Going forward members will pay nothing to attend luncheons!

It seems everything is costing more lately. Several branches are experiencing higher luncheon costs for their meals. Branch 35 has offered their membership two food options that don't rely on the catering services of years past.

Members can bring their own home-made meal or order online from an arrangement with Saltalk.com. This food preparer and delivery vendor offers a variety of menu items to match one's taste and dietary needs at a competitive price. Most meals are in the \$ 15- 20 range. Case Lucio, Peking House, Magpie, Matsuri Sushi, Khan and Mediterranean Leaf are some of the restaurants enlisted.

The group's combined order will be delivered free of charge; requiring a payment by credit card or PayPal. Members place orders through a web browser or by downloading the Saltalk app from the Apple App Store or Google Play. Members must sign a waiver for the delivery service.

Members must still pre-register so that the right number of tables and chairs can be set up and so that one's name tag will be ready to be picked up. The delivered meals will be placed on a table with names clearly marked. Volunteers will staff the table to assist.

The luncheons are also telecasted on Zoom making it available to all. Details about the luncheon and the Zoom link are sent prior.

MONTHLY LUNCH CHALLENGES Costs

Inflation and other factors are raising the cost of our lunches.

Creativity and understanding is needed to keep costs from becoming a bar to member participation.

Lowering the cost of the meeting place:

- Can the lunch meetings be every other month?
- Instead of everyone meeting together, can members be divided into smaller groups, with the full membership meeting once or twice annually?
- Consider having members order their food directly through a meal delivery service or bring their own lunch.





MONTHLY LUNCH CHALLENGES Costs

Lowering the cost of food:

- Instead of a full meal, would appetizers suffice? Consider brown bag lunches or the use of a meal delivery service.
- Shifting to breakfasts rather than lunches may lower food costs.
- Rather than every month, having a full meal once a quarter, semi-annually or annually will lower costs.

Lowering the cost for ancillary services.

 If you are being charged for use of electronic equipment and screens, consider using a member's equipment or purchasing the required equipment.




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MONTHLY LUNCH CHALLENGES Speakers

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The Future is Here

There's gold in 'em hills!





The Bay Area has the largest diverse concentration of Asians with more than 100,000: Daly City (61%), Sunnyvale (52.4%), Fremont (64.7%) and Milpitas (73.4%). Chinatowns exist in three clusters in SF, Oakland; Japanese largest population is in SF, San Jose and Sacramento. There are Korean stores in Cupertino, Santa Clara and Oakland. There are growing cities where the majority of residents are of Asian origin. These enclaves include: Elk Grove, Vallejo, Hayward and Berkeley. San Jose is 10% Vietnamese. Many Indian Americans (15%) live in Yuba City, which has a significant Sikh community. There are many Cambodians, Laotians and Hmong in Stockton, Fresno, and Merced (Central Valley).

Asians have the highest income per capita in the US. They comprise a high student body percentage among many California colleges: UC Berkeley-40%; UOP (35%), Evergreen Valley & San Jose State (36% each) among many. More than half of Asians ages 25 and older (54%) have a bachelor's degree or more, compared with 33% of the US. Nearly all US-born Asians (95%) are English proficient. Professional, financially sound, stern family values are positive traits often associated with this population segment.

Asians are projected to become the largest immigrant group by 2050, surpassing Hispanics.

How best can we present SIR to the multi-cultural folks with the opportunity to enjoy the same pleasures we have with our activities, events and friendships.






Revelations in UN Report

Crises Can Make the World Kinder

The first quarter of the 21st century has suffered a multitude of troubles. During the two-plus decades between the twin towers attack in 2001 and Russia's invasion of Ukraine in 2022, the world has seen the Syrian and Yemeni Civil Wars, America's failed campaigns in Iraq and Afghanistan, and major insurgencies in Sudan and Nigeria. Millions have died and tens of millions have suffered torment and heartache caused by natural disasters: earthquakes in Gujarat (India, 2001), Indonesia (with a tsunami, 2004), Kashmir (Pakistan, 2005), Sichuan (China, 2008), Haiti (2010), and Tohuku (2011) — most powerful ever recorded in Japan, magnitude 9.1, with tsunami that led to the Fukushima Daiiche nuclear disaster; cyclone Nargis (Sri Lanka, 2008); European heat wave (hottest in 500 years, 2003); Hurricane Katrina (deadliest hurricane in the last hundred years, 2005); floods in Mozambique (2000), Haiti (2004), China (2010), and India (2013, 2017). As of mid-2022, around 70 million people had been forcibly displaced from their home country due to conflict, unrest, or natural disasters. About half of these refugees are children, who face incredible risks and dangers - disease, malnutrition, violence, labor exploitation, and trafficking into prostitution. About one-third of these refugees live in refugee camps.

And, over all this has been the global pandemic and more than 40 public school shootings per year.





Such a Sad Accounting!

Yet, at the same time, these crises have actually made people around the globe more willing to help each other, according to the latest World Happiness Report from the Sustainable Development Solutions Network, a United Nations organization. The World Happiness Report focuses on six key factors that contribute to happiness across the world: social support, income, health, freedom, generosity, and absence of corruption in business and government. These data are used to calculate an "overall happiness score" that can be a maximum of 10. The actual scores for 148 countries range from 2.5 to 7.8.

People Prove Amazingly Resilient

"Even during these difficult years, positive emotions have remained twice as prevalent as negative ones, and feelings of positive social support [were] twice as strong as those of loneliness," reported co-author John Helliwell in a news release.

Some Data from the World Happiness Report

The graph (left) includes all countries with scores of 6.0 or greater. The ten highest ranking countries are Finland (7.8), Denmark (7.6), Switzerland (7.6), Ireland (7.6), Netherlands (7.5), Norway (7.4), Sweden (7.4), Luxembourg (7.3), New Zealand (7.3), and Austria (7.3).

The U.S. ranks 19th with a score of 7.0 – the same score as Iceland, Costa Rica, United Kingdom, and the Czech Republic.

The 10 lowest ranking countries are Burundi (3.8), Yemen (3.7), Tanzania (3.6), Haiti (3.6), Malawi (3.6), Lesotho (3.5), Botswana (3.5), Rwanda (3.4), Zimbabwe (3.1), and Afghanistan (2.5)

"This year's report features many interesting insights," said contributor Lara Aknin, "but one that I find particularly interesting and heartening has to do with 'pro-sociality' (behaviors that are intended to benefit others). For a second year, we see that various forms of everyday kindness, such as helping a stranger, donating to charity, and volunteering, are above pre-pandemic levels. Acts of kindness have been shown to both lead to and stem from greater happiness."

