The meeting was called to order by Big Sir Jerry Halligan at 10:01am. All BEC members were present except Larry Lardie and James Vermazen.

- 2. By a majority vote, does your BEC approve of allowing other branches to have women join their branches as members? Our vote was Yes.

Jerry will submit our response to President Dave Gonzales by May 1st.

Jerry spoke of our most recent new activity, Couples Wine Tasting, coordinated by Andy Lang, and the 23 members and significant others who have signed up for their first meeting. The list of activities our branch is currently engaged includes; Bocce Ball, Bowling, Bridge, Cornhole, Couples Dining Out, Couples Wine Tasting, Cyber Geezers, Fly Fishing, Genealogy, Golf, Pickle Ball, Pinochle, Poker and Wednesday Walkers.

Membership; Rob reported we have no new members joining today, but two guests are expected to join us. Rob also reported on the death of two members; Howard Thompson, a member for 26 years and Allen Kenney, who was a member for 23 years.

Attendance: Phil reported 75 members are expected to be in attendance today.

Recruitment/Publicity; Not much to report. Jerry suggested we look for members with a marketing background who may help us develop ways to recruit new members.

Speakers; Bob Marshall spoke about the exciting lineup of speakers we have scheduled, including Healthcare, Boating, Education, World Travel and Financials.



Paper Boy and Banana Split

Do you take the local newspaper? The reason I do, I think, is because I delivered the Twin Falls Times News on my bicycle as a teenager. Yes, that's Twin Falls, Idaho, where I grew up. The Times News was an afternoon delivery, except Saturday (no paper) and Sunday morning. My Schwinn bike (red three-speed, chrome fenders) did all the heavy lifting so to speak. It carried the newspaper laden, cotton newspaper bags draped over the handlebars. My first route was 5th Avenue and Tyler Street, somewhere between 40 and 60 papers. My job as I saw it was to make sure every newspaper found its way to the customer's porch. Throwing and missing a porch meant getting off the bike, finding the paper in the bushes (usually) and then placing it on the porch. I was pretty hard on myself so I wouldn't get any complaints.

On that first route I would meet at the Times News office on 2nd Avenue where all the paperboys met and folded their papers. With the papers all folded and bagged I'd deliver the papers, one block at a time, both sides of the street. At the end of the route, I'd catch up with my friend Hank who had another route close-by and we'd ride home, as he lived near me.

The newspaper wasn't very big, 16-pages was pretty normal, but a 12-pager was nearly impossible to throw as it was so light even folded and rubber-banded. Then, again, the unusual 20 or 24 page paper so filled the newspaper bags we hardly had room for them all. Oh, yeah, rubber bands – colored gray green, we had rubber band fights at the Times News Office. We learned the machine gun method: stretch the rubber bands between fingers in layers on your left hand and fire them off with your right hand. Not sure if I could do that anymore.

After a year or two on that route, I switched to a larger one on 9th Avenue and Fillmore Street. Because I was now going to the High School so close to my house, I had the papers delivered to my front yard. I would take them inside the house, fold them and start on the route.

This route (about 85 or so papers) had an apartment building where I could get-rid-of about 20 papers. Because I lived on Pierce Street, one block over from Fillmore, I rode up one side of the street all the way to Shoshone Boulevard, and back down the other side. It never dawned on me that folks on the other side of the street would wonder why their paper was so late given the neighbor's paper across the street was delivered so quickly.



Now, remember that my route ended not far from my house, and it so happened that it ended near the Okay Food Center. Remember also that the Sunday paper delivery took place in the morning. After our routes on Sunday morning, Hank and I would rendezvous at the shopping center which had a small snack shop. One of the delicacies they sold (yes, even on a Sunday morning at 7:30 AM) was a banana split for the bargain price of 25 cents. Split banana, ice cream, whipped cream, chocolate sauce, nuts and a Maraschino cherry. Heaven on earth and I still had to go to church.

We each ordered a salad and entrée. As we finished our salad, but before the entrée was served, the waiter told us, "Keep your fork."

I replied, "But I dropped it on the floor."

The waiter said, "So.....pick it up!"

Inscription on Unknown Union Soldier Grave in Georgia

In July 1864, Nathaniel Adamson was ten years old. This was validated by the 1860 Heard County GA census which listed Nathaniel as six years old. He was the youngest of the six children who were living at home and had attended school during that year. Nathaniel, who was nicknamed "Bud", remembered the following incident and told it later in his life.

In 1864, the Union Cavalry under the leadership of Gen. E. M. McCook passed through Western Georgia. The soldiers fought with those under the command of Gen. Joseph Wheeler when..."McCook's men were sent to forage at nearby farms. The troops destroyed many farms during the raids. These attacks caused fear and hatred of the troops.

