Our meeting was held on the ZOOM platform, hosted by Jerry Sabo.

The meeting was called to order by Big Sir Rick Henry at 11:30am. All BEC members were present except Arnold George.

The October 21, 2020 meeting minutes were approved as presented.

The treasurers report was approved as presented. The balance of the general fund on Nov 18 was \$2,951.40. Our expenses this month included \$280 for our assessment to the State Board for 4th quarter of 2020. SIR State 2021 President Elect Jim Johnson recently announced the Sir State Executive Committee has acted to suspend collection of the 2021 first quarter Branch Assessments. This will be a \$271.25 savings in January 2021 for Branch 59.

Larry Lardie will be our treasurer in 2021. He and Hugh will meet soon to discuss this transition.

Signature authorities on our bank accounts will need to change. There may be an advantage to closing the current account and opening a new one. The transfer of funds would happen in January.

Little Sir, Larry Jett; We are celebrating 9 birthdays today. Larry will call their names at the beginning of our general meeting. Larry also spoke about the installation of our 2021 officers in December.

John Pesek; During our December general meeting we will install our 2021 officers. Big Sir will be Larry Jett, Little Sir will be Bob Marshall, Secretary Dave Nelsen, Asst. Secretary Rob Ingebretson, Treasurer Larry Lardie, Asst. Treasurer James Vermazen and Directors; Hugh Twomey, Sammy Lum, Jerry Halligan, Jim Ulam, Rick Henry and Dave Shideler. Jim Ulam offered to conduct the installation. Several committee positions need leadership: Social chairman, Activities chairman and Librarian.

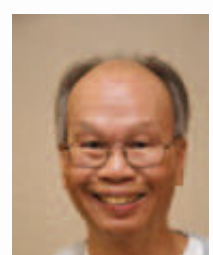

Philosophy and Carpentry – Jim Cunningham – I’m SIRious

My favorite thing about visiting my cousins Jackie, Fay, Leland and Sonny was making up scary ghost stories on the porch just before bedtime. Afterwards my brother Johnny and I slept at the foot of the bed or on a pallet on the floor. But wow, we loved it all.

Born January 1943 into my family living in Selma, Alabama, with my grandparents. At age two we moved to Montgomery, where my father worked as route deliveryman for Colonial Bakery. We moved into public housing, “the projects”, where the rent was \$20.00 a month for a two-bedroom apartment. In the projects we made lifelong friends, playing hide and seek, Cowboys and Indians, flying kites and playing softball in the fields.

We walked four blocks to school and six blocks to West End Baptist Church. On Sundays our mom gave us a dime for the offering and sent us off. Walking past the drug store with comic book racks, an open fruit stand with gum ball machines, a bait shop where we always stopped to see the minnows for sale and finally past the Dairy Queen, sometimes our dimes didn't make it to church. After church, my mom gave us money for bus fare and the movies. We rode the bus to town and chose between the three theatres. After the movie we would walk to the taxi stand and wait for my dad to pick us up and take us home. My dad now drove a taxi, an old Chevy and later a Checker.

When I was 13, my mom went to work at the lunch counter at The Montgomery Fair, a local department store. With the increased income my parents bought a house in southern Montgomery. We had to change schools in the middle of the school year, a real culture shock for me and Johnny; now we went to school with strangers.

For Christmas in 1956 Santa Claus brought us bicycles. We were amazed and delighted to ride them to school instead of making that long walk. The Air Force base bussed the kids of servicemen to our school. Among them was John Duchendorf (John Denver), who was in my 8th grade math class. I remember the teacher but not him so much. Just another kid among hundreds.

We took the city bus to high school. I worked after school at the Piggly Wiggly as a produce boy. I didn't get the tips the bag boys got, but I didn't have to stay after hours and mop the store like they did. The high school counsellor got me a job after school as an apprentice auto mechanic. In my senior year a local contractor hired me as a draftsman.