This year's World Happiness Report also shows that despite several overlapping crises, most populations around the world continue to be remarkably resilient, with global life satisfaction averages in the COVID-19 years 2020-2022 just as high as those before the pandemic.

"The ultimate goal of politics and ethics should be human well-being," said Columbia Professor Jeffrey Sachs, co-editor of the World Happiness Report. "The happiness movement shows that well-being is not a 'soft' and 'vague' idea but rather focuses on areas of life of critical importance: material conditions, mental and physical wealth, personal virtues, and good citizenship. We need to turn this wisdom into practical results to achieve

more peace, prosperity, trust, civility – and yes, happiness – in our societies."

Remembering and Recalling Information

Cognitive Biases for May

This month's set of 8 interrelated cognitive biases revolve around the reality of how folks remember and recall information and how that natural act can be perverted by some instincts imbedded in everyone's brain.

Frequency Bias or Frequency Illusion is a cognitive bias that materializes when folks notice an idea, concept, phenomenon, or thing for the first time, and then notice it more often, creating the illusion that it is appearing more often, when, in fact, its frequency of appearance has not changed.

Stanford linguistics professor Arnold Zwicky coined the term frequency illusion, and he considered it a process involving two cognitive biases: selective attention bias (folks noticing things that are important to them while disregarding the rest; see below) followed by confirmation bias (looking for things that support folks' hypotheses, while disregarding potential counter-evidence; discussed in the November 2021 Bulletin). The frequency illusion is considered mostly harmless, but it can cause worsening symptoms in patients with schizophrenia. The frequency illusion may also have legal implications, since it can influence eyewitness accounts and memory of folks' testimonies.

Selective attention bias (or attentional bias) is a cognitive bias that characterizes folks' capacity to choose what they pay attention to and what they ignore. A related phenomenon is inattentional blindness, which occurs when folks fail to see something, often unexpected, that is in plain sight, purely as a result of a lack of attention.

A related tendency is the Status quo bias, a cognitive bias in

which folks resist change and prefer to maintain their current state. When considering various alternatives, they judge their current state as the objectively superior choice. The status quo bias intersects with other non-rational cognitive processes such as loss aversion bias, which is folks' tendency to prefer avoiding losses over acquiring equivalent gains. Some studies have suggested that losses are twice as powerful, psychologically, as gains.

Another related inclination is the

endowment effect, a cognitive bias that causes folks to value an owned object higher, often irrationally, than its market value. It causes folks to place a higher value on an object that they already own, than the value they would place on that same object if they did not own it. Research has identified the mere ownership effect and loss aversion bias as the two main psychological forces causing the endowment effect. The mere ownership effect arises when folks evaluate something they own more positively or of greater value than they would if they didn't own it.

Cognitive Biases for June

Oversimplifying & Ignoring Reality

Folks tend to simplify probabilities and numbers to make them easier to contemplate and deal with emotionally. Doing this takes several forms — some of them are cognitive biases.

Appeal to Probability Effect — a cognitive bias where folks take something for granted as true because it probably would be true. Mere probability does not correlate with certainty, the probability that something could have happened does not mean it did happen.

Normalcy bias is a cognitive bias that leads folks to disbelieve or minimize threat warnings. Thus, they underestimate the likelihood of a disaster, when it might affect them, and its potential adverse effects. Normalcy bias causes many folks to not adequately prepare for natural disasters — earthquakes, tornadoes, hurricanes, floods, tsunamis, forest fires, market crashes, motor vehicle accidents, war, and calamities of all types caused by human error. A whopping 70% of folks reportedly display normalcy bias during a disaster.

The ostrich effect is a cognitive bias where folks "bury their head in the sand" and avoid potentially negative but useful information, such as feedback on progress, to avoid psychological discomfort.

Normalcy bias has also been called analysis paralysis and the ostrich effect. Many first responders call it the negative panic. The opposite of normalcy bias is overreaction, or worst-case scenario bias, in which small deviations from normality are dealt with as signals of an impending catastrophe.

Zero-sum bias is a cognitive bias that intuitively judges that some folks' gains must be offset by other folks' losses. This bias promotes zero-sum fallacies — false beliefs that circumstances are zero-sum situations, which can lead to false judgments and poor decisions.

The adage or epigram "Murphy's law" — typically stated as:
"Anything that can go wrong will go wrong," and sometimes extended as "...and at the worst possible time' — is a form of confirmation bias whereby folks search for, interpret, favor, and recall evidence that confirms their already-formed mindset that things will go wrong and ignore that which does not.


Dentists Are Getting High-Tech



The standard method for dental restorations with a crown involves having a big ol' tray of goop jammed into the patient's mouth to produce an impression, and then waiting weeks for a dental lab to create the new gold or porcelain crown. Now, new technology can complete the entire process in about 4 hours without having to chomp down on a giant gob o' goop.

When the traditional process reaches the point of creating an impression, the new high-tech method (Computer Aided Design or CAD) produces a 3D scan of the patient's mouth. Then Computer Aided Manufacturing (CAM) uses a computer-controlled milling machine to carve the new crown from a porcelain block. The new crown is than polished on a separate machine. Even dentists that don't have the CAM components are using the CAD component and sending the digital 3D image to a dental lab that completes the CAM.







*Cognitive Biases for July


This month's cognitive biases are caused by errors in how much folks understand others and are understood by others.

The *illusion of transparency* is a cognitive bias that materializes when folks *overestimate* how much their mental states are known by others. Another manifestation of the illusion *of transparency*, is the *observer's illusion of transparency*, a cognitive bias reflecting the tendency for people to overestimate how well they understand the personal mental states of others. Another form of the *illusion of transparency* is the *illusion of asymmetric insight*, a cognitive bias that emerges when folks conclude that their knowledge of others is greater than other folk's knowledge of them. The *illusion of asymmetric insight* has been traced to the tendency of folks to view their own spontaneous or off-the-cuff responses to others' questions as relatively unrevealing even though they view other folks' similar responses as meaningful.

The *illusion of transparency* is often seen in public speakers. It may be increased by the *spotlight effect* – a cognitive bias or psychological phenomenon that emerges when folks believe they are being noticed more than they actually are. The cause of the *spotlight effect* is the innate tendency to forget that, although folks are the center of their own worlds, they not the center of everyone else's.

The mirror image of the *illusion of transparency*, is the *curse of knowledge* (or *curse of expertise*), a cognitive bias that occurs when folks are communicating with others and they assume the others have the background knowledge to understand.