This incident occurred at F. C. Gamble's farm in Glenn, GA. A Union soldier, who came to the well for water, fainted and fell from his horse. Nathaniel saw the soldier fall and ran to get Mr. Gamble. Despite efforts to save the soldier's life, he died, and Mr. Gamble buried him in an unmarked grave at the Adamson Cemetery in Glenn, Georgia. The cemetery has been renamed the Pleasant Grove Cemetery.

Nathaniel became a tombstone carver. On May 30, 1928, he inscribed the following words on a concrete slab on top of the grave.

This dying man, his friends had fled, left to his foes, not a word Away from home, away from friends, and all that heart holds dear A federal soldier buried here, no earthly friends was near His lips were closed, his body frale, his dying groans and face was pale Away from home, away from friends, and all that heart holds dear a Federal soldier buried here, no earthly friends at war. The clothes he wore blue uniform, his body showed not a mark of harm Away from home, away from friends and all that heart holds dear.

Mr. Gamble in a hostile environment showed kindness and respect of life itself. When Nathaniel (Bud) carved the words of the poem some 60 years later on the grave of a fallen enemy, it was a very heartfelt act. Bud was my Great Uncle (brother of my great great grandfather Seaborn Adamson).


In response to the article "Magic Flight" in the March Pathfinder.

Reminds me of the time when my Dad, my son and I flew up to Soldotna, Alaska to meet up with my brother who had moved up there after Vietnam. We had two great days of fishing planed. One on the Kenai River for King Salmon and the other in the Gulf of Alaska fishing for Halibut.

The famous King Salmon ended up being a bust. All six of us in the boat were skunked. "Too much glacial melt" we were told. The River was swollen up to its banks.

The Halibut was another story. As we headed out of Cook Inlet toward the Gulf I crawled up into the ship's cabin to get warm and talk with the Captain. I had barely got settled when we hit a wave that shot me up and caused me to crack my noggin on the metal roof. Quite the wake up call. There was

this long, long stretch of forested shoreline to our North. I asked the Captain what was out there and he said, "Nothing". Rephrasing the question I asked him again: "No, I mean what towns, fishing holes and the like?" His response was the same, "Nothing". He said that is was National Forest... miles and miles and miles of wilderness.



I could not recall another time when I was ever on the edge of nothingness... Except for when I was in the Navy and in the middle of the Pacific Ocean heading home from Vietnam on our aircraft carrier. 360 degrees of bareness to the horizon, for days on end.

It's all good.

The Jacyee Creed by Bob Marshall

Many times, people ask me what makes me want to be involved in so many things. The answer lies in my early exposure to the Jaycees and the Jaycee Creed, which I quote often. I joined the Newark Jaycees in 1973, and while I am no longer a member (you age out at 40), I still try to live by these words.

What is the "Jaycee Creed"? The Jaycee Creed is a statement of principles that defines the ideals and values of the Junior Chamber International (JCI), a global organization that aims to develop leadership skills and create positive change in communities. The creed was first adopted in 1946, and it remains a cornerstone of JCI's mission and philosophy to this day. The Jaycee Creed is a testament to the importance of personal responsibility, civic engagement, and leadership development.

The Jaycee Creed consists of five statements:

- 1. We believe that faith in God gives meaning and purpose to human life. This statement acknowledges the importance of spirituality and the belief that there is a higher power that guides and directs our lives. It also suggests that a strong foundation in faith can provide a sense of purpose and direction, which can be harnessed to make a positive impact on the world.
- 2. That the brotherhood of man transcends the sovereignty of nations. This statement emphasizes the importance of unity and cooperation among all people, regardless of their nationality, ethnicity, or background. It recognizes that we are all part of the same human family, and that our shared humanity supersedes our differences.
- 3. That economic justice can best be won by free men through free enterprise. This statement reflects JCI's belief in the importance of entrepreneurship and self-reliance. It recognizes that economic opportunities are essential for individual growth and success, and that creating a free and open market is the best way to promote economic progress and social mobility.

- 4. That government should be of laws rather than of men. This statement speaks to the importance of rule of law and the principle that all individuals, regardless of their standing or influence, should be subject to the same set of laws and regulations. It emphasizes the need for accountable and transparent governance, and the importance of protecting individual rights and freedoms.
- 5. That earth's great treasure lies in human personality. This statement is perhaps the most foundational of the five. It recognizes that people are the most valuable and essential resource in society, and that investing in personal development and leadership skills is the key to creating positive change in the world. It affirms the inherent dignity and worth of every individual, and underscores the importance of empowering people to reach their full potential.
- 6. That service to humanity is the best work of life!

The Jaycee Creed is a powerful statement of principles that guides JCI's work around the world. It encapsulates the organization's commitment to creating strong, self-reliant, and empowered individuals who are capable of making a positive impact in their communities and beyond. By adhering to the principles of the Jaycee Creed, JCI members are able to build a better world, one small act of service at a time.
