

We meet on the 2nd Wednesday of each month from 1:30 till 3pm at the Los Altos United Methodist Church.

The Book Club is an activity where most months of the year, all members read the same book and then meet to discuss it.



For our June meeting, members read the graphic novel adaptation of Homer's classic "The Iliad" created by the renowned illustrator Gareth Hinds. This format is a step well above the comic book Classics Illustrated version of the 1950s. It includes page-by-page author notes, cast of characters, and bibliography. Hinds' intent in creating graphic novels is to make the book more accessible to all ages and to those readers who might be facing a language barrier.

Homer's "The Iliad" is the oldest written book in Western literature. In The Iliad, Homer relates events that took place in the tenth and final year of the Greek war with the Trojans and their allies. The Greek Gods have each chosen the side they will support and at times appear on the battlefield as apparitions to confuse the human warriors and turn the tide of the battle. The events are centered on a feud between the Greek warrior Achilles and the leader of the Greek forces, King Agamemnon.

One of our book club members asked ChatGPT why the book is considered a classic. The top two reasons given were because of the accounting of the human costs of war, and the consequences of pride and hubris as seen in the behavior of the Greek warrior, Achilles, and his mistreatment of the body of the Trojan hero, Hector, whom he had killed with the aid of the goddess, Athena. The graphic format was received positively by half the book club members. The others felt it to be a bit too comic bookish. Coyote Creek Trail (South San Jose)

Ride: We will ride the scenic Coyote Creek Trail starting from the Wyndham Garden Hotel at 399 Silicon Valley Rd, San Jose. The ride will be about 6 miles to the Coyote Creek Golf Course. We will ride past the golf course for another 4 miles to the Anderson Visitor Center at the end of trail, then double back to the golf course club house for lunch. After lunch we will ride back to the hotel street parking for a total of 20 miles. For those who want a shorter ride, they can stop at the golf course and wait at the restaurant.

Directions: The Wyndham Garden Hotel is located south of San Jose, one block east of highway 101 and just north of the highway 101/85 interchange. The directions are the same whether coming on highway 101 or 85: Take the Bernal Rd. exit. Turn left on Bernal Rd., which becomes Silicon Valley Blvd after crossing under 101. Turn left on Rue Ferrari Rd., the service road next to the hotel, and park along Rue Ferrari Rd (pls read street signs) and NOT in the hotel parking lot. The Hotel has changed its parking policy that only allows hotel quests to park in the lot.

Note: If the weather forecast in SSJ on 11th July 2024 is predicted to be hot, I will issue a ride change notice to switch the ride to a cooler location near the ocean or Bay waters. 

Taboada Aces WHS Recertification Test

You may have read the story in a recent NCGA Newsletter about the requirement that a representative from the Handicap Committee of each member club must pass the 2024 WHS Recertification Test. The USGA requires clubs to pass the recertification test every four years. Failing to pass would cause all the club members' Handicap Indexes to be revoked. Worry not, Tom Taboada took the test and passed it.

There were significant revisions this year to the WHS Rules of Handicapping and WHS Handicap Manual that were first introduced in 2020. The test consists of 20 questions on various topics in the Handicap Manual, with an emphasis on the most recent changes. Thanks to Tom, our club has been recertified and our Handicap Index updates will be valid through 2028.

Cioni Shoots His Age at Sunnyvale & Boulder Ridge

Joe Cioni, who will turn 85 in July, shot his age or better in a Branch 35 tournament for the 3rd and 4th times this year. At Sunnyvale, playing from the White tees with a course rating of 67.9, he shot a gross 81, net 69, to win his flight. At Boulder Ridge, playing from the copper tees with a course rating of 68.0, he shot a gross 82, net 70 to defeat Jay Jonekait in match play. Great work, young man!

Golf Rules Corner

The Situation

In golf there's no clock ticking down like in basketball and football -- at least usually -- but if you are late for your starting time there are consequences. Do you know the right answers to these two questions?

- Able and Baker are scheduled to play an NCGA-sponsored tournament match at 10:08 AM. They are playing head-to-head, not as part of a foursome. Able does not arrive at the first tee until 10:14 and Baker tells him he is disqualified for being more than 5 minutes late. Able says that he was held up in traffic and the penalty is loss of the hole, not disqualification. Which player is correct?
- 2) Baker then says, "I know traffic can be bad here. The penalty for being just a little late is too harsh, so I'm willing to ignore it." Do the rules allow him to be generous in this way?

MOFFETT FIELD'S DARKEST DAY

Midair Collision Near Coast Base Kills 16

SUNNYVALE, Calif., April 12 (UPI)—A space agency research jet and a Navy antisubmarine patrol plane collided in the air today and plunged in flames onto a golf course, killing 16 men.