Research has empirically shown that such drastic over- estimation of one's effect on others is widely common. Many professionals in social psychology encourage people to be conscious of the spotlight effect (see cartoon on p. 16) and to allow this phenomenon to moderate the extent to which folks believe they are in a social spotlight. In social psychology, the fundamental attribution error (also known as correspondence bias or attribution effects) is a cognitive bias where observers underemphasize the effect of situational and environmental factors on a person's behavior while overemphasizing the effect of a person's disposition or personality factors. A related cognitive bias is the *illusion of external agency* — the false belief that good and positive things happen because of external influences rather than personal effort. The extrinsic incentive error is a cognitive bias (or attributional bias) that occurs when folks attribute relatively more to "extrinsic incentives" (such as monetary reward) than to "intrinsic incentives" (such as learning a new skill) when weighing the motives of others but not than themselves. It is a counter-example to the fundamental attribution error as according to the extrinsic incentive error others are presumed to have situational motivations while oneself is seen as having dispositional motivations. This is the opposite of what the fundamental attribution error would predict. It also might help to explain the **backfire effect**, a cognitive bias that occurs when extrinsic incentives are attached to activities that people are 16 intrinsically motivated to do.



Me & My Car: 1927 Ford Model T 'meant to be' Fremont man's Owner who found vehicle at Good Guys Car Show, paid \$20K for it cites reasons why



I think it would be fair to say that the Ford Model T was the most successful car ever. Ford Motor Co. sold the almost completely unchanged Model T from 1908 through 1927, but it wasn't the first "modern" car built.

That honor goes to German Karl Benz in 1885, and the first "modern" American car was made by Charles and Frank Duryea, of Springfield, Massachusetts in 1893. As a side note, the first electric vehicle, which was more of an electrified wagon, was made in about 1890 by a chemist from Des Moines, Iowa.

In those early days, a good way to get attention was through publicity stunts, and Henry Ford was a master at capitalizing on events featuring the Model T. In 1911, a Ford dealer in

Scotland challenged his son to drive a Model T to the top of the highest mountain in the British Isles at 4,411 feet. If he accomplished that, he would receive his allowance, but if not, no allowance.

The son was successful (or I wouldn't be telling you this story), was greeted by a cheering crowd, and drove the Model T back to his father's dealership. After that event, Ford Motor Co. sold more than 14,000 Model T cars in the United Kingdom, and Henry Ford didn't think more publicity stunts were necessary to sell his cars.

The Model T was truly the car that changed the world, but it wasn't the first "production" car in the country either. That distinction belongs to the 1901 Oldsmobile Curve Dash. It's said that Henry Ford didn't create any of the methods used in the manufacturing of the Model T but saw what others didn't see in other industries to produce consistent parts routinely for assembly line production. This meant that assembly line workers didn't need to be skilled laborers.

One of Ford's famous quotes is that customers could get any color car they wanted "as long as it's black." It turns out it's not the color of the paint per se that's important, it's the speed at which the paint dries, and black dried faster than other colors.

The first Model T that went on sale in October 1908 sold for \$850. Ford wanted to not only build cars efficiently but price them as low as possible so the common man could afford one. By the time this issue's featured car was built in 1927, the last year for the Model T, one could buy a new Model T for as little as \$260.

This issue's car doesn't look much like the Model T that Henry Ford sold for \$260. Ford enthusiast Don Rose, of Fremont, bought it in 2017and, this is his third classic Ford vehicle. When he bought the car, it looked pretty much like it does today, but like many classic car purchases, there were some surprises.

"The tires were dry-rotted, so the first thing I did was put new wheels and tires on it," Rose said. "The starter went out, the headlights were pitted and the high beams didn't work, so I ordered new headlamps for it. I put a new exhaust system on it (to quiet it down). But otherwise, it just been mostly routine maintenance."

Looking at this Model T, many would call it a "hot rod," but it's really more of a "street rod" with most of the creature comforts of modern cars. Henry Ford would probably turn over in his grave if he knew his inline four-cylinder, 20-horsepower engine has been replaced with a Chevy 283-cubic-inch, 220-horsepower V8 engine with a matching Chevy 350 three-speed automatic transmission.

It has a tilt steering wheel but doesn't have or need power steering, as the car only weighs 2,200 pounds. It does have power brakes with disc in front and drum in the rear. It also has air conditioning, and with the small interior it cools down in a hurry. It's a two-seater with very comfortable bucket seats. Rose found his Model T at a Good Guys Car Show at the Alameda County Fairgrounds and paid \$20,000 for it.

"To me it seems like it was meant to be for several reasons," he said. "One, my brother had one. Two, it's 1927 and my lucky number is '7.' And three, it was in my price range. Also, a previous owner etched roses in the glass and my last name is Rose."

He brought the car home that day and has loved it ever since. Rose isn't too interested in displaying his car at auto shows, but it is a head-turner. He gets his enjoyment from driving the car locally and watching people's reaction to this bright yellow machine and getting a lot of thumbs-up signs. As of this writing, he has no plans to sell and claims he isn't lusting for anything else.

When the guitar case was opened, he exclaimed "You have got to be shitting me." Then added, "Do you know what this thing is worth?". I responded that I thought maybe \$5K. His response was— "Five figures". He refused to put on new strings and sold me another good guitar for my son at his cost. I agreed, and a few more years went by.

The guitar remained in the closet, but the 1994 Jeep Grand Cherokee was falling apart. My wife suggested that maybe it was time to sell the guitar for at least a down payment. I have another friend, Keith Hatscheck that was a old rock and roll musician. Keith suggested that I take the guitar to Gryphon Music in Palo Alto.

The rest is pretty much history. I did sell the 1938 Martin dreadnaught guitar. Gryphon got \$40,000. I got about \$30,000 and we had more than enough to almost pay for our new 2008 Lexus RX400h.

SIR Walk, Mission San Jose, a History Lesson

Life is like a SIR Walk, you never know what you are find out next. First of all, this one-hour walk lasted almost three hours, and I heard no complaints. Admittedly I was glad to sit down afterwards. Led by Barbara and Patricia, our group of eight drank in the history of the area even though we may have had a bit of history overload – so much history in a roughly square mile of land. Just the number of buildings moved from one place to another took us by surprise. Some buildings moved more than once!

Then there was the big earthquake of 1868 – it did in the Mission that had stood since the late 1790s. Oh, the olive trees, planted by the Spanish missionaries for shade on the Royal Road, still standing, still producing olives for making olive oil. And then, the vineyards! The Palmdale Winery. About 15 other wineries in all! At one time in the late 1800s, grapes were the main money producing crop in this area - before Napa. Take that, Napa!

