



On August 7th after a tour of the Moffett Field Museum, we discussed a number of IRA topics, including:

1. Effective use of your 401(k) and/or Roth IRA/Roth 401(k).

- 2. How money-earning children can use a Roth or 529.
- 3. Alternative educational accounts, 529's and educational trusts.
- 4. Qualified Charitable Distribution, or QCDs, from your required minimum distribution, or RMD (can't do it from a 401k).
- 5. Explaining Donor Advised Funds operation, and then comparing them with QCDs.
- 6. We have a speaker coming in October who will discuss medicare choices and issues. The speaker is with the non-profit, *Sourcewise*, which works for the Council on Aging (HICAP.).

San Lorenzo-Alameda Trail

We will resume the SIR Branch 35 bike ride on Thursday, 12th September 2024 (no ride in August). The designated ride will be the beautiful, ocean front San Lorenzo-Alameda Trail ending up on Bay Farm Island. This ride is one of the most scenic bike rides in the East Bay and a favorite ride among our bike riders, I showcasing the iconic SF Cityscape.

The ride starts from San Lorenzo passing by the Oakland International Airport to the breathtaking Bay Farm Island in Alameda. It is a very scenic, bay front trail that's paved and level (including 1-2 miles of quiet residential streets and 2-3 miles of Alameda city streets securely barricaded from all traffic, about 22 miles round trip. We will stop in Alameda for lunch and then ride back to our starting point. The trail can get a bay breeze so bring light windbreaker or vest. This ride is much like the Foster City Bay Trail/Oracle Redwood Shores ride, but on the East Bay.

Driving Directions: From Silicon Valley take I-880 heading North, exit on Hesperian Blvd (about 20 miles from Mt View/Palo

Alto area) turning left on to Hesperian Blvd, then right on Grant Avenue and turn right into the trail parking lot (near the end of Grant Avenue). Plug Into your car GPS: 2561 Grant Avenue, San Lorenzo. This will direct you the building next to the Hayward Regional Parking Lot (park here) and trail.

Recently, our biking group has been reduced so I'll only schedule the SIR Branch 35 ride on the second Thursday of each month.





Golf Columnist has the Round of the Month

(editor's note: Looks like Bruce can wield more than a pen!)

I (Bruce Karney) had the round of the month on Aug. 5 at Poplar Creek. I shot 90 gross, 61 net, and was 8.6 strokes under my expected score. But "no good deed goes unpunished" as the next article explains!

How a Great Round Impacts Your Handicap Index

Tom Taboada shared the bad news with me after my "Round of the Month" that the Exceptional Score Reduction would be applied to my handicap index. Several of our players receive the Exceptional Score Reduction each year, but I was unfamiliar with it. In case you are too, here's the scoop from the USGA.

"Any score that produces a Score Differential™ that is at least 7.0 strokes better than your Handicap Index® at the time the round was played is considered exceptional and is subject to the exceptional score reduction." In Branch 35 Excel files of tournament results this is called the "Over/Under Metric." This is the figure that is used for determining the Round of the Month.

If the Score Differential is between 7.0 and 9.9 strokes better, a minus 1 adjustment is applied to each of the most recent 20 Score Differentials in your scoring record. This has a net impact of reducing the Handicap Index by 1 stroke.

If the Score Differential is 10.0 strokes or better, a minus 2 adjustment is applied to each of the most recent 20 Score Differentials. This reduces the Handicap Index by 2 strokes.

Scores made following the exceptional score will not contain the -1 or -2 adjustment (unless they are also exceptional) which will slowly diminish the impact of the reduction as you continue to post scores. Also, reductions for multiple exceptional scores are applied cumulatively. (Rule 5.9, Rules of Handicapping)!

Like Golf, But Faster

Consider this an addendum to last month's column titled "It's Not Quite Golf." Don Bray recently told me about Speedgolf, in which the number of minutes to play a round is added to the number of strokes taken. Shooting 80 in 60 minutes would give you a score of 140, as would shooting 100 in 40 minutes.

No motorized carts are used in Speedgolf. You run the course, carrying your clubs, and you must rake bunkers and repair ball

If you think it's impossible to complete a round in 40 minutes, consider this: The lowest score in competition was shot by Mitch Williamson of Orange in New South Wales. On Aug. 29, 2016 at the Australian Speedgolf Open he shot 77 in 31 minutes, giving him a Speedgolf score of 108.

Mattson Goes Low in Hawaii

Joe Cioni and Don Mattson enjoyed a golfing vacation in Hawaii in late August. Joe reports that Don shot his age (92) in back-to-back rounds at Puakea on Kauai, first with a 92 on a day when the wind was blowing 30 MPH and then with a 90 under calmer conditions. Well done, Don!

The Rules Corner

During a recent LPGA tournament, a player sliced her tee shot into the rough under a tree. If she played the ball directly toward the green, her backswing would have been constrained by a sturdy branch about 4' off the ground. She could avoid the branch by pitching sideways into the fairway. As she tried to decide which strategy to use, she took several practice backswings in which her club hit the branch. One of the TV commentators said "She better be careful that nothing falls! I wonder if she even knows the rule." Do you know what rule he was referring to? The answer is at the end of this column.


Oh, the much younger Cantor and the 70-year-old are a thing. All

MOVIE AND MUSIC HISTORY

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There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe periods that we lived through. This monthly article hopes to spur those memorable moments in your life when you first saw the movie or heard the song from your youth. What were you doing ... in days of yore? Ron



Movie: Lawrence of Arabia, 1962 Peter O'Toole

Lawrence of Arabia, released in 1962, was one of those epic movies that warranted "the big screen". The sweeping shots of the open desert, filmed in Super Panavision 70, coupled with the dramatic score recorded and played using six channel surround sound, enveloped the audience and transported them to the desert as she recounted one of her real-life stories. The film was

nominated for ten Oscars, winning seven including Best Picture, Best Director, and Best Original Score.

