Program: Captain Tom Spink (Ret.) A History of Moffett Field



Moffett Field has served our great country, in peace and war, for nearly a century. Starting with the acquisition of 1,000 acres of land in the South Bay in 1931 and the construction of a Navy base for observation aircraft to today's Moffett Federal Airfield, the area remains vibrant and growing.

Tom will speak briefly about each of the eras of Moffett Field's history; LTA (Lighter Than Air) with the USS Macon, Army Air Corps training pilots prior to WWII, Blimps during WWII, Jets returning from Korea, Patrol planes during the Cold War and Vietnam, California Air National Guard, NASA and Google...

Captain Tom Spink, USN (Ret) is a native of Kansas City, Missouri and graduated from Kansas University ('68). He earned his Naval Flight Officer Wings of Gold in 1970, joined Patrol Squadron 46, then was an instructor in the training squadron, Patrol Squadron 31 in Hangar One at NAS Moffett Field.

In 1977 Tom retired from active duty and affiliated with Reserve Patrol Squadron 91 for 11 years, was Commanding Officer from 1986 to 1988. He later held various Reserve command and staff jobs in Alameda, CA, in Hawaii, and in Norfolk, VA. Tom has an MSc in Systems Management from USC, and his civilian employers included Singer-Link, Watkins Johnson, Precision Echo, and Lockheed Martin.

In 2022, he became the Chairman of the Board for the Moffett Field Museum. He and his wife Andrea live in Sunnyvale and Truckee, California, with a couple of rescue dogs.





Nakamoto Has the Round of the Month

Ron Nakamoto had an outstanding round on April 1 at Boulder Ridge. He recorded the low gross and low net in a field that also included Manetta, McGrath and Joyce. Those guys' handicap indexes were 9 or more strokes lower than Ron's. Ron shot 9.2 strokes under, which is not just the Round of the Month for April; it also has a good chance to be the Round of the Year!

Do You Wish There Were Fewer Canada Geese? No Joke!

The owner of a grocery store I shop at is an avid hunter. He told me that there's a special short hunting season for Canada Geese in late September and early October to reduce their overpopulation. The bag limit is 10 large geese. Learn more he https://calwaterfowl.org/regulations

Rules Corner

The Situation: While we're on the subject of geese, let's say you're playing a match at Shoreline. You and your opponent each have a course handicap of 18. On the fourth hole, a par 3 over a pond, you play first and your ball lands six feet from the pin. Your opponent isn't as fortunate and hits into the pond. He gives his next shot a bath too. With his third swing his ball finally lands on the green about forty feet from the hole. Lying 5, he concedes the hole. As you pick up your ball, you realize that you don't know if you should record your score as a 2 or a 3. And what about your opponent? Should he write down 6, 7, or 8?

The Ruling: In match play when a player doesn't complete a hole, the score he records for handicap purposes should be the lower of Net Double Bogey (NDB) or the most likely score he would have achieved if he had holed out. Because neither you nor your opponent completed the hole, both of you must apply that rule.

The Most Likely Score is defined as "a reasonable assessment made by you of the score you are most likely to make from that spot more than half the time." (See Rule II-3.3 at https://rules.usga.org/rules-of-handicapping/)

- 1. If the ball is on the green within 5' of the hole, add 1 stroke.
- 2. If the ball is 5' to 60' from the hole, add 2 or 3 strokes depending on the position of the ball, difficulty of the green and your ability.
- 3. If the ball lies more than 20 yards from the hole, add 3 or 4 strokes depending on the same factors as above.

Applying the rule to the situation, you would record a 3. Your opponent would record a 6 because of the net double bogey (NDB) limit. (Double bogey is 5. Your opponent and you each get one handicap stroke, so the NDB limit is 6.)

What if your opponent had hit only one ball in the water and was on the green, lying 3 and 40 feet from the pin when he conceded? In that case he could give himself a score of either 5 or 6, depending on whether he thought it was more likely that he would need two or three putts to hole out.



Wicked Little Letters Who knew the English language lends itself to such creative vulgarity. Olivia Coleman as Edith and Jessie Buckley as Rose, make this movie special and a must see. It is set in Littlehampton UK in the post World War I era. Edith is an uptight spinster living with her elderly parents. She spouts Bible verses at every opportunity. Rose is a rowdy Irish immigrant who loves a pint with the guys in the local pub. She has quite

a mouth on her and is known for inventive invective. Edith begins to receive letters full of uproarious profanities. Rose is the presumed author and is charged with criminal libel and finds herself caught up in the English justice system. The town police dismiss Rose's protestation of innocence since she is a woman. They suppress conclusive evidence of her guiltlessness. The women of the town gather their own evidence and expose the real culprit. This is a fun romp, so seek it out. It's a true story that captivated the English press in the early 1920s. It is a true story that is still unfolding today. 550 innocent sub-postmasters were wrongly accused, some wrongfully convicted of theft, fraud, and false accounting. Their accounts did not balance, and they were liable for the shortfalls. Property was seized leaving the suppostmasters bereft. All this was due to a computer glitch. It went on for over 10 years with the PO denying

anything was amiss and just running roughshod over the subpostmasters. Mr. Bates was a victim of the PO's arrogance and pushed hard with the help of good lawyers to get a full measure of justice. There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe periods that we lived through. This monthly article hopes to spur those memorable moments in your life when you first saw the movie or heard the song from your youth. What were you doing ... in days of yore? Ron



