## "An Exceptional SIR", by Dave Nigel

Peter Klein is December's featured "Exceptional SIR Member." He joined SIR Branch 4 in November 2002 upon his retirement. "Native Son" Peter was born in San Francisco, at Mount Zion Hospital. His grandfather was born in Hungry and emigrated to Philadelphia in 1870. While separated from his family for three years, his grandfather saved money and brought them to America from Europe.

The family moved from Philadelphia to San Francisco where Peter's parents attended Lowell High (as did Peter). The family opened a successful jewelry store in downtown San Francisco. Upon graduation from high school, Peter's Father attended Cal then Physicians and Surgeons School, (now part of UOP), and became a dentist with offices at the 450 Sutter Medical building. Peter grew up in Pacific Heights and, after Lowell, attended San Jose State. Peter tells the tale of selling hot dogs at 49er games at Kezar, slathering the unsold ones with mustard and selling them at USF games.

He met his wife Denise, who immigrated from England (Denise's father was also a doctor), on a blind date in San Francisco, resulting in a happy marriage of 52+ years. They have two children both employed in law enforcement. Peter worked in the family's jewelry business, then for a savings and loan in San Francisco, PG&E, and eventually, for 30 years, for the Golden Gate Bridge District.

Peter joined Branch 4 November 2002 and regularly attends and enjoys our luncheon meetings, especially the company of so many Bay Area members and sitting with his life-long friend SIR Peter Aiello. Peter states that we are lucky that we live in the San Francisco Bay area where we have such a rich history and diverse varied cultural and athletic activity options. Geritol for Holiday Luncheon. No SIR luncheon is complete without a measure of "Geritol". Our bottle is Peterson "Zero Manipulation" Mendocino Carignane from Tollini Vineyard. A gutsy, spicy wine from an old Mendocino Vineyard, made with a bare minimum of the additives often used in winemaking. Carignane is the only wine grape to expand plantings during Prohibition. The tough skins helped the grapes survive shipping throughout the country to home winemakers without being crushed through handling.
