# Researchers Develop Pill That Can Be 'Driven' Around the GI Tract



A team of researchers at George Washington University has developed an ingestible pill camera that can be "driven" around the gastrointestinal (GI) tract. The device is the first of its kind to offer real-time internal visibility that can be controlled, rather than relying on digestive processes to move the camera around.

More than 7 million Americans require an endoscopy every year. The procedure conventionally involves a long, flexible tube inserted via the patient's throat while under anesthesia. This is an expensive, invasive task involving surgical facilities and multiple medical professionals. "Capsule endoscopies" involving ingestible cameras make the procedure a little easier: Patients don't have to go under anesthesia and can instead go

about their day after swallowing the pill. Still, doctors must rely on GI motility, or the body's natural digestive process, to move the pill around.

George Washington University's magnetically controlled capsule endoscopy (MCCE) device could change that. Made in collaboration with AnX Robotica, a medical technology company, NaviCam consists of a 27-millimeter capsule that houses a tiny 640x480p camera. Once a patient swallows NaviCam, they lie on a special examination bed with a large magnetic head. The patient's doctor uses a pair of joysticks at a control console to generate a magnetic field that moves the capsule

along a 5D plane (3D linear motion and 2D rotation motion). The camera meanwhile captures continuous video and still frames within a 160-degree field of view. When the procedure is over, NaviCam can pass through the patient's digestive tract like a typical endoscopy capsule.

In a <u>study</u> published in iGIE, a doctor directed NaviCam to all major stomach problem sites in 40 patients with a 95% accuracy rate. The patients received conventional endoscopies later; 80% of the group stated they preferred the NaviCam method to the conventional one.

NaviCam is similar to a digestible device <u>developed</u> by MIT and the California Institute of Technology earlier this year. While both are externally controlled using a magnetic field, there's a crucial difference between the two: MIT and Caltech's pill doesn't contain a camera. Instead, the strength or weakness of the magnetic field reveals where the pill sits within the body, allowing doctors to measure GI motility non-invasively.

NaviCam appears to incorporate the best of both worlds. Doctors can use the joysticks to direct NaviCam to a specific area of interest, and the process is far less invasive than a conventional endoscopy. This could eventually result in lower procedure fees, shorter wait periods, and an improved patient experience.

What's really interesting about the peninsula is that one of the first rangers at Quarry Lakes made this spit of land his special project. Ranger David Pellarin decided to plant a grove of fruit trees out on the end of the peninsula. He accomplished his plan with the help of many folks, labeling each tree so that folks like SIR walkers would know the names of the trees as they walked by. Not only that, you, as a walker, are encouraged to pick the fruit (in season) and take it home with you – but no bags, just what you can stuff into your pockets.

Well, guys, our goal that Wednesday (May 31, 2023) was just to get in a good morning's walk. And walk we did. You see, once you walk to the end of the peninsula, you gotta walk back to the beginning of it. Let's just say we had a good walk that day.

What did we see besides the lakes and views of Mission Peak in the distance? Lots of spring flowers spread over the length of our walk - Prickly pear cactus, Red valerian (aka Jupiter's beard), Black mustard, Spanish broom, African

senna, Radishes, and a California tree poppy bush among others. But what about the fruit trees? Well, we didn't get a good look at most of them because of the high weeds (did you see that picture of the higher-than-a man's-head thistles?), but I noticed the Cork oak (yeah, they make wine corks out of the bark!) the Red ironbark tree, and various palms. Visit the peninsula in season and gather your citrus as you may. ~Bruce Roberts

# The \$tory of My Guitar

Many important events have taken place in the life of most of us Seniors, but this one was amazing.

My Aunt Eleanor was pretty much a Black Sheep sort of a relative. Somehow, she once acquired a guitar that she gave to her then 2- or 3-year-old nephew—me. Eventually I was coerced into taking guitar lessons within a span of several years, say from age 10 until about

# SIR Walk, Mission San Jose, a History Lesson

Life is like a SIR Walk, you never know what you are find out next. First of all, this one-hour walk lasted almost three hours, and I heard no complaints. Admittedly I was glad to sit down afterwards. Led by Barbara and Patricia, our group of eight drank in the history of the area even though we may have had a bit of history overload – so much history in a roughly square mile of land. Just the number of buildings moved from one place to another took us by surprise. Some buildings moved more than once!

Then there was the big earthquake of 1868 – it did in the Mission that had stood since the late 1790s. Oh, the olive trees, planted by the Spanish missionaries for shade on the Royal Road, still standing, still producing olives for making olive oil. And then, the vineyards! The Palmdale Winery. About 15 other wineries in all! At one time in the late 1800s, grapes were the main money producing crop in this area - before Napa. Take that, Napa!

The buildings in the area: McIvor Hardware, both stores and the blacksmith shop. Olive Hyde's property and buildings. The Gallegos house – moved how many times? And where is it now? Ohlone College buildings, decorated light poles and the apricot orchard. And grade schools, at least three. The Fig Tree Gas Station – in continuous operation since 1926. And why do we have Mill Creek? Yes, there was a flour mill there.

Flora and fauna: Wild turkeys, ground squirrels, Acorn woodpecker, the trees mentioned above, Prickly poppy, and a forest of California tree poppies – and so much more.

The Mission San Jose since 1797, the 14<sup>th</sup> mission in Spanish controlled California – It's still here, it was one of the most productive of all the missions - and what a rich history it has all by itself. One of the highlights of our tour was a visit to the Mater Dei Shrine built in 1922, newly refurbished inside, cleaned, repainted and applied with gold leaf where appropriate.

All in all, a great tour! Thank you, Patricia and Barbara.