Music: "Mona Lisa" by Nat King Cole

"Mona Lisa" was originally written by Ray Evans and Jay Livingston for the movie "Captain Carey, U.S.A". They wrote the song for a blind accordion player to play the melody as a warning to the Resistance

Fighters when the Germans were in the area. As you would expect, the producers changed the title and canned the song. Ray and Jay subsequently pitched it to Nat King Cole, who liked it and recorded it on the back of his main song "The Greatest Inventor of Them All". The promotion for the song didn't even mention "Mona Lisa" but it was "Mona Lisa" that hit #1 on the Billboard chart in 1950 and stayed there for eight weeks. The song won the Academy Award for Best Original Song in 1950 as the theme song for guess what movie? The song travelled full circle back to "Captain Carey, U.S.A." with Alan Ladd. While the film was forgettable, the song has lasted through time and still invokes fond memories of times past. It certainly is characterized as a mood piece that puts you in a relaxed, reflective mood when you hear it.

A young musician, Nelson Riddle, did the song arrangement. It was a while before Nat realized that Nelson wrote the arrangement and commissioned him to do his next song, "Young Love". Riddle's talent for musical orchestration soon became the choice for top artists at Capitol Records like Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin, Judy Garland, Peggy Lee, and Johnny Mathis to name a few. In 1952, Riddle did the arrangement for Nat's hit "Unforgettable".

Music: "Unforgettable" by Nat King Cole and Natalie Cole

You've probably heard the duet of Nat King Cole and Natalie Cole for the song "Unforgettable". The story of the recording of the song is, well ... unforgettable, as Nat King Cole died when Natalie was only 15 years old. Many years later, Natalie

graduated from the University of Massachusetts and immersed

herself in her music earning nine Grammy's over her career, including "Best New Artist". When she performed in Las Vegas, she would sing alongside a video of Nat singing the song. That is where she got the idea to record a duet.

Enter, Al Schmitt, recording engineer extraordinaire. He was a legend in the studio recording business with dozens of awards as Best Engineer and over 150 gold and platinum albums to his credit. He undertook this special project and found that the original recording of "Unforgettable" was done on a three-track tape and the vocal portion was on the center track so he could isolate Nat's voice from the various instruments. By now, technology evolved to multi-track recordings so a voice track would be "mixed" in with multiple instrument tracks.

Al used a 24-track tape to record Natalie and a fifty-five-piece orchestra assembled for the recording. The result is a spine-tingling duet, backed by an orchestra conducted by Johnny Mandel's adaptation of Nelson Riddle's original arrangement. Several of the musicians were moved to tears, as was the lead singer, for as she would comment in the album's notes, the project was "... a labor of love for myself and everyone that has worked on it."

"Unforgettable ... With Love", released on June 11, 1991, hit #1 on the Billboard 200 and stayed there for the next five weeks. I first heard it on my rental car radio as I was driving in Washington D.C. on my way to a business meeting. It is one of those timeless moments in one's life. Where were you when you first heard Natalie and Nat? Here is their duet.

Movie: "All About Eve" Bette Davis

"Fasten your seatbelts, ...it's going to be a bumpy ride."

Filmed in 1950, Bette Davis should have won the Best Actress Oscar for her role as Margo Channing, the aging actress that felt sorry for and takes in Eve Harrington as her assistant. Eve, played by a young Anne Baxter, manipulates, and claws her way up to become an

understudy to Margo and later a lead actress in her own right. The script was based on a magazine story, "The Wisdom of Eve", Mary Orr wrote in a 1946 Cosmopolitan article. Joseph Mankiewicz (the father of Ben Mankiewicz, Host of "TCM Classics") took the article and wrote the script for the movie. The movie garnered 14 Academy Award nominations (tied later with "Titanic") for the most nominations, winning six, including Best Picture, Best Director, Best Screenplay, and Best Actor.

The original actress selected to play Margo was Claudette Colbert, who, movie critics commented, would have contributed to a good movie but not a great one. "Colbert was a down-to-earth kind of actress. Margo Channing needed to be played by someone who was unafraid to GO BIG, and that, ladies, and gentlemen, is Miss Bette Davis." Such quotable statements like "We are busy

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little bees, full of stings, making honey day and night." typify the script writing of Mankiewicz, which was later mimicked by others, for example, in the movie "Gladiator" when Emperor Commodus threatens to kill his own nephew Lucius if his sister does not disclose her schemes to him. "Tell me, what have you been doing, busy little bee"

Davis was nominated eight times for an Oscar, winning for "Dangerous" in 1935 and a second for "Jezebel" in 1938. Her career began to falter and suffered a big setback after her infamous clash with Jack Warner, CEO, Warner Brothers. Enter Mankiewicz, eight years later, with "All About Eve" who cast her for the role of a lifetime. It was a tour de force comeback, for which she won the Best Actress Award at "Festival de Cannes", but lost the Oscar to Judy Holliday for "Born Yesterday". She became the first woman to win the American Film Institute (AFI) Lifetime Achievement Award in 1977 and in 1999, was named the #2 female star of all time, behind Katharine Hepburn.