The buildings in the area: McIvor Hardware, both stores and the blacksmith shop. Olive Hyde's property and buildings. The Gallegos house – moved how many times? And where is it now? Ohlone College buildings, decorated light poles and the apricot orchard. And grade schools, at least three. The Fig Tree Gas Station – in continuous operation since 1926. And why do we have Mill Creek? Yes, there was a flour mill there.

Flora and fauna: Wild turkeys, ground squirrels, Acorn woodpecker, the trees mentioned above, Prickly poppy, and a forest of California tree poppies – and so much more.

The Mission San Jose since 1797, the 14th mission in Spanish controlled California – It's still here, it was one of the most productive of all the missions – and what a rich history it has all by itself. One of the highlights of our tour was a visit to the Mater Dei Shrine built in 1922, newly refurbished inside, cleaned, repainted and applied with gold leaf where appropriate.

All in all, a great tour! Thank you, Patricia and Barbara.






We were preparing to run our first of three Sweepers for the season. We had 21 bowlers competing for over \$500 in prize money.

NASCAR/INDY CAR Report by Barrie Lee

May 28th

The 107th Indianapolis 500 was held this morning with 33 cars entered. I gave my thoughts to two of my friends during the days ahead of the race. I said to keep an eye on both the Chip Ganassi Racing Team and the Arrow McLaren team. Both teams had four cars entered and I felt they looked the best going into the 500. I wasn't surprised to see Rinus VeeKay up front during the race since Ed Carpenter Racing ran 3 cars and they are normally very good. I was very surprised to see Santino Ferrucci running so well for A.J.Foyt Enterprises in his famous #14 Chevrolet/Dalara. Foyt hasn't fared well in Indy Racing for over 22 years. But I also mentioned my old team, Team Penske, could play a part in the final results. Coverage of the race started at 8:00 AM local time and the race itself got underway around 9:40 AM. Ganassi Racing's Alex Palou (10) started from the pole with Marcus Ericsson (8) Scott Dixon (9) and Takuma Sato (11) all running well during much of the race. Arrow McLarens Pato O'Ward (5) Alexander Rossi (7) and crowd favorite Tony Kanaan (66) ran verywell also but Felix Rosenqvist (6) was the star of the team today. Unfortunately, several of the cars from both teams were taken out by racing accidents, both on the track and in the pits. The real meat of the event took place later in the race and for Josef Newgarden (2) to best the Team Penske effort with Will Power (12) and Scot McLaughlin (3) on board, Josef climbed from starting 17th to out last Marcus Ericsson at the end to take his first Indy 500. In comments made by Ericsson after the race he showed his immaturity by complaining that IndyCar should have thrown the yellow and allowed him to win. NO ONE wanted to see the race end with 2 laps left and run under a yellow flag. I'm personally overly excited about the race results and extremely happy to see the Captain, Roger Penske, win his 19th race at the brickyard. I've never been involved with something that has meant so much to me as crewing at the Indy 500 for three years. One year for Gary Bettenhausen and two for Tom Sneva. Indy racing moves to Detroit, MI next weekend to run the streets of Detroit instead of racing on Bell Isle, which sits in the middle of the river running through the Detroit area.

The Coca Cola 600 just finished on this beautiful Memorial Day, I can honestly say that this was one of the best Coke 600s I've ever seen. William Byron driving the #24 Chevy for RHM was really fast and even his teammate, Kyle Larson caught up to him near the end to try and win it for Mr. Hendricks. I have total respect for Mr. Hendricks and I like most of his drivers. But today's race at Charlotte Motor Speedway allowed several drivers to show their stuff. Denny Hamlin took 1st place today for being a total A Hole. All three car companies were leading or around the front today. But, what do you know? Roger Penske has never won both the Indy 500 and the Coke 600 in the same year. Ryan Blaney, who is genuinely liked by everyone, won his first race of the year and it's been a drought for 59 races in a row. He gave the captain this newly bestowed honor and it brought tears to my eyes. Roger has been in racing for well over 60 years and has raced in NASCAR & IndyCar for more than 50 years. He's won 19 Indy 500s with men that have become legends in the sport. Al Unser, Sr. won his fourth Indy 500 driving for Roger. Rick Mears won four Indys for the captain. Helio won three of his four titles driving for Roger. The first winner of Indy for Roger became a good friend of mine before he was killed driving for Roger in Formula One. Mark Donohue won the Indy 500 in 1972 and should have won in 1971 but was sidelined with only 20 laps remaining. I'm sorry if I sound too much like a cheerleader for these racing series, but it's my passion in life and if you'd ever experienced what I've been allowed to see within the sport, you would understand what I mean. I truly thank all of you for reading my racing reports since I feel like an ambassador for the sport. and Thank You!

The IndyCar race in the streets of Detroit today was fantastic. Alex Palou in the #10 Chip Ganassi car was without a doubt the fastest. But Team Penske held their own with Will Power (12) finishing second and both Newgarden (2) and McLaughlin (3) finishing in the top ten. Arrow McLaren ran well and both Rossi (7) and Rosenqvist (6) traded positions several times and were banging each other in doing so. Pato O'Ward (5) ran into a wall and was out. Ganassi drivers did well also. Great race.

Today's coverage of the Sonoma race is the last race of the year shown on Fox Sports. We take a week off and then NBC covers the last half of the season. 

Don't forget wine tasting at Jamestown's wine-tasting rooms.









■ Real Reason For Costco Receipt Checker at Exit Door:

If shoppers have one complaint about Costco-the vast discount warehouse chain with a notoriously permissive return policy and speedy checkout lanesit's that the employees posted at the exits to take a marker to customers' receipts seem vaguely insulting. Is the premise that everyone is a shoplifter until proven otherwise?



Not exactly. A 2018 rundown of Costco's policy points out that the true motivation of these exit-door sentries isn't to identify potential thieves. It's to make sure that Costco isn't picking the pockets of its customers.

According to employees who have made not-for-attribution comments, Costco is examining receipts to make sure a shopper hasn't been overcharged for their purchases. Someone with three giant bundles of toilet paper in their cart, for example, might have been charged for four. By giving the receipt a cursory glance, the employee can make sure a cashier didn't inadvertently ring up phantom crates of canned tuna.

Of course, if someone did try to wheel out several big screen televisions without a receipt, the exit door employee would likely make an issue of it. But they're not in loss prevention, and the measure isn't intended to deter thieves. If you do have something in your cart you didn't pay for, their immediate assumption is that the mistake is almost certainly the result of a cashier not properly scanning the item.

