Our meeting was held in person at the Fremont Elk's Lodge.

The meeting was called to order by Big Sir Bob Marshall at 10:02am. All BEC members were present except Dave Shideler and James Vermazen.

The December 15, 2021 meeting minutes were approved as presented. Dave discussed some of the upcoming activities outlined in the Annual SIR Schedule of Branch Operations, especially the secretary sending the current branch roster to Area Governor in February and the treasurer sending the branch audit report, form 29, to the Area Governor by February 10. Larry will have a discussion with the audit committee.

Treasurer, Larry Lardie reported the balance of the general fund as of January 19 was \$4,330.24. This includes \$660 for 2022 dues collection. It also shows a shortfall of \$370 collected from members to cover the cost of lunch and use of the Elk's lodge. The treasure's report was approved.

Big Sir Bob Marshall discussed highlights of the fireside chat with SIR President Rick Kindle held on January 15. Some main discussions topics were; >A new pilot program which allows women to become members. This is underway as a trial at Branch 81, Rossmoor, which failed last year and is undergoing a revitalization of the branch. >A pilot program has been introduced for branches to work as volunteers in their communities. >In order to help small branches, they are being allowed to have as few as 3 officers and 2 directors on their BEC. >Veteran commemoration programs were discussed. >Benefits of having a facebook page, as a marketing tool.

We discussed our thoughts about allowing women membership. Bowling and walking groups are both co-ed. We will discuss this further during future meetings. It was noted the Elk's organization made the change to include women in their membership years ago, which increased their numbers.

Bob suggests we find someone to be our chaplain. A requirement would be their invocation be non-denominational. Rob offered to give the invocation today.

Speakers; We have none scheduled. This is usually a task assigned to the Little Sir. Rob suggested this be done by a small committee. Rob, Bob, Rick and Jerry all have ideas for speakers and offered to line some up.

Are You SIRious

Spreading Fred's Ashes - 2004 by Bruce Roberts

My cousin Fred died well before his time as they say. He had always expressed that he wanted his ashes scattered in a high meadow in Muldoon Canyon. Fred's artist sensibilities caused him to follow a life of art as a gallery owner. His life led him to California, but he called his true home Muldoon the place where our grandfather settled as an immigrant from Scotland in the 1890s. Sally Laidlaw Williams was Fred's sister. As both of Fred's parents had died, it fell to Sally to organize the trip to Muldoon Canyon. She asked me and her son John to accompany her on the hike to scatter Fred's ashes in that remote canyon in Central Idaho. She had a general idea of an appropriate meadow for scattering Fred's ashes, but it had been some years since she had climbed the steep canyon. Also, the canyon had, and still has, no communication with the outside world. An accident in the canyon could leave a person there for a long time until their absence from normal pursuits would be noticed, a search organized, and the person found. And, like most people, she had never scattered a loved-one's ashes in a remote location.

Muldoon Canyon June 2004

Muldoon Canyon climbs in the

late spring exhilarate me and wear me out at the same time. Starting at 7500 feet, the canyon ends at nearly 9600 feet in less than three miles of hiking between peaks in the Pioneer Mountains. The trail along Muldoon Creek passes between landslides on the west and avalanches on the east, rock boulders and snowfields. Native grasses grow near the creek and mountain pines hold the soil at the higher altitudes. At the beginning of the climb, the wildflowers blossom in reds, whites, yellows and blues thrown around like a farmer has flung his seeds with great abandon, making this part of the climb a delight. But this climb had a purpose other than viewing the beauty of the canyon and the exercise.

We started hiking in the cool morning, our boots instantly drenched on the outside with the heavy dew on the low-lying wildflowers. We lowlanders paused often to gather our breath in the thin, high-altitude air. By noon the dew-covered plants changed to dusty and dry as the sun's heat dried them out. We paused for water, a sandwich and a rest near to noon-time. Continuing the climb, we reached an area where we could see the top of the canyon, the Sawtooth National Forest boundary, Scorpion Peak and the place where Muldoon Creek headwaters lake should be. We started to look for a meadow, a comparatively flat, grassy area overlooking the canyon with its creek, the green grasses, the sparsely separated pine trees and, far below, the quaking aspens and colorful wildflowers. John, Sally and I switched to the east side of the canyon, now lush with grass

and sparsely spaced pine trees. Yellowish boulders dotted the west canyon side; below it stood a wall of black basalt – from black and snow covered to lush green painted with dabs of yellow.

After a climb of another 500 feet or so, Sally spotted a flattened area to the north and nearer to the top of the canyon. There it was, the perfect meadow. From the meadow we viewed the expanse of canyon, and through a slot, we could see into the next watershed full of pine trees. Wispy grasses,

newly bright green, flattened under our boots as we walked to the center of the clearing, pines above us, vistas below us, a view for the ages. This was the place, Fred's meadow. Sally asked me to read an Indian poem of nature and the nature of life. We unpacked Fred's ashes from John's backpack.

As we had never performed a ritual like this, we decided to spin the ashes around us to disperse them. Soon a pale golden, pollen-like dust settled on the grass and our boots as we stood in a huddle. I read, slowly and reverently, the ancient, Native American words.


"Today I will walk out, today everything evil will leave me, I will be as I was before, I will have a cool breeze over my body. I will have a light body, I will be happy forever, nothing will hinder me. I walk with beauty before me. I walk with beauty behind me. I walk with beauty below me. I walk with beauty above me. I walk with beauty around me. My words will be beautiful.

In beauty all day long may I walk. Through the returning seasons, may I walk. On the trail marked with pollen may I walk. With dew about my feet, may I walk.

With beauty before me may I walk. With beauty behind me may I walk. With beauty below me may I walk. With beauty above me may I walk. With beauty all around me may I walk.

In old age wandering on a trail of beauty, lively, may I walk. In old age wandering on a trail of beauty, living again, may I walk. My words will be beautiful."

We paused in silence, drank in the cool, thin, fresh air, lumps in our throats. We each wandered off in separate directions alone with our thoughts. Fred, the appreciator of fine art, now in a landscape setting, a place he would have called home, did call home, the place from whence his artist's senses had sprung. It's a hard country; bitter winters, ice and snow stay late past the time most of us call spring, but a place that glories in the brief time that life abounds. Maybe, like Fred.
