

- 1. NASA Invites Tourists To The International Space Station The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) has announced a new plan for as many as two private citizen missions per year to fly to the International Space Station and "stay for up to 30 days, with the first mission coming as early as next year." The private astronauts will need to meet NASA's medical standards and the training and certification procedures for regular NASA crew members and also cough up \$50 million per seat.
- **8. Beep. Ding. Vroom. Electric Cars Need to Make Noise for Safety**. Electric vehicles are virtually silent so pedestrians and bicyclists can be taken by surprise by an approaching vehicle. All auto manufacturers are preparing for 2020 when a federal regulation takes effect for all hybrid and electric vehicles, which are quieter than their gas-guzzling ancestors, to emit noise at certain speeds for pedestrian safety.
- 11. Five Simple Ways To Protect Your Personal Data. The deeply connected items in our life, particularly our smartphones, can collect data about us and share that data with others without our knowledge or authority. The "smartphone game you play in the waiting room at the doctor's office, the mobile app that gives you a weather forecast, the photo you share with online friends—all have the ability to reveal intimate details about your life." The Consumer Reports article at the link tells you how to simply eliminate five different threats to your personal data in little more than five minutes of your time.

IN MEMORIAM

Sadly, we must report the passing of Sir Frank Rubino on October 6, 2019 at the age of 99 - 2 months shy of his 100th birthday. Frank was a longtime active member of Branch 46, having joined the branch in 2007. Our heartfelt sympathy and condolences go out to the family and friends of Frank at this sad time in their lives.

LITTLE SIR RAMBLING - Personal Safety Tools

In this addition to the monthly bulletin I hope to provide information of use to our members that would take up time at a meeting. It may not apply to all, but it will usually provide information to at least some now, and others for future use. Today will be on personal safety tools. In the past few years law enforcement has been forced by the courts to vastly expand the ability of the average citizen to get concealed weapons permits. For some, this is the way to go, but for others there are monetary issues. To get the permits you not only have to pay a nice chunk of change for just the application, but for the actual permit. You have to take and pass a certified private sector class on gun safety, law, and do a range qualification. If you fail the class you have to take the whole thing over again, and, in some cases, pay a new application fee. After you do this, you have to pass the background check and, in some cases, pay another huge chunk of change for the actual permit. Application, class, and permit will run from \$600 to \$1,000 dollars depending on where you live, even if you already have a firearm. A decent handgun will run from \$500 to \$900 plus, depending on brand and caliber. Should you actually have to use the gun, it will be taken as evidence until all legal proceedings are done, and you might not get it back for several months or even a year or more, leaving you without protection unless you possess more than one handgun.

There are other options that may be more suitable One is pepper spray, and the other is a stun gun. Pepper spray dispensers are cheap, and there is no longer a permit or class required. Some are aerosol and some are pump type dispensers. They often come with a little carry case so you don't accidentally activate it. Drawbacks are getting it out on time and being able to get a good squirt or spray into your attacker's eyes. Another drawback is that the spray outlet can be clogged with dried product when you test it periodically and then it won't work when you need it most. Along with cost, the other good thing about them is that if they take it as evidence it is no big deal as you can go right down to the store and buy another. You should replace these automatically every year or so whether you use them or not.

The final item is the stun gun or stun gun flashlight. Periodically they can be found on sale at places like Big Five for around \$50 and come with a charger cord. You can get a black canvas carry case that clips onto your belt. With the flashlight type that I carry, because it looks like a flashlight, the bad guys don't realize what it is at first and just see it as an LED light you are shining in their eyes to temporarily blind them. This will allow you to get close enough to touch them and activate the charge to either momentarily disorient them or, for a longer period, incapacitate them long enough so you can get away or disarm them. With this type you actually touch them with the end of the flashlight to transfer the charge instead of shooting out a wire to try to hit them. You can take this item anywhere except into public buildings, schools, or public meetings. With this item, you can also go down to the store and buy another if yours is taken as evidence. Some people carry them when out for a walk to protect them from dogs on the loose who become aggressive.

No matter what tool you decide upon you need to read what state or local laws may have to say about them, and, of course, you can't carry any on planes through the security lines. They have to be in your checked luggage and retrieved after you leave airport security areas......Good luck and be safe......It's a jungle out there.