In fact, hardly any criminals are caught at the door-which isn't to say the store isn't immune to theft. Earlier in 2018, thieves at a Seattle Costco were busted with armloads of laptops after they barged out of the back entrance. Later, in June, a Costco in Alpharetta, Georgia, was victimized by burglars who smashed the jewelry case at night and made off with \$10,000 worth of valuables.

■ Melatonin And Sleep: 6 things to know - More than a third of adults say they don't get enough sleep. And sleep problems, or so-called "coronasomnia," are one of the lasting effects of the pandemic,2

In a quest for shut eye, more and more people are turning to melatonin. Between 1999 and 2018, the use of melatonin supplements by adults in the United States quintupled. Whether you're curious about melatonin or have already added it to your nightly routine, there are important things to know. Anupamjeet K. Sekhon, MD, a sleep medicine doctor at Kaiser Permanente's Sleep Center in Fontana, California, answers 6 common questions about melatonin supplements.

Melatonin is a hormone made by our brains. It regulates a person's circadian rhythm, the internal clock that tells the body when to sleep and wake. Melatonin isn't produced during daylight hours. But as the sunsets, light dims, and a person's usual bedtime approaches, their brain begins to make melatonin. As melatonin levels rise, levels of the stress hormone cortisol fall, and breathing slows. This tells the body that it's time to wind down and prepare for sleep. Synthetic melatonin (OTC) is available without a prescription in gummies, pills, liquids, or patches.

Melatonin supplements are not sleeping pills. While melatonin may make you feel drowsy, it doesn't have the same effect as pre-scription sleep medication. "Melatonin supplements tell our body that it's time to sleep, but they can't put us to sleep," says Dr. Sekhon. And because the production of melatonin depends on the time of day and your internal clock, its effect depends on when you take it. So, a dose of melatonin in the middle of the day isn't a fast track to an afternoon nap.

Should you consider using melatonin? According to Dr. Sekhon, melatonin works best for 2 sleep problems: Jet lag: When a person travels, they can have trouble falling asleep because their internal clock is out of sync with the local time zone.

Delayed sleep phase disorder: People with this sleep problem fall asleep 2 hours after conventional bedtimes, usually after midnight. This makes it hard for them to wake up early. "In both of these cases, melatonin taken 2 hours before a desired bedtime can help people adjust their sleep cycles," says Dr. Sekhon.

Is melatonin safe? More research is needed to know the effects of long-term melatonin use. But short-term use seems to be safe. Melatonin isn't addictive, but it may interact with certain medications. So talk to your doctor to learn if melatonin is right for you, especially if you're pregnant or breastfeeding.

Although melatonin has fewer side effects than prescription sleep aids, people who take it may have: Headaches, Nausea, Daytime drowsiness, Nightmares and Vivid dreams. In addition to those side effects, Dr. Sekhon says children may also experience agitation and bedwetting.

Keep in mind that because melatonin is a supplement, it's not as strictly regulated by the FDA as other medications. To choose the right brand of melatonin, Dr. Sekhon recommends looking for the Good Manufacturing Practice (GMP) or Good Laboratory Practice (GLP) logos on labels. You can also look for the United States Pharmacopeia (USP) verified mark.

What's the right dose for melatonin? To learn how much melatonin to take, Dr. Sekhon says it's best to ask your doctor. But in general, she recommends a less-is-more approach. She suggests that adults start with a dose of 1 to 3 milligrams. For children, she recommends starting at 1 milligram and never using more than 5 milligrams without consulting your doctor.

Are there alternatives to melatonin? Creating an evening self-care ritual can help your body wind down and transition to sleep. You can include things like: A warm bath or shower, Meditation, Yoga, Journaling, breathing exercises, Limiting screen time, etc.

Melatonin can't fix underlying conditions that affect your sleep, such as insomnia or anxiety. Those conditions may need treatments like therapy rather than melatonin or another sleep aid. That's another reason to see your doctor if you're having sleep problems regularly, even if you're seeing some benefit with melatonin.

"If the behavior surrounding melatonin use is not improved, it will eventually stop working," says Dr. Sekhon. Source: Kaiser Permanente, March 24, 2023

Never Place Your Luggage on the Bed to Load and Unload: Please Don't Put Your Suitcase on the Bed, ever. The real reason there's a luggage rack in your hotel room - Your suitcase may look clean, but think of all the sidewalks, bathroom floors, and baggage carousels it's touched during your travels. For years, I had the same packing routine: Pull my hard-shell roller suitcase from under my bed, toss it on my bed, and fill it with clothes. Once I checked into my hotel or Airbnb, unless a luggage rack had been set up somewhere convenient, I'd throw my luggage onto the bed again and pull out the things I needed for the night before chucking it all on the floor. But that all changed last winter.

After Netflix released **Tidying Up with Marie Kondo**, we tapped the organizing expert for her packing tips. At the end of the interview, Kondo said whenever she returns from a trip she unpacks immediately and wipes the wheels of her suitcase before returning her luggage to her closet. As I read those words, my mind spun. While I've tried (and failed) to unpack as soon as I get home, I have never wiped down the wheels of my luggage. I immediately thought of all the places my suitcase had been since I bought it three years ago. Its wheels have touched New York City and New Orleans sidewalks, rolled across London Tube platforms, and been dragged into countless airport bathroom stalls. It wasn't like I was rolling it through mud and toxic sludge, but when I finally cleaned my suitcase with Clorox wipes, I was appalled. It took about two or three wipes each to get all the dirt, gunk, and unseen germs off of four little wheels.

Why didn't anyone warn us? I'm certainly not the only one throwing my suitcase on a bed. A recent search for "packing suitcase" on a stock photo site delivered nearly 38,000 results. Of the roughly 100 images on the first page of results, 31 photos depicted travelers, businessmen, young women, families, and elderly couples alike-packing a suitcase on top of a bed. Only 11 photos showed people—including one pregnant woman-packing a bag on the floor.

This is why you should always use the luggage rack in your hotel room. It's unclear exactly when they were invented, but they likely became popular in the late 19th century, when travelers started carrying hand-held suitcases rather than hefty trunks. Until wheeled luggage was invented in the 1970s, porters typically handled suitcases, ferrying them from point A to B. What once was a handy way to access your clothing without having to sit on the floor-or completely unpack your bag into a hotel room dresser- is also now the best way to keep your germy bag away from the place you're sleeping. And as bedbugs become more of a global issue, keeping your suitcase on a luggage rack reduces your risk of encountering those little life ruiners. If you've ever wondered why that little bed scarf some hotels use at the end of the bed exists - just think of how many people unpack their bags on the beds.

