FEBRUARY SPEAKER

DAVIS PERKINS -Artist, Smoke Jumper, and Aid to the World's Needy



Davis Perkins is a California painter who lives in San Rafael, with an unusual background.

He has had a long career as a smokejumper, firefighter, paramedic, and professional artist. After serving as a paratroop sergeant (first with the Army's 82nd Airborne Division, and later with the 12th Special Forces Group of the Army Reserve), Davis worked 13 summers as a smokejumper, parachuting into forest fires with the U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management. During the winter he attended art school, graduating from the University of Oregon with a degree in fine arts. His early work was featured in solo exhibitions at the Alaskan State Museum and the Smithsonian Institution Air & Space Museum. Both museums selected his work for their permanent collections. In addition, one of his paintings hangs in the Pentagon with the United States Air Force Art Collection. In 2015 Davis was selected as a Signature Member of the Oil Painters of America.

Davis exhibits his work in galleries and other art venues in Northern California, while continuing his life of travel and public service. In 2007 he climbed Mt. Kilimanjaro, and created paintings from his view at the summit. He remains active as a paramedic, and as a member of the Disaster Medical Assistance Team of the Department of Health and Human Services. Since 2010 Davis has served on medical relief missions to Haiti; Ethiopia; Cambodia; Liberia (Ebola outbreak); Vanuatu; Nepal; Lesvos, Greece to aid with the recent refugee crisis; Mosul, Iraq, working with trauma patients during the Battle of Mosul; and with an international medical team in Ukraine during the current conflict.

MY FAVORITE RESTAURANT FOR SPECIAL EVENTS

Restaurant review by Mike Dean

BUCKEYE ROADHOUSE Shoreline Hwy Mill Valley

It's always good to have a favorite restaurant for special events like birthdays, anniversaries, reunions, very special friends, etc. Debbie and my special restaurant is the Buckeye Roadhouse just off 101 before the tunnel to the Golden Gate Bridge.



The Buckeye restaurant has been there for years, originally a wonderful German restaurant -with quite a history - which opened in the 1937 at the completion of the Golden Gate Bridge. Apparently, the Buckeye was once a clandestine meeting place for Nazi sympathizers before and during the second world war (or so I was told by my parents). It stayed a German restaurant until being taken over by a group headed by the renown chef, Bill Higgins, in the 90's, who remodeled it and changed the menu to up-scale American cuisine.

The Buckeye kept its warm lodge-like feel after the remodel, retaining its classy ambiance and a fireplace in the main dining room. The bar area is wonderful as well - lively and cozy with tables for dinner or lunch. There's an upstairs mezzanine for private parties or more intimate dining. A small outside area is available also for those of us who choose to take our dogs out to eat.



The fare is not cheap, but not outrageous either by Marin standards. My favorite appetizer is the Oysters Bingo, but there are plenty to choose from. I like the Brick Chicken for my entrée and there's a great House-Smoked Chicken Salad. The Key-Lime Pie is a must for Debbie and I for a special event dessert.

Marin old-timers are very familiar with the Buckeye, but if you haven't been there, it's a must – especially for special occasions.

STATE NEWS: 2023 brings significant change to the SIR organizational structure. First off, the Region Director position will be discontinued. Secondly the title Area Governor will be replaced by Area Representative with major changes in the job description. Without a Region Director and with Area 8s continuing Area Governor vacancy there are concerns about the communication link between the Area 8 branches and those at the state level in SIR. It has been recommended that the branches in Area 8 elect an Area Representative ASAP. The new Area Representative reports to the Vice President of SIR. Please note it puts the new position in a less controversial position than the old A.G. requirements. There are no compliance issues to be dealt with, all overdue reports and documents required in our incorporation business will be done by another.



"The Rising Tide" by Ann Cleeves; 2022, Mystery Thriller genre




The latest Vera Standhope mystery takes place on Holy Island, an island in the northeast of England connected to the mainland by a causeway which floods at high tide. A group of six former high school classmates have been holding reunions every five years for the past fifty years at the old monastery, where they went for the first time on a school "Only Connect" outing led by a young teacher. On the first reunion, five years after that first outing, one of their number dies in an apparent accident on the flooding causeway. Now there is a murder of one of them, which calls in Vera and her core team of Joe, Susan and Charlie.

This Vera Standhope mystery is the latest of many Vera novels written by Cleeves. It is an engaging, sometimes suspenseful story in her usual Vera style. If you are a fan of the "Vera" series on KQED (all old)

you know well this bright, overweight, empathetic detective. She is more abrasive with her coworkers in the novels than on the TV series. I recommend this novel to those who enjoy the genre. If you are one of those, then Cleeves must be familiar to you. This is a well-written, fast-paced mystery.

"The Paris Apartment" by Lucy Foley, 2022 Mystery genre


Jess has notified Ben, her half-brother, that she wants to visit him in Paris. Inconvenient



for the budding investigative journalist, Ben agrees to meet her at his apartment, and there is a vacancy in the building where she can temporarily reside. Jess is a single, underachieving London bar waitress, just fired for being a sneak thief, but manages to find enough cash for her first trip abroad. However, Ben has disappeared, cut off in mid-voicemail message. The residents of number 12 rue des Amants, a classic old Parisian apartment building, are a strange group, and, curiously, are unhelpful to Jess in her search to find Ben.

This well-written who-done-it introduces all the characters of the house as possible suspects in the mystery. All have secrets, which are gradually revealed in an ingenious narrative style, in which chapters are all narrated by the alternating residents, and by Ben and Jess. Mystery

lovers will enjoy this novel by an established British mystery writer, with the additional bonus of the Paris location.



"Lessons in Chemistry" by Bonnie Garmus, 2022, fiction

Feminism in the 50s, this is a witty, sometimes dark, occasionally hilariously funny story with an unforgettable woman protagonist, a chemist, who refuses to bend her principles while working and living in a time in America when women are expected to be home makers, subservient to men in almost everything. This N.Y. Times bestseller deserves all the credit it has received. You will love this debut novel.
