

The Computer link on the main website page features the June edition of Bill Bromiley's Computer Newsletter. There are three interesting write-ups in the edition that I can relate to and are described briefly below.

Technology Reduces Lost Luggage. Airlines are now starting to employ what is called RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) to help solve the lost baggage problem. For an extra fee at check in, you can have a special chip embedded on your baggage tag, and, with your smart phone, you can track your baggage as it is loaded and unloaded (if at all). The airline also uses the system to locate your lost baggage, assuming, of course, that it isn't flying away to another destination.

Danger, USB Charging Stations. Many airports have charging stations for your smart phone where you can use your phone line to recharge your phone. The problem is, your USB line can also be used to transfer data to your computer and vice-versa. This means that something sneaky installed in the airport charging station can access private information stored in your phone. Bottom line: Don't use public charging stations for your smart phone or your laptop.

Eight Risky Password Mistakes. I'm sorry I read this article. Apparently, I've been creating my computer passwords in a pattern that's a lot easier for hackers to determine. Even if you create a password with numbers, letters, capitals, and symbols, if you're like me, you use the same pattern: numbers together, capital letters all in a line, same with lower case, and the symbol at the end. Apparently, almost everyone does the same. Hackers love us. It makes their work a lot easier if they can count on this type of a pattern. The solution is to put every character in your password randomly. Sure! Just try to remember it then!

May Luncheon Happenings

The speaker for the May Luncheon was Mr. Angelo Carrasco, a criminal investigator for the San Joaquin County Office of the District Attorney. Mr. Carrasco has been a Police Officer since 1993, starting with the State of California where he began with investigation of Medi-Cal Fraud. During this time he was assigned to the Governor's Medi-Cal Task Force along with the FBI and the US Attorney's Office. Here he was able to assist in the successful prosecution of many medical providers including doctors, dentists, labs, and clinics who were defrauding the state.

In 2001, Mr. Carrasco joined the San Joaquin County District Attorney's Office Bureau of Investigations where he worked in the Welfare Fraud Unit, Insurance

Fraud, Homicide/Gangs, Main Line, and ID Theft. He is currently the Protocol Coordinator for investigations involving officer-involved shootings or officer-involved "critical incidents". In this regard, he assembles teams from all agencies involved, and the investigation is conducted at many different levels. Mr. Carrasco emphasized the fact that, due to the depth and range and number of agencies involved, a "cover up" would be virtually impossible. Every lead is investigated, and all results are tape recorded, sent to the DA, assembled, and sent back to each agency. Final results from each agency are returned to the DA who makes the decision whether or not to file criminal charges. Mr. Carrasco stated that, in his 17 years of experience with the DA Office, only one of this type of case has resulted in charges.

As you can see, we still need candidates for our slate of 2018 officers. Once again, if you have even the slightest interest in filling one of these three positions or know someone who you think could do the job, please contact our Nominating Committee Chairman, Paul Wagner. For information, here are brief descriptions of some critical aspects of each position.

Little Sir

One of the main functions of the Little Sir is to provide a speaker for each of our monthly Branch luncheons. While this may seem to be a somewhat difficult task, it's really not. Stockton and the San Joaquin County actually have a wealth of individuals ready and willing to talk to us. The publicity is good for them individually and also for the organization they represent. Also, previous Little Sirs can provide significant help and suggestions. The Little Sir also works side-by-side with the Big Sir during the two Ladies Day functions (June Picnic and Christmas) providing assistance with the setup, decorations, and the activities. He also substitutes as necessary whenever the Big Sir is not available.

Treasurer

The Treasurer is responsible for the Branch finances. Along with the Assistant Treasurer and Big Sir, he can make deposits and write checks on our bank account. At the luncheons, he is the one at the long table who sells the luncheon tickets and then pays Elkhorn based on the number of tickets sold. Other payments, to name a few, go to Elkhorn and Micke Grove for facility use, to our Bulletin publisher, and to the State office for our quarterly assessment (1.25 per member). He also takes in the money from the Bucket Brigade donations and the 50/50 activity. He completes Sir Form 28 each month which is an Excel sheet breakdown of all "disbursements" and "receipts" and then sends it in to the State Office.

Secretary

One of the main jobs for the Branch Secretary is to take the minutes of the Branch Executive Committee (BEC) then publish and send them out to the BEC members and also to the Regional Director and Area Governor. Additionally, there are several reports which are mailed to the State Office at various times of the year, such as the Branch membership roster and Officers and Directors for the coming year (Form 20). **Editor's note:** I've been Branch Secretary in the past. It's an easy, yet important position and an excellent way to become familiar with the workings of the Branch.

General

All Officers and Directors are expected to attend the monthly BEC meetings which are held once a month a few days before the Branch luncheon. This is probably one of the most important functions of any Branch Officer or Director since it provides an open forum for discussion, complaints, new ideas, and anything else concerning the Branch. Any decisions made are voted upon and entered into the minutes. Any member of Branch 46 can attend these meetings and participate in the discussions; however, voting is limited to officers and directors.