Our mom bought us a new suit every year using her employee discount at Montgomery Fair. The waist and length were always sewn at the store by the store seamstress, a lady named Rosa Parks. We had already seen the horror visited on the freedom riders at the Greyhound Bus Station and now saw the effects of the bus boycott in Montgomery.

After high school I enrolled in a trade school in Atlanta for drafting. All the students lived together in a boarding house. We worked during the day and went to school at night. I graduated in 7 months but rather than accept a job working for Boeing Aircraft, I decided to join the Army.

After taking a battery of tests, the Army took me aside and told me to forgo a promised school as surveyor in the Corps of Engineers for a role in the Army Security Agency with 7 months of school at Fort Devens, Massachusetts and 9 weeks school in Fort Meade, Maryland before going to Germany for 2 years. John Kennedy made his “Ich bein ein Berliner” speech when I was stationed in Germany at Herzo Base near Nuremberg. I was at my workstation when I heard on the Armed Forces Network that he had been shot.

My California military friends talked me into coming west for the education. U.C. Berkeley had a five-year degree in Architecture that I wanted to pursue, so I went back to Alabama for a short visit with my folks, bought an old Ford station wagon and drove to California with my new wife. I had married 6 months before I got out of the service in Versailles, France to an American independent I had dated in High School.

We rented a three-story walk up on Piedmont Avenue in Oakland. I found a drafting job near the Kaiser building and enrolled in Merritt College in Oakland. At lunch I walked to a parking garage and witnessed the marches from Berkeley to the Oakland Army recruiter protesting the Vietnam War. The Black Panthers were meeting and forming at that time in the Merritt College lunchroom.

We we rented a house in east Oakland where David and Jeanie were born in Oakland's Providence Hospital. My company went broke and I found a new drafting job in Newark at Kaiser Designed Facilities. They manufactured portable school buildings next door to Peterbilt Motors. Using my G.I. bill, I was able to buy a new house in Newark. I transferred my education to Ohlone College and changed my major to Philosophy. I was lucky to have Fr. Joseph Steinke as a professor. He had spent 17 years as a Jesuit monk in a monastery in Kentucky with Thomas Merton. I took every course offered in **Philosophy** and loved it; it better fit my interests. Now to be an architect you need to be a math genius and an artist. I was not an artist but a craftsman who found higher math extremely boring and difficult. Newark was also a good fit for the family and soon two more children, Wendy and Mark, were born.

While working at Kaiser, I applied for and got a General Contractors License. I started building decks on weekends. When Kaiser closed their plant, I joined the **Carpenter's** Union and worked out of the hall for two years, still building decks on the side. Then I went 100% on my own and began to learn the business as a remodelling contractor. The actual work was easy compared to the running a company with employees and "ten thousand unforgiving government regulations" while still making a profit. I ran the company for 40 years, working all over the bay area. I focused on room additions and kitchen & bath remodelling. In that time, I built four full size homes and did a little commercial remodelling, but my passion was kitchens.

When we divorced, I moved to Union City into a house I rented from a friend. Two of my children came with me. About this time Katie moved into a house with her sister who lived across the street from me. Her sister introduced us and about a year later we married. I bought my old house from my ex-wife. Katie and I moved in and I remodelled the kitchen and master bath to make the old house a home for Katie. Katie brought two children into our marriage. Katie retired from the electronics manufacturing business where she was a QA manager. She decided to take classes at ROP in bookkeeping to help me in my business. She helped make the last ten years of my business very successful.

In choosing a church, I suggested the Presbyterian Church in Newark, but Katie fell in love with St. James' Episcopal Church in Fremont. Katie and I have been retired for about 10 years. I keep busy with gardening, cooking, volunteer work at St. James' and SIRS. I put together a church gardening & cookbook using the congregation's favorite recipes. Our six children and ten grandchildren and one great granddaughter keep us busy and young at heart.
