FEBRUARY GUEST SPEAKER

Police Chief Sean Washington, Fremont City Police Department



Police Chief Sean Washington joined the Fremont Police Department in 1997 and worked several assignments gaining experience as a Detective, Field Training Officer, SWAT Team Member, Arrest Control Instructor, Driving Instructor, and member of the School Resource Officer Unit. Chief Washington was promoted to the rank of Sergeant in 2007, Lieutenant in 2011, and Captain in 2015 as commander of the Special Operations Division. He was appointed Police Chief on October 1, 2021.

As Police Chief, he is responsible for all aspects of the Fremont Police Department, including emergency services provided 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The Fremont Police Department has 322.5 full-time employees of which 202 are sworn positions. The Department is a full-service law enforcement agency and also provides some services by contract to other agencies.

Chief Washington is committed to ensuring FPD serves our community members with dignity, respect, and fairness. He remains actively involved in Special Olympics Northern California and other community-based events, such as hosting Shop With a Cop and mentoring local children. Previously, he also led one of the nation's first Electric Patrol Vehicle Pilot Programs in 2019 when Fremont Police Department deployed its first fully electric-powered vehicle, a Tesla Model S 85, as part of its patrol fleet.

Chief Washington earned a Bachelor's degree (Criminal Justice) from California State University,

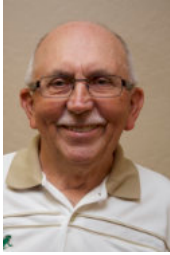

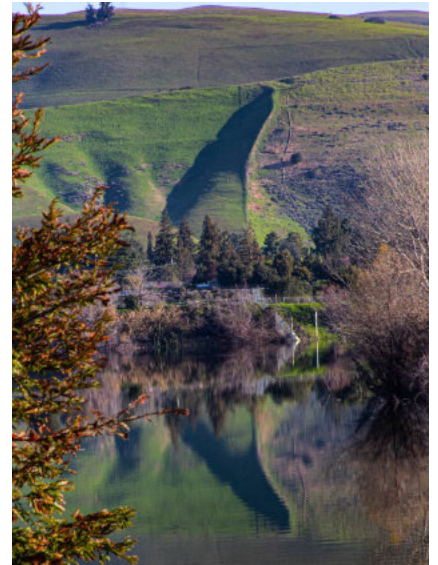

ChatGPT Is Smart Enough to (Barely) Pass an MBA Exam

On certain exam questions, ChatGPT wrote impressive answers, but on others, not so much, according to Christian Terwiesch, a professor at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School.

It turns out OpenAI's [ChatGPT](#) program is capable of passing an MBA exam —but just barely.



Christian Terwiesch, a professor at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School, recently tested how well ChatGPT would fare on his own MBA exam by giving the AI-powered program five sample questions.

In the end, ChatGPT scored a "B to B-" across the five questions, or just enough to receive a passing mark. In a [research paper](#), Terwiesch goes over the AI program's performance, which ranged from providing stellar answers to others that were riddled with logic flaws.

For example, Terwiesch gave ChatGPT an "A+" on three of the test questions for supplying the correct answers and providing a succinct or superb explanation for them.

QUESTION 2

World-Antique is a new venture under development by two graduates of a New England business school. The value proposition of the venture is simple: purchase antique paintings at yard sales and auctions and then sell them at quadruple the purchase price via a simple eCommerce site (i.e., a painting that is purchased for \$100 would be sold at \$400).

Based on an analysis of similar retailers, the founders expect to turn their inventory 1.5 times per year.

To achieve an annual revenue of \$3,000,000, how much inventory expressed in \$'s should the founders expect their operation to require?

A sample MBA exam question given to ChatGPT

ANSWER 2

To achieve an annual revenue of \$3,000,000, the founders need to sell $\$3,000,000 / 4 = \$750,000$ worth of paintings per year.

Since they expect to turn their inventory 1.5 times per year, they need to have $\$750,000 / 1.5 = \$500,000$ worth of inventory at any given time.