■ Miscellaneous Home Hacks to Improve Your Life Around the House:

- Place ground meat or other loose or pliable foods in Ziploc bags and flatten to create as much surface area for faster freezing/ thawing.
- Increase the capacity of your microwave oven by simply using a mason jar or other glass pieces of kitchenware; you can prop up a second container of food in your microwave. You will likely need to increase your cooking time to account for the extra food load.
- 3. Dripless oil transfer. You can funnel oil directly into your engine via a screwdriver to prevent spills. All you have to do is gently tilt the screwdriver toward the opening of your engine. Carefully put your oil container against the Screwdriver shaft and let the oil drip down the length of the tool until it enters the engine. Repeat until you are done.
- 4. A plastic pant/skirt hanger makes an excellent holder for quick reference to sheeted recipes or thin, lightweight cookbooks. These are the inexpensive hangers found in all

clothing stores. They consist of a plastic horizontal piece with two short vertically oriented spring clamps much like old fashioned clothes pins and a metal hook in the center. Simply clamp your recipe/lightweight cookbook and hand on it on the knob of a any handy knob/handle of your kitchen cabinets. This same technique can be used out in the garage when referring to instructions or manuals when repairing or assembling equipment or other mechanical items.

5. Rigid plastic cases are the bane of parents around the world, especially when Christmas rolls around. If you want to avoid getting cut while opening this rigid plastic, Try using your handy kitchen can opener. Rigid plastic packages can be opened by simply treating them as a piece of metal with your can opener. Line up the can opener along the edge, ensure a tight grip, and then proceed to spin the tool to begin cutting. You'll be amazed at how easy these packages are to open now!

■ Method Foaming Hand Soap: This is an excellent hand soap for a number of reasons. This brand of Liquid Foaming soap is eco-friendly for the following reasons.

Foaming hand wash with plant-based cleansers.

Biodegradable formula made without parabens or phthalates.

Bottle (minus pump) made from 100% recycled plastic (PCR)

Foam is bunch of tiny bubbles created by foaming agents. But you also need water and air to make foam. The true purpose of foam is to provide contact time on a soiled surface to allow the wetting agents, detergents and degreasers enough time to do their jobs. Unlike other liquid soaps, good cleaning quality is not dependent upon the amount of foaming soap used. All that is needed is enough foam to cover the cleaning area before using water for rinsing. The amount of foam has almost no effect on the cleaning ability of the product. Having a lot of foam isn't vital for actually doing the cleaning, it's mostly for aesthetics.

To use this product as a spot cleaner, simply squirt some foam onto a clean towel and lightly scrub the spot you want to remove. Add a bit more foam if it is quickly absorbed by the material you are trying to clean. It will clean both oil and water-based stains. Do not use so much foam that the substrate material actually becomes wet (saturated). You want just damp enough for the surfactant to dissolve the spotting agent. Otherwise, it will take too much time for the spot to dry. When used properly, the apparel is immediately ready to wear. It may take more than one application to do the job.

- Plastic Stretch Wrap: This is an excellent protective wrap for food products. The one negative is trying to determine where the self-adhering wrap ended so that you can open/unwrap your food product. One way is marking the self-sealed spot using a Permanent Marker. Another way is to use a small piece of scrap paper placed at the place where the stretch wrap stops/starts. Place the scrap of paper under the end of the end of the stretch wrap so it can be used like an 'opening tab' on soft, wrapped things that are not contained in a hard container. Sandwiches are a good example of doing this to expedite the unwrapping your food items without damaging the product.

WHY GO? Taking over for the more old-school Chinese restaurant Yat Sing, this recently opened Pleasanton gem follows in the path of a successful new generation of restaurants like Dumpling Time and Dumpling Hours to offer an accessible menu catering to the latest East Bay culinary craze. And while the dumplings particularly the Xiao long Bao are the draw, there are plenty of other temptations to keep you coming back.

WHAT'S THE VIBE LIKE? Tucked into a nondescript shopping center off Sunol Boulevard, Mom Dumpling inherits some of its predecessor's decor - an office-building-style drop ceiling, a standard-issue checkerboard tile floor. But a new coat of paint and attractive wood booth seating do enough to make it a pleasant dining experience.

WHAT TO ORDER? The Xiao Long Bao are a must. The thin wrapper is delicate, but sturdy enough to contain the deliciously soupy, loosely packed pork interior payoff that's made this Chinese dim sum specialty a worldwide sensation. Options include standard pork, crab and pork, shrimp and pork, veggie pork, and spicy pork, while the pan-fried house special provides a similar experience with a heartier shell and pan-crisped bottom. Other offshoots include Pork Bao Buns, steamed meat and veggie dumplings, and pan-fried pot stickers topped by a cornstarch crisp. Don't sleep on the noodles, either. The restaurant executes a nicely spiced, Braised Brisket Soup and an excellent wonton soup with a rich, balanced broth floating with Bok Choy and ethereal pork dumplings.

ADDED BONUS: Planning for a rainy day? Mom Dumpling sells five types of frozen dumplings to go, in addition to reheatable Pork and Veggie Bao.

HOW MUCH? Coming six to an order, Pork Xiao Long Bao run from \$12 (standard pork) to \$18 (crab and pork). Steamed dumplings range from \$10 to \$15. While noodle soups are a steal with the Braised Brisket the most expensive at \$15. 5400 Sunol Blvd., Ste. 2, Pleasanton, (925) 484-1008, momdumpling.com. Lunch and dinner Wed.-Mon. - Refrigerator Water Filter: Most refrigerator manufacturers recommend changing the water filter every 6 months to ensure good water quality is delivered to the ice maker mechanism and the chilled drinking water spigot. I just ordered 3 filters from [allfilters.com] for our Kenmore Dutch Door Refrigerator at a cost of just \$12.95/each with free shipping. I chose this vendor because their website made it easy for me to find and confirm that they had the correct filter for our refrigerator and included illustrations of how to remove the old filter and install the new one. Previously, I had found them on [Woot.com] for about the same price.
- Upgrade Your Kitchen Range: If you are thinking of remodeling or upgrading the appliances of your current kitchen, consider buying an Induction Range or Cooktop. Induction ranges are much more efficient with less heat loss during the cooking period. On gas ranges, there is a very high loss of heat as the flame (and heat) follows the curvature of the underside of the cooking vessel, especially at the outer edges. Much of the flame/heat is lost as it curls around and up and away from the pot/pan. A similar scenario of heat loss occurs when cooking with conventional electric ranges (both coil element and smooth-top) but to a lesser degree because the vessel bottom and the burner element is in direct contact with the bottom of the vessel. The Induction Stove is the best because there is almost zero heat loss because the induction heating element is in direct contact with the vessel bottom AND the induction method uses a coil to generate heat not in the burner assembly but "electrically excites the iron particles in the bottom of the cooking vessel. The pot/pan gets hot that, in turn, heats the ingredients in the vessel with very little heat loss. Tests of boiling 4 quarts of water using all 3 types of heating technology confirm that the induction units were considerably faster than the other two types. There are two requirements for using Induction units - The vessel bottom must be made of iron or metal alloys with a high iron content. The vessel bottoms must be very flat (for complete contact between the induction burner and the vessel bottom). The induction technology will save energy (costs) as well as faster heating/cooking that should result in saving time.

