Program: Artificial Intelligence:
Past, Present, and Future Possibilities
Dr. Jim Spohrer, ISSIP



The field of AI was founded at the Dartmouth workshop in 1956, the year Jim was born. Today generative AI is becoming the helper some of us have always wanted, to generate prose, poetry and business plans tuned to particular audiences of investors. Generative AI is even generating software programs,

music, creating images, videos, and more, transforming work processes in organizations large and small. Jim will briefly summarize his 50 years working in the field of AI. His talk is intended to inspire those not using generative AI to start using it, but also to share its many weaknesses and potential harms. Still, the journey from cognitive tool to assistant to collaborator to coach to mediator is well underway. Finally, the world of humanoid robots and personal digital twins are just two future possibilities to explore. Buckle up, because AI is at your service!

Jim Spohrer is a student of service science and open-source, trusted AI. After completing a BS in Physics at MIT, he developed speech recognition systems at Verbex (Exxon), then achieved a PhD in Computer Science and AI at Yale. At IBM, he served as Director for Open Source AI/Data, Global University Programs, IBM Almaden Service Research, and CTO IBM Venture Capital

Relations Group. At Apple, he achieved Distinguished Engineer Scientist Technologist (DEST) for authoring and learning platforms. After retiring from Industry, Jim joined the Board of Directors of the non-profit International Society of Service Innovation Professionals (ISSIP). With over ninety publications and nine patents, awards include AMA ServSIG Christopher Lovelock Career Contributions to the Service Discipline, Evert Gummesson Service Research, Vargo-Lusch Service-Dominant Logic, Daniel Berg Service Systems, and PICMET Fellow for advancing service science. In 2021, Jim was appointed a UIDP Senior Fellow (University-Industry Demonstration Partnership).



We also discussed some recent highly sophisticated scams involving a hacked customer support hotline designed to phish out users' account information. 'Washed' personal checks have also been used to draw funds from unaware users, so be very careful to whom who you write personal checks!

We will meet at 1pm on Wednesday, October 2nd at the Moffett Field Museum Library, a great site with plenty of parking. Typically, we have 10 to 15 attendees with varied financial backgrounds. Our discussions will focus on healthcare and more specifically Medicare since the "Open" period is about to begin.

Half Moon Bay Coastal Trail

Ride: This is one of the best bike rides in the Bay Area! We will ride a paved, flat trail along the ocean front for about 6 miles from Poplar Beach, located south of Half Moon Bay to Pillar Point, just past the town of Princeton. There is an optional ride to Mavericks Beach (1.5 miles) where the CA surfing competitions take place and then on to the infamous Moss Beach Distillery (3 miles) on 140 Beach Way, HMB. This adds about 4.5 miles for a total 22 miles with NO inclines. We can decide on the length of the ride/lunch options at the starting point in the parking lot.

Directions: Take I-280 North approximately 15 miles to Highway 92, then take the exit to Half Moon Bay. Continue on Highway 92 about 10 miles to the intersection with Highway 1, turn left. Go about one mile to Poplar St., turn right. Go to the end of Poplar St and park in the Poplar Beach parking lot, near the port-a-johns. If you park in that lot, you must prepay an hourly parking fee and post your ticket on your car dash. There is also neighborhood street parking on side streets off of Poplar St., but please pay attention to ALL posted parking signs. Driving time is about 30-40 minutes.



The Rules Corner Answer

The rules say they must hit from the teeing area before they can drop another ball on the far side. They could use an old range ball for the tee shot unless the Tournament Committee had declared a "one-ball rule" to be in effect. That rule requires

players to use the same brand and model of ball for the entire round. The one-ball rule is rarely used in amateur play, but it is in effect on the pro tours. One recent example of its impact happened in 2019. Russell Henley was penalized eight shots (!) for unknowingly switching between two different types of Titleist ProV1s at the Mayakoba Golf Classic. (By the way, the women we were paired with were Dianne Wall and Joyce Scott, the wives of Branch 35 members Larry Wall and Campbell Scott. It's a small world!)





There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe periods that we lived through. This monthly article hopes to spur those memorable moments in your life when you first saw the movie or heard the song from your youth. What were you doing ... in days of yore? Ron



Movie: "Love Story" 1970, Ryan O'Neal and Ali MacGraw

This is not one of those epics, big screen movies that transported you to a different time or immersed you into an exotic land ... but it still became a global sensation with gross box office receipts totaling well over \$173 million (\$1.3 billion in 2023 dollars) and book sales of 20 million copies, translated into 33 different languages. The film was nominated for an Academy

Award in seven categories and won for Best Original Score. The song "Where Do I Begin?" composed by Francais Lai and later sung by Andy Williams became a major recording success. The American Film Institute has ranked the film as number 9 in "AFI's 100 Years ...100 Passions" list right below "It's a Wonderful Life' with number 1 as "Casablanca", of course.




