

April Luncheon Happenings

The speaker for the April Luncheon was Mr. Peter Grossgart, the Marketing Manager for the Port of Stockton. Mr. Grossgart is responsible for planning, developing, and implementing the port's maritime trade and real estate business development efforts. Mr. Grossgart gave a slideshow presentation of the Stockton Port highlighting an overhead view of the entire port and discussing the main types of cargo the port handles. The port consists of 2050 acres including one-time

naval base Rough and Ready Island which was obtained in 2000. The port seeks diversity in the products that are handled. Typically, these are steel, fertilizer, gypsum, sulfur, cement, and rice. The steel cargo is by far the largest in weight, and consists of rolled steel coils which are converted into electrical wire, mainly for the electronic industry. Gypsum goes to the valley farmers as a soil conditioner. Interestingly, cement shipments went from 2.2 million tons to zero (0) following the 2008 recession. Now the tonnage is approaching the prior level and is expected to continue increasing. Almost all the rice grown in California goes through the port to Japan on Japanese ships. The Port of Stockton handles almost every type of cargo with the exception of containers and autos. Other than containers and autos, it is the leader in tonnage shipment among all the ports in California.

Interested in a Port tour? Sign-up sheets were made available at the conclusion of Mr. Grossgart's talk, and several branch members have already signed up. There are three dates available for a tour: May 2, May 3, and May 15. Big Sir Dave Derksen is handling the signup, and anyone interested should call him at 636-4650.

Big Sir Dave Derksen awarded Senior Certificates to two Branch 46 members at the Luncheon. A Senior Certificate is given to branch members who reach the age of ninety. The recipients were Bob Shellenberger and Dale Dunmire. Bob has been a member of the branch for 25 years, having joined in November of 1993. Dale joined in February of 1995 and has been in the branch for 23 years. New member Earl Gilford was introduced and welcomed to the Branch. Roster information for Earl is listed in this edition.

<u>Are We Being Hacked?</u> Branch 46 could be a victim. Once again we are getting "hits" from foreign countries on our website. In April, someone from the Phillipines logged on and was looking at our Recruiting link. This is the one on the front page labeled "New? - Join Us". I plan on sending him an application Also, two more "hits" in April from Quanzhou, China and Beijing. They didn't look at any link – just wanted to see the pretty front page I guess.

<u>Computer-</u> There are sixteen write-ups in the Computer Newsletter this month which vary from the latest on Facebook's problems to a write-up on Apple making its' own processing chips. Write-ups that I found interesting are described briefly below. Numbers are the paragraph numbers in the newsletter.

- **6.** Advanced Facial Recognition. A man wanted by police in China for "economic crimes" assumed that he was safely hidden in the 5 million population of Nanchang. So he felt safe when he joined nearly 60,000 people gathered at a concert. What he did not know was that the police were using advanced facial recognition cameras and technology to find and track wanted individuals. He was tracked from the gate where he entered to his seat where he was arrested. The article at the link will tell you more about the Chinese system being used and some of the concerns that may arise from its use in China and in other countries.
- **9.** Carpool Lane Cheaters Technology May Catch You The Bay Area Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) is currently testing equipment designed to catch drivers illegally using carpool lanes. These automated systems can snap photos of a passing vehicle, accurately count the number of people in the vehicle, and send citations to violators. When the system is implemented, tickets and fines of \$490 may soon be appearing in the mailboxes of carpool lane violators.
- 11. Soon The Audio Speakers In Your Car Will No Longer Be Needed. Technology advances combined with consumer demands have led to the disappearance from our cars of antennas, eight-track decks, cassette decks, and even CD players. Soon you will find that speakers are gone too. A German firm, Continental, has developed a technology that makes parts of the car interior vibrate to produce immersive sound that is equal to any premium sound system on the market today. The technology turns the rear window into a subwoofer, the windshield, floor, dashboard and seat frames provide midrange sound while the A-pillars become tweeters.

Expect to see this technology in cars by 2021.