Therefore, the founders should expect their operation to require \$500,000 worth of inventory.

The resulting response, which earned ChatGPT an A+ (Credit: Christian Terwiesch/ChatGPT)

But on two other questions, the program received a "C" for providing flawed answers that showed "Chat GPT3 at times makes surprising mistakes in relatively simple calculations at the level of 6th grade math," he wrote.

Looking at the results, Terwiesch concluded ChatGPT excels at basic operations management and process analysis questions. However, “the present version of ChatGPT is not capable of handling more advanced process analysis questions, even when they are based on fairly standard templates,” he added. Thus, if given different, and perhaps harder questions, the program might fail the exam.

Still, ChatGPT is powerful enough that Terwiesch plans on joining other schools and professors in banning its use for homework assignments and finals exams. But he doesn't see the chatbot replacing business workers just yet

Live Music!



When I was growing up in Twin Falls, Idaho, in the 1950s and early '60s my prospects for hearing live music were limited. Although Happy Holly Hoffberg and His Double H Buckaroos played on KLIX TV, I never saw that group play live. My first live music was either watching the musical Carousel put on by a local group, or the Arlen Bastian Quartet, a dance band. Carousel's music still resonates with me today. Arlen Bastian played stand-up bass, an instrument that I had not even dreamed existed. Mostly I listened the KEEP Radio (rock 'n roll) as a teenager. I bought 45-RPM records and eventually LPs. My first was Elvis Golden Records and the second was The Kingston Trio. My friends and I made a trip to Ketchum for a folk music concert where I saw Jesse Fuller sing “San Francisco Bay Blues.” I was hooked on folk music, and my friends started The

Fireside Trio, singing KT and Limeliter's songs. Our Hi-Y group brought The Limeliter's to our high school for a concert. Wow! Big Time Live Music!

What a difference Live Music was compared to recordings. Real people instead of just sounds or songs with a photo for accompaniment. Loud music in a concert space opened my mind compared to songs on “the stereo” where loud meant ‘wait until Mom went to the store.’

When I could afford the money for a concert ticket, I tried out some rock concerts. Elton John in Portland – yeah, I took pictures, but “Saturday Night's All Right for Fightin'” took me beyond excitement.

Back in Twin Falls I listened to Van Cliburn's recording of Tchaikovsky's First Piano Concerto in B flat Minor – an LP, around 1960 or so. I had never heard a symphony orchestra. I don't remember my first live symphony for some reason, but I now understand something of the power of the symphony – it's as loud as the conductor wants it or as soft and sweet as the composer wrote the music. When I first heard Ahmad Jamal play on an LP, it really attracted me to jazz. A few years back I heard and saw him play at Yoshi's in Oakland. Mesmerizing for the kid, now an adult, who had only heard the music on Jamal's first LP.

In the past number of years, as an adult, I've attended many concerts, watched and heard many local country, jazz, blues, serious music ensembles and individuals play live. And live is the way to go if I can attend. It makes me feel like I know the artists. Hey, and it is visual. I can watch the cellist bow the strings, marvel at the pianist's fingers, see how the guitar player makes those slide-sounding notes. It's not background sound, it's like I'm somehow participating, part of the performance (as I hum along or sing the song), faux sitting with the orchestra or band.

And the performers like playing to an audience.

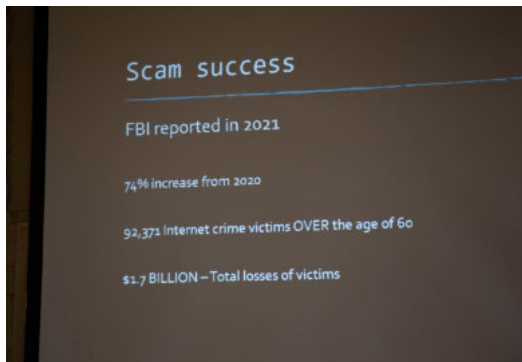
