tax relief for victims of severe winter storms, flooding, and mudslides in California

Updated 2/23/23: This news release has been updated to change the filing and payment deadlines from May 15, 2023 to Oct. 16, 2023.

Updated 1/11/23: This news release has been updated to include Alameda, Contra Costa, Fresno, Kings, Lake, Madera, Mono, San Benito, San Francisco, and Tulare counties.

CA-2023-01, Jan. 10, 2023

WASHINGTON — Victims of severe winter storms, flooding, and mudslides in California beginning Jan. 8, 2023, now have until Oct. 16, 2023, to file various individual and business tax returns and make tax payments, the Internal Revenue Service announced today.

Following the disaster declaration issued by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, individuals and households affected by severe winter storms, flooding, and mudslides that reside or have a business in Alameda, Colusa, Contra Costa, El Dorado, Fresno, Glenn, Humboldt, Kings, Lake, Los Angeles, Madera, Marin, Mariposa, Mendocino, Merced, Mono, Monterey, Napa, Orange, Placer, Riverside, Sacramento, San Benito, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Solano, Sonoma, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tehama, Tulare, Ventura, Yolo, and Yuba counties qualify for tax relief.

The declaration permits the IRS to postpone certain tax-filing and tax-payment deadlines for taxpayers who reside or have a business in the disaster area. For instance, certain deadlines falling on or after Jan. 8, 2023, and before Oct. 16, 2023, are granted additional time to file through Oct. 16, 2023. As a result, affected individuals and businesses will have until Oct. 16 to file returns and pay any taxes that were originally due during this period. This includes 2022 individual income tax returns due on April 18, as well as various 2022 business returns normally due on March 15 and April 18. Among other things, this means that eligible taxpayers will have until Oct. 16 to make 2022 contributions to their IRAs and health savings accounts.

In addition, farmers who choose to forgo making estimated tax payments and normally file their returns by March 1 will now have until Oct. 16, 2023 to file their 2022 return and pay any tax due. The Oct. 16, 2023, deadline also applies to the quarterly estimated tax payments, normally due on Jan. 17, 2023 and April 18, 2023. This means that individual taxpayers can skip making the fourth quarter estimated tax payment, normally due Jan. 17, 2023, and instead include it with the 2022 return they file, on or before Oct. 16.

Unless an act is specifically listed in Rev. Proc. 2018-58, the postponement of time to file and pay does not apply to information returns in the W-2, 1094, 1095, 1097, 1098 or 1099 series; to Forms 1042-S, 3921, 3922 or 8027; or to employment and excise tax deposits. However, penalties on deposits due on or after Jan. 8, 2023, and before Jan. 23, 2023, will be abated as long as the tax deposits were made by Jan. 23, 2023.

Casualty Losses

Affected taxpayers in a federally declared disaster area have the option of claiming disaster-related casualty losses on their federal income tax return for either the year in which the event occurred, or the prior year. See Publication 547 for details. Individuals may deduct personal property losses that are not covered by insurance or other reimbursements. For details, see Form 4684, Casualties and Thefts property and its instructions property. Affected taxpayers claiming the disaster loss on their return should put the Disaster Designation, "California, severe winter storms, flooding, and mudslides", in bold letters at the top of the form. Be sure to include the FEMA disaster declaration number, FEMA-3591-EM, on any return. See Publication 547 for details.

Other Relief

The IRS will waive the usual fees and requests for copies of previously filed tax returns for affected taxpayers. Taxpayers should put the assigned Disaster Designation, "California, severe winter storms, flooding, and mudslides", in bold letters at the top of Form 4506, Request for Copy of Tax Return per form 4506-T, Request for Transcript of Tax Return, as appropriate per final submit it to the IRS.

Affected taxpayers who are contacted by the IRS on a collection or examination matter should explain how the disaster impacts them so that the IRS can provide appropriate consideration to their case. Taxpayers may download forms and publications from the official IRS website, IRS.gov.

More Time to File State Taxes for Californians Impacted by December and January Winter

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW: California is extending the tax filling deadline for Californians impacted by December and January winter storms to October 16, 2023 – aligning with the IRS

SACRAMENTO – In addition to tax relief measures that Governor Gavin Newsom announced in January, California is also extending the state tax filing and payment due dates to October 16, 2023 for Californians impacted by the winter storms in December and January. This aligns California with the Biden Administration, which announced that the IRS extended various due dates until October 16, as well.

To c "As communities across the state continue recovering from the damage caused by the winter at till storms, California is working swiftly to help recovering Californians get back on their feet," said Governor Newsom. "The state is aligning with the Biden Administration and extending the tax set filing deadline in addition to the tax relief announced earlier this year."

Last month, Governor Newsom <u>announced</u> tax relief for those impacted by winter storms, giving people the ability to claim a deduction for disaster loss and extending certain filing deadlines.

The following counties are eligible for this extended tax relief, per the IRS announcements here and here:

Residents and businesses in Alameda, Alpine, Amador, Butte, Calaveras, Colusa, Contra Costa, Del Norte, El Dorado, Fresno, Glenn, Humboldt, Inyo, Kings, Lake, Los Angeles, Madera, Marin, Mariposa, Mendocino, Merced, Mono, Monterey, Napa, Nevada, Orange, Placer, Riverside, Sacramento, San Benito, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Sisklyou, Solano, Sonoma, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tehama, Trinity, Tulare, Tuolumne, Ventura, Yolo, and Yuba counties who have been affected by severe winter storms, flooding, landslides, and mudslides are eligible for tax relief.

TAX EXTENSION

To help alleviate some of the hardship many have endured during this trying period, the FTB has extended the filling and payment deadlines for individuals and businesses in California until October 16, 2023.

This relief applies to deadlines falling on or after January 8, 2023, and before October 16, 2023, including the 2022 individual income tax returns due on April 18 and the quarterly estimated tax payments, typically due on January 17, 2023 and April 18, 2023. Those payments were previously extended to May 15, 2023 for those impacted by winter storms.

The IRS announced tax relief for Californians affected by these winter storms. Taxpayers affected by these storms qualify for an extension to October 16, 2023 to file individual and business tax returns and make certain tax payments. This includes:

- Individuals whose tax returns and payments are due on April 18, 2023.
- Quarterly estimated tax payments due January 17, 2023, April 18, 2023, June 15, 2023, and September 15, 2023.
- Business entitles whose tax returns are normally due on March 15 and April 18.
- PTE Elective Tax payments due on June 15, 2023.

Taxpayers affected by a presidentially declared disaster may claim a deduction for a disaster loss. Taxpayers may claim a disaster loss when filing either an original or amended tax year 2022 tax return.

When filing their return, taxpayers should write the name of the disaster in blue or black ink at the top of their tax return to alert FTB. If filing electronically, taxpayers should follow the software instructions to enter disaster information. If a taxpayer receives a late filing or payment penalty notice related to the postponement period, they should call the number on the notice to have the penalty abated.

Disaster victims can receive free copies of their state returns to replace those lost or damaged. To do so, they should use <u>form FTB 3516</u> and write the name of the disaster in blue or black ink at the top of the request.