- Smog Certification: All vehicles in California must pass a smog test periodically and at the time of DMV registration after a sale. The testing is standardized but the price charged by the shops specializing in Smog Certification can and do vary greatly. The range can be as low as \$38.20 (\$29.95 + \$8.25 State Certificate) to a high of \$98.20 (\$79.95 + \$8.25 State Certificate) depending upon who is doing the testing! The key is to call around to the various smog shops and give them the model/make/year of your vehicle and ask for a quote. Be very careful about reading the small print. You will see a lot of ads proclaiming \$39.95 + \$8.25 State Certificate for "2016 & newer passenger cars." But in fine print you may find "2000 & newer light trucks, mini-vans, SUVs, pickups,: \$49.95 + \$8.25 State Cert." The definition of "light truck, SUV, mini-van" suddenly becomes a very pricey sticking point. Because 70%+ of new car sales are now SUVs but may look more like a conventional sedan, the shops tend to use their own definitions. "Crossover" models are another problem. Our 2015 Subaru Outback is classed as a "station wagon" by the manufacturer and is listed that way in earlier issues of Consumer Reports. Yet, in taking it to 3 different smog shop, I was quoted 3 different HIGHER prices even though all these shops told me ON THE PHONE that it would be \$39.95 + \$8.25 AFTER I brought my vehicle in for testing. This is clearly a problem of "BUYER BEWARE."
- Onion Skin Removal: Before chopping white or yellow onions for an ingredient in various dishes, you must first remove the thin, dried, 'skin' of the onion. This can be difficult. To make the job easier, try using a fork with sharp tines to "scrape" this outer layer off or at least loosen this filmy layer and use your fingers to grasp enough of it to pull it off to discard. Don't try to pierce or stab the skin. Scrape it off by holding the fork upside-down so the tines are in a 'trailing' attitude.
- Eat Messy Snacks and Keep Your Fingers Clean: We like to eat Skinny Pops and other popcorn varieties with butter or some other flavored sprinkling or coating while watching TV, reading the newspaper/books/periodicals, etc. These are all messy when using your bare hands. Our solution to keeping our fingers clean was to use Finger Chopsticks or Snack Chopsticks. See them at Amazon: https://tinyurl.com/2s4jks8m. You may find them both interesting and fun to use. But, above all, you will be able to pick up small pieces of messy food easily and deftly after just a minute or two of practice! You won't lose the use of your hands while using these. You can still use your clean fingers to turn pages, use your Smartphone or even use your touch screen devices. Four of these handy little devices only cost \$6.20! If you are a Prime Member, shipping is free. Note: An alternative is to use conventional tweezers but it's a big bother to put them down and pick them back up before and after each piece of snack eaten!

■ Cleaning Plastic and Other Man-made Materials Cutting/ Chopping Boards: The easiest and best way to thoroughly clean this type of cutting board is to put it in the dishwasher along with your other dirty dishes and pots/pans (no aluminum items). Stains will disappear completely. Fine food particles will be washed/ flushed out of the many fine grooves made by the constant use of sharp knife blades. You'll be surprised by now

pristinely clean your cutting boards will be after washing.

DealDash.com - Scam or Not: You've seen the ads on TV promoting this website as a place where you can 'bid' on things that are for sale that they say are sold at ridiculously low prices! While the ad makes sound like a great way to shop for super low prices, here's what Consumer Reports says! Business model: DealDash, like other auction sites, has been described as a gamified approach to e-commerce. To participate, registered bidders first buy "bids" priced at \$0.60 each, that they may spend bidding on auctions. Standard auctions begin with an opening price of \$0.00, with every bid placed increasing the price by \$0.01 and removing one paid "bid credit" from the user's balance. Bidders may choose to place single bids, by manually clicking the bid button, or through an automatic bidding tool called the "BidBuddy". An auction clock restarts from a maximum of 10-30 seconds, depending on the auction, every time a bid is placed. If no new bids are placed before the clock runs out, the last and highest bidder is declared the winner of the auction. Criticism: DealDash has been criticized for offering poor value to customers and for making disclosures only in fine print.

Penny auction sites, including DealDash specifically, have often been criticized for failing to disclose or include the cost of bids in what customers actually spend in total to win a product. In a conventional auction, bids are based on prices that participants are willing to pay, with the item sold to the final bidder within a set period that bids the highest price. This usually allocates the item to the person who is willing to pay the most. By contrast, penny auctions award items to parties that are persistent or lucky enough to place the final bid, with money raised primarily from the cost of bidding rather than the final price of the item. In most cases, users spend substantial sums of money without winning anything. DealDash and others have been compared to gambling by consumer

groups.

According to <u>Consumer Reports</u>, the "buy it now" prices can be significantly higher than the same products on Amazon.com. Unsuccessful bidders not using the option lose the value of the bids placed. A company spokesperson says DealDash generates significant business from bidders who choose to buy items after losing, with hundreds of orders processed

daily.

Consumer Reports also reported that many "luxury" brands touted on Deal Dash are non-existent beyond the website and their trademarks are registered by the owner of DealDash, through another company that he is associated with, namely Galton Voysey. Consumer organization Truth in Advertising reported that a DealDash television commercial shows "Roseanna" winning a \$349 KitchenAid stand mixer for "less than \$25". Small print explains she bid 761 times on that mixer, which cost her over \$456, plus the \$25" price" she won it for. This means she paid closer to \$481 - well over the stated \$349 retail price. Both Truth in Advertising and Consumer Reports noted that DealDash's own terms of service tell users that they are likely to spend more than the retail cost for products and are unlikely to save money using the site. Due to this - and to the allegedly premium products on offer being generic items manufactured by companies with links to Wolfram - DealDash faced a false-advertising class-action lawsuit in 2017. Eight months later, the lawsuit was dismissed.