The Director's Eye: Arthur Hiller

How did this simple film, based on a screenplay that was later drafted into a book become so successful? Many years later, Arthur Hiller, the Director was interviewed and reflected, "We had been going through a period of individuality in the 1960s, what I call the "biker films", like "Easy Rider" (1969). "If Love Story" had come out a few years earlier, it would have been run over by the motorcycles. A few years after, it would be lost to special effects.

Movies have their time of why they work and why they don't." Roger Ebert, famous movie critic, said, "I read "Love Story" one morning in about fourteen minutes flat, out of simple curiosity. I was so put off by Erich Segal's writing style, in fact, that I hardly wanted to see the movie at all. Segal's prose style is so revoltingly coy – sort of a cross between a parody of Hemingway and the instructions on a soup can. The fact that the film is infinitely better than the book is a tribute to Arthur Hiller's directing and the acting of the two stars who brought the characters to life in a way the novel didn't even attempt to do."

Here is the backstory of how and why the movie got made.

Eric Segal was a Harvard graduate who taught at Yale. In 1967, through some connections on Broadway, he helped write the screenplay for the Beatles motion picture, "Yellow Submarine". He found his passion and soon wrote and published his first academic book, "Roman Laughter: The Comedy of Plautus" in 1968. He gained considerable recognition as the book chronicled the great Roman comic playwright who inspired the Broadway hit "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum". He wrote a script, a romantic story about a Harvard and a Radcliffe student but failed to sell it. Howard Minsky, then head of the movie division of the William Morris Agency read and liked the story so much that he singularly "... mothered it all the way through. If it hadn't been for him, it would never have been a film."



Minsky (left) had Segal rewrite the script seven times with major changes to make it more appealing to the American audience. The script was read by Ali MacGraw, who loved it. Paramount, who had signed MacGraw to a three-picture deal, agreed to make the film a vehicle for her. As the film now had the backing of a major studio and a top actress, Paramount and/or Minsky pushed Segal

to create a novel from the script. The book was released on February 14, 1970 Valentine's Day and immediately became a best seller. (Editor's note: Now you know why the book was a short 132 pages.)

The casting for Oliver Barrett IV was a "big push-up" as the likes of Jeff Bridges, Michael Douglas, Jon Voight, Peter Fonda, Keith Carradine, and even Christopher Walken turned it down. After a long search and a lot of auditions Arthur Hiller focused on Ryan O'Neal. "He didn't bowl us over at first, but I thought he had a wonderful empathy and feeling that was so necessary to the part."

Paramount was able to secure on-location filming at Harvard University. This was the first time Harvard granted permission to film on their campus. Unfortunately, the crew ended up damaging trees and other structures which contributed to the university administration banning all future filming on campus.

Music: "This Diamond Ring", Gary Lewis

I've always wanted to know more about Gary Lewis, son of Jerry Lewis, who made a name for himself as the band leader and lead singer for "Gary and the Playboys". His fame came early, at the age of 19, when "This Diamond"

Ring" went to number one on the Billboard Hot 100 on February 1965. He followed with six more top 100 hits through 1966, then he was drafted and entered the US Army in January 1967. He was supposed to go to Vietnam and did in fact travel to and stayed a short while, serving as a clerk at Saigon Airport, but then was reassigned to South Korea. (Editor's note: I wonder who pulled some strings?) He served his tour and when he was discharged, he tried to regain his momentum but time had passed and the music world had moved on.

The story goes that "Gary Lewis and the Playboys" played at sorority and fraternity parties until they auditioned and got a

contract to play at Disneyland in the summer of '64. The head of A&R at Liberty Records was at the park with his family and after their show came backstage to talk about recording a song he had, "This Diamond Ring". Garrett told Gary, "I've got this tune that's been in my drawer for quite a while. This guy Al Kooper, wrote the song for "The Drifters" and they didn't like it, so I offered it to Bobby Vee, and he didn't like it." As Gary recounts, "He played it for me and I said, "I LIKE IT!" (Gary admitted he would have said yes to anything Garrett brought to him). The band recorded it, and it took just six weeks to climb the billboards to reach number one and displace the Beatles "Eight Days A Week".

This Diamond Ring was the first and the biggest of Gary's singing career. Snuffy Garrett became their manager and concentrated his efforts on packaging his new product for market. He had Gary add his last name to the band so that the famous family name would help sell records. He had Ron Hicklin do the basic vocal track, then Garrett added Lewis's voice twice, then some of the Playboys. If you listen to the song, you can hear the heavy Hicklin overdubbing. "When I got through, he sounded like Mario Lanza", Garrett commented. Snuffy then concentrated on bringing songs to get them beyond the "one hit wonder" curse. He succeeded as the Playboys recorded six more hits over the next year.