April 12, 1973, was a warm and beautiful spring day. Among those enjoying it were the Sunnyvale and Monte Vista High School golf teams, who were playing a match at the Sunnyvale course. Suddenly at 2:50 p.m. there was the horrifying sound of an enormous collision. Startled golfers looked up in terror to see two large planes falling to earth. Within seconds, a Convair 990 jet and a Navy P-3 Orion had plowed into the golf course's twelfth tee and were engulfed in an orange-red fireball. The crash site was just two hundred yards short of the busy Bayshore Freeway and on the North side of Highway 237.

Lee Boyd was the coach of the Sunnyvale golf team. He recalls, "The P-3 was on top and the jet was on the bottom and they started to hit each other. The P-3 started to pull up, and the jet did, too. I assume that they both realized that they were both coming in on the same runway. As the P-3 was trying to abort the jet came up and punched a huge hole in the fuselage. I'll never forget the



gaping hole the jet made in the top of the P-3's fuselage. Both planes caught on fire at impact, and golfers were trying to break the front window of the planes to give help. Ray Kong, a golfer from our team, threw a parachute over the lone survivor."


Petty Officer Bruce Mallibert from the P-3 was the only survivor of the crash. His survival was a double miracle, because one of the fire trucks responding to the call saw only a parachute on the ground, but

not the man under it, and drove right over the parachute. It is believed that he fell from the P-3 before it hit the ground, possibly from as much as 100 feet. Though he survived, he was paralyzed in all four limbs.

Ray Kong's memories are also vivid. "Our foursome was probably the closest to the impact except for a group on the tenth or eleventh holes. We were walking up the third fairway when we heard the noise, and my two competitors from Monte Vista High School and my partially deaf teammate, Ray Vlach, dropped their golf bags and started running to the left, away from the planes. I thought 'What the heck is going on?' and then looked to my right and behind and saw the two planes, which had already collided, descending to the ground in a surreal slow motion. The nose of the P-3 was pointed up, seemingly attached to the wing of the Convair.

"After I caught up with my playing companions, and it was apparent we were not in danger, we stood and watched the 'landing.' I will never forget the dropped-jaw look of disbelief on the face of one of the players from Monte Vista, nor the golfer pounding on the plane's windshield with a golf club to try to help

the crew escape — but to no avail. I also remember the intense heat and popping sounds from inside the Convair; the fire truck driving over the parachute; and the large black woman who pulled the parachute back and took Bruce Mallibert's pulse. I thought he was dead. He was lying on his back, face up, with one of his legs twisted underneath."

Lee Boyd also remembers that "The crash trucks had a very difficult time getting on the course because it was fenced and the emergency workers did not have quick access to the gates. The other golf coach and I got the players off the course and safely home."



Eleven men on the NASA research plane and five on the P-3 died in the crash.

The crash investigation ultimately laid the blame for the crash on the air traffic controller. He had lined up the NASA Galileo research jet — the Convair — to land on runway 32R, the easternmost of Moffett's two runways. The P-3 was using the other runway (32L) for its touch-and-go

landings and take-offs. Then, tragically and mistakenly, he instructed the jet to land on 32L. The jet's pilot acknowledged the change of runway, but never saw the P-3 until it was too late. In the final few seconds the P-3's pilot, possibly responding to the controller's frantic instruction to "go around, go around, weave!" did try to avoid a crash by pulling up sharply, but it was too late.

There is no marker or memorial at the Sunnyvale golf course to remind today's golfers of the tragic events of 1973. In the next issue of Trail Tips we'll cover other noteworthy crashes of Moffett-based jets — including one that rained destruction on Downtown Mountain View!

MOVIE AND MUSIC HISTORY

There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe periods that we lived through. This monthly article hopes to spur those memorable moments in your life when you first saw the movie or heard the song from your youth. What were you doing ... in days of yore? Ron



Music: "MacArthur Park", Richard Harris, 1968

This is one of the few videos of Richard Harris, singing MacArthur Park. He recorded the song at Armin Steiner's Sound Recorders Studio, in Los Angeles, on December 21, 1967. They rehearsed the song a few times and recorded it in one

take. Other orchestral instruments were overdubbed in several sessions the following week and it was released as part of Harris's first album, "A Tramp Shining" in early 1968. The song was later released as a single in April of the same year. It was unusual to have a song of that length (7 minutes, 21 seconds), ever. It peaked in the top ten on Billboard's Easy Listening survey, sold over 1.3 million records, and won the Grammy Award for Best Arrangement Accompanying Vocalist(s)..

Here is some history of the writing and recording of this all-time classic.