The movie was based on the autobiographical book, "Seven Pillars of Wisdom", published in 1926 by British Army Colonel T.E. Lawrence who was a military advisor to the Bedouin forces during the Arab Revolt against the Ottoman Empire during the period 1916-1918. The script was adapted from the book and filming took two years on location in Jordan, Saudia Arabia, Spain, Morrocco, and in the Sahara Desert.



You cannot imagine anyone other than Peter O'Toole playing the part as Lawrence, with his intense blue eyes and his mysterious demeanor, but at the time, he was not known beyond the British theater arena. So how did he get to play the lead for a major, large budget, feature film? Well, here is the back story of how a theater actor was selected to play the lead role in an epic film.

David Lean, one of England's most important figures of British cinema had just completed directing "The Bridge on the River Kwai" and was engaged with Sam Spiegel, producer, to prepare for another epic movie production. Sam, who had produced, "The African Queen", "On the Waterfront", and "The Bridge on the River Kwai", wanted Marlon Brando to play the lead role but Brando turned it down as he chose "Mutiny on the Bounty", filmed in Tahiti with better pay saying: "I'll be damned if I'll spend two years of my life on some F***ing camel!" Peter was the third choice and accepted after much convincing as he was young and not motivated by money or even fame. He was an actor's actor, and the stage was his first love. It took some convincing by David Lean, who knew that O'Toole was absolutely the right actor for the role.



On-Location in the searing sun

On-location filming was brutal in the desert with searing heat from the sun and the reflective radiation from the sand. Plus, action movies usually result in injuries, albeit accidental to actors as the director attempts to capture that "shot" on film. A central figure to the film, like Peter, was no exception. During his first days riding a camel, blood oozed through his jeans, with him telling his instructor, "This is a very delicate Irish arse." (Brando was right.) To resolve this problem, he lined his saddle with sponge rubber and earned the nickname "ad al-Isfanjah", "father of the sponge". O'Toole, over the course of filming, was injured with third degree

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burns, broke his thumb, dislocated his spine, fractured his skull, sprained his neck, tore his groin muscle, was concussed twice, and was bitten by a camel. His bandage on his left thumb, from an injury while intoxicated, is visible in the scene of the first train attack. His worst injury was during the Battle of Aqaba, where he almost died when his camel threw him after he accidentally shot the animal in the head.



I'll conclude with some history on the musical score for the movie. After contracting with and rejecting the composer of the score for "The Bridge on the River Kwai", and composer Richard Rodgers (Rogers and Hammerstein"), they liked what French composer Maurice Jarre wrote and titled it, "The Theme from Lawrence of Arabia". Jarre had six weeks to compose the film's soundtrack which was performed by the London Philharmonic Orchestra with 78 instruments. The movie starts with only the music for the first ten minutes of the film, (first ever to give you a sense of the epic story to be told), until finally, you see the opening shot of Lawrence on his motorbike speeding down a winding road, reckless, excited, alas to his accidental death. The film ran 3 hours and 48 minutes, another epic fact about this film, so there was an intermission with more music.

Music: "If I Can Dream", Elvis 1968 Comeback Special

Written by Walter Brown, the song was noted for its similarity with Martin Luther King Jr.'s, 1963 speech, "I Have a Dream". It was recorded

by Elvis in June 1968, two months after the assassination of MLK and Robert Kennedy. The song was released as part of the "Elvis '68 Comeback Special", aired on NBC on December 3, 1968.

You probably don't remember but Elvis had not done a live performance for some seven years as he focused his career on acting in one film after another. Colonel Parker decided that the formula for making more money was to have the films promote the albums and the albums would promote the films, so he decided to shift the focus of Elvis's career to films and stopped him from

touring. The films were low-budget, formulaic comedies that were generally successful at the box office and always resulted in big album sales. Elvis thought he could be a good actor and tried to do more acting than singing in his later movies. The two he did with more acting and few songs, were both flops. To reduce costs, the producer, Hal Wallis, shortened filming schedules, mostly abandoned rehearsals, and limited retakes. All films were shot in the studio and young crews were used because they were cheaper than the experienced guys.

The approach worked for a while, but the films experienced a progressive decline in box receipts and Elvis grew increasingly discontented and depressed as he felt a loss of connection to the music tours and live audiences he loved.

In October 1967, Parker approached Tom Sarnoff, NBC, to propose a Christmas special. Elvis's initial reaction was negative as he thought this to be another Parker scheme to just make money. But Elvis's attitude changed as Bob Finkel, producer for the special, persuaded the parties to center the show on Elvis with enough material for a soundtrack album and a single Christmas song. It was the director, Steve Binder, who maneuvered the live format that Elvis used in the special, including the last song, "If I Can Dream". Elvis had been very moved by the recent assassinations of Senator Robert F. Kennedy and The Reverend Martin Luther King Jr., and wanted to conclude with that song. This was to the chagrin of Col Parker who wanted him to "come out in a tux and sing Christmas songs" Elvis got his way, but Parker extracted his revenge by demanding 100% of the publishing rights.

Here is the video of the memorable last song from his televised special with the big red 'Elvis' billboard behind him. He is one of my all-time favorite singers, great voice and a great southern gentleman, until he gets on stage with those wild gyrations!