■ Beware of DoorDash Scams - The demand for food delivery services like DoorDash has surged. Apps offering meals delivered straight to your door are convenient and give you a great selection. But considering how much sensitive data these apps collect from users, how safe are they? A DoorDash data breach highlights how much personal information is stored by these services, so what scams do you need to look out for? In a 2019 blog post, DoorDash warned users of a data leak that happened on May 4, 2019. The breach affected approximately 4.9 million consumers, Dashers, and merchants who joined the platform on or before April 5, 2018.

Among the sensitive data accessed by the "unauthorized third party" were people's names, email addresses, delivery addresses, order history, phone numbers, plus passwords. The leak also compromised some customers' credit card details and digits associated with the account numbers of some merchants. Approximately 100,000 Dashers' driver's license

numbers were further exposed by the breach.

While DoorDash claims that credit card and bank account details that were stolen were not enough to make fraudulent charges, other Personally Identifiable Information (PII) was leaked. There's a huge chance that hackers have been peddling your account

information for years.

The type of information exposed during the leak may put you at risk of becoming a victim of identity theft. Your information could be used to commit fraud and other crimes. It may also expose you to an attack called credential stuffing, during which your account information from one leak is used to access your other accounts. On the dark web, DoorDash accounts with attached credit card details are reportedly sold for \$4.49 each. While amateur hackers use these accounts just to order free food, some use the information in these accounts for targeted phishing campaigns, vishing, and smishing. These phishing campaigns are used to infiltrate a system or infect devices and networks with ransomware. Here are five scams you need to watch out for that can stem from DoorDash hacks.

- DoorDash Smishing Scams DoorDash says that the leak exposed only the last four digits of consumer payment cards, and the last four digits of account numbers for merchant and Dasher accounts. But since it exposed many other sensitive data like phone numbers and addresses, users should watch out for scams meant to collect their full financial account details.
- Some users in forums have reported receiving smishing texts from hackers pretending to be from DoorDash. The message details of a food order you supposedly placed, with a link that claims should help you verify your account information.
- that claims should help you verify your account information.
 You may also be told to confirm this delivery so if you didn't order anything through the app, you'd be compelled to click the link to cancel it. The link will lead to a pharming site that will collect your credit card information.
- DoorDash Email Survey Scam Nothing is quite as luring for customers of delivery services as the promise of a huge discount on future orders. Beware of phishing emails with this kind of MO.
- The email survey scam will ask you to answer a survey and in exchange for your time, they'll promise a discount to be applied to your next DoorDash order. Offers for another delivery service like UberEats might be included too. You'll be asked to log into your account. Except this isn't really from the food delivery company. The site they lead you to might look legitimate, but this one's controlled by a hacker. Any information you enter will be harvested.
- 3. DoorDash Delivery Scam Here's a more sinister and dangerous scam that involves a fake DoorDash delivery at your door. <u>A woman in Ohio</u> reported a suspicious group who came to her house for a DoorDash delivery. One individual claimed to have her order. The

homeowner didn't buy anything from DoorDash though. This should've been a simple case of a delivery worker at the wrong address, except the female "Dasher" didn't come alone. Through the homeowner's security camera, she saw two other men coming up to her yard. They were carrying something in their hands. The owner then heard the men say "hide, hide" and "I'm supposed to cover you". This naturally prompted her to call 911. Remember, the 2019 leak exposed PII including delivery addresses. So criminals know that you use DoorDash, which name is associated with the account, and where that person lives.

4. DoorDash Scams Targeting Delivery Workers - Even people trying to make an honest buck through the gig economy are being targeted by scammers. Numerous Dashers have reported getting scammed out of their DoorDash earnings. Scammers use a phone cloaking tool to make their number appear like that from DoorDash. They then inform the Dasher of another device trying to access their accounts. The caller will then ask for the PIN and login information to supposedly "verify" his identity. In a few days, the Dasher will realize that he or she didn't get paid for all the deliveries. The hacker has managed to change the banking details in the DoorDash account so the Dasher's earnings were deposited into the fraudster's account instead.

5. DoorDash Scams Targeting Merchants: Cyber Shoplifting -Chargebacks were put in place to protect consumers. This has been most useful for unauthorized purchases after a credit card had been stolen. A consumer can simply call the bank to reverse the charges from the disputed credit card purchase. But there has been an increasing number of fraudsters who are exploiting chargebacks meant to protect consumers. In fact, according to reports, up to 86% of chargebacks are fraudulent. Have You Ever Noticed Costco Doesn't Play Music?

If you're a regular Costco shopper, you may (or may not) have noticed that there's something missing from the experience. We're not talking about any shortage of products, nor are we at all critical of the range of items it offers — Costco can be the one-stop-shop that literally takes you from cradle to grave as it sells both cribs and caskets (as well as just about everything else you'll need en route from one to the other). No, we're talking about the lack of golden oldies, easy listening, top 40 hits, or any other aural candy. Apart from the soundtrack provided by your fellow shoppers, all you'll hear at Costco is the sounds of silence, but we don't mean the Simon and Garfunkel hit of the same name.

One Redditor started a thread in r/Costco about this topic a few years back, declaring that they switched from Sam's to Costco for this very reason. The Sam's they shopped at suddenly started playing music, but they preferred what they called a "peaceful shopping environment." Several Costco employees noted that the stores actually had a policy that no music was to be played other than in the electronics section where it might be necessary to demonstrate the properties of the sound systems on sale. One of the workers speculated that Costco's lack of music was actually meant to encapsulate the chain's "no frills" approach to retail.

While none of the Costco employees on the Reddit thread seemed to know for sure why the stores eschew music, a behavioral and marketing psychologist named Elliott Jaffa has his own theory (via The Christian Science Monitor). He believes that the lack of a soundtrack makes Costco shoppers feel almost as if time is standing still, which, in turn, keeps them in the store longer so they spend more money. Another reason might be because no music means no fees to pay to the music provider, which is why discount grocery chain Aldi, too, favors the silent store approach.

One side benefit of no in-store music means that Costco (and Aldi, as well) becomes a quiet haven for Christmas-weary consumers when the holiday season rolls around. While shoppers at grocery stores and other retailers may be bombarded with seasonal music from early November up through New Year's Day, Costco members need fear no unwanted encounters of the holly jolly kind. Instead, they can be reasonably sure that they won't be serenaded by Mariah Carey's bellowing while they enjoy their food court feast in heavenly peace.