- Jimmy Webb wrote the song and explained in an interview that: "It's clearly about a love affair ending, and the person singing it is using the cake and the rain as a metaphor for that. OK, it may be far out there, and a bit incomprehensible, but I wrote the song at a time in the late 1960s when surrealistic lyrics were the order of the day."
- The love affair Webb speaks of was with Suzy Horton, who in 1993 married Linda Ronstadt's cousin, Bobby. "MacArthur Park was where we met for lunch, paddleboat rides, and to feed the ducks. She worked across the street at a life insurance company. Those lyrics were all very real to me there was nothing psychedelic about it to me. The cake, it was an available object. It was what I saw in the park at the birthday parties."
- Do you think there was more than what Webb publicly said about the "cake in the rain"? You may be right, as further research uncovered a staff music composer, Colin McCourt, who worked for the publisher Edwin Morris, who claims that Webb said that phrase came from this girl he loved who left him and was to wed in the park. Broken hearted, he went to the wedding and not wanting to be seen, hid in a gardener's shed.

As the ceremony started, it started to rain and the rain running down the shed window made the cake look as if it was melting.

- Jimmy Webb's songwriting credits include "Up-Up and Away", "By the Time I Get to Phoenix", along with "MacArthur Park", Isn't it coincidental that the man who married his girlfriend was a phone engineer from Wichita. Glen Campbell thinks so.
- Webb originally offered the song to Bones Howe, who produced "The Association" singing group. The band rejected it for their album as it was too long. Harris was not known for his singing but had done "Camelot" and other musicals. As Webb recounts, Richard knew every Irish song that he had ever heard. Just get a few of his favorite drinks in him and he'd start singing, and he must have gone through a thousand of them.
- Richard Harris's interpretation of the song is very dramatic and added much gravitas to the final release. "He brought a great kind of theatrical dignity to the song. If he missed a note or didn't carry it off particularly well as a singer, he had the actor's ability to step his way through the lyric and to speak some of the lines. He played Camelot on the road and did that for eight years and earned \$65 million doing it. So, it's a little insulting to say that he couldn't perform, or that he couldn't sing." (Quote from Songfacts).



Movie: "Camelot", Richard Harris, 1967

Released in 1967, the musical was lavish and cost Warner Brothers \$14 million to make. The movie received mixed reviews but did gross \$31.5 million (\$296 million in today's dollars). It received five Academy Award nominations and won three for Best Score, Best Production Design, and Best Costume Design. It did win Golden Globe Awards for Best Actor (Richard Harris), Best

Original Song "If Ever I would Leave You", and Best Original Score.

Here is a most impactful moment where Richard Harris, in costume as King Arthur lectures a young imaginary, hope to be squire, about Camelot. Imagine, he on the Ed Sullivan Show, center stage, looking into a camera, in front of a large studio audience, delivering a soliloquy and song as if he was in fact King Arthur in Camelot. Could you do that? This is why good actors get paid the big bucks:

Here is some backstory on the making of the movie.

In April 1961, Warner Bros had purchased the rights to produce a film adaptation of the successful stage musical. The plan was to sign Rock Hudson to play King Arthur and Shirley Jones to play Guinevere. But Warner later decided to "greenlight" "My Fair Lady"

first. In acquiring the screen rights from CBS, Warner agreed to not release Camelot before April 1964. (Editor's Note: I'm sure you knew that "non-compete" backlot deals like this were routine in Hollywood.) When William Orr became producer, he sought the original Broadway leads of Richard Burton and Robert Goulet, adding Elizabeth Taylor as Guinevere.

Warner approached Burton to reprise his stage role, but Burton demanded such a high salary that the studio moved to consider Peter O'Toole, Gregory Peck and Marlon Brando. While filming "Hawaii" (1966), Richard Harris heard of the search for an Arthur and started campaigning for the role with complimentary letters, cables and even an offer to pay for his own screen test for the role. After the producers viewed Harris exercising his singing and acting chops they gave him the role.

Julie Andrews (original stage lead), Audrey Hepburn (My Fair Lady), and Julie Christie (Dr Zhivago) were the top choices to play Guinevere, but the studio also considered Polly Bergen, Ann-Margaret, and Mitzi Gaynor. They eventually selected Vanessa Redgrave who was also, like Harris, not known for her singing ability and they were also concerned about her active left-wing activism but in the end, did sign her.

One last tidbit. John Truscott was hired as Production Designer. He was the creator of the stage set of Camelot in London. He envisioned a stage set for a legendary time and created "Castillo"

de Coca" on the backlot in Burbank, California. The finished castle was the largest set ever constructed. A total of 23 stage sets were constructed to compliment the on-site shoots in Spain at seven different castles.

Camelot is a great example of how movies transport you to a different place and time and immerse you into the world of noble Knights, chivalrous causes, and duty to God and the Church. The Code of Chivalry, the Knights of the Round Table followed were "Honor, Honesty, Valor, and Loyalty".

As Paul Harvey is quoted as saying, "And now, ... you know the rest of the story."
