Newark Police Department - Senior Safe



Detective Blair Slavazza was hired as a Police Officer on April 1, 2016. She was raised in Fremont and continued her education at the California State University, Sacramento, where she obtained her Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice and was on the Dean's Honor List for her academic achievements. Detective Slavazza also attended the South Bay

Regional Training Consortium at Evergreen College in San Jose. She graduated on March 31, 2016, and was recognized for being the Most Improved Shooter.

Detective Slavazza successfully organized our department's participation in the Special Olympics Polar Plunge. She got department volunteers (aka Newark P.D. Copsicles) to raise money and brave the cold waters of Santa Cruz in the month of March. This group event raised \$2,110 for Special Olympics.

Detective Slavazza was recognized for her efforts to stop the crime of DUI in our city by Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) in 2019 for her 28 DUI arrests and in 2020 for her 24 DUI arrests.

In 2023, Detective Slavazza was appointed to her current detective assignment. In addition to that, she is a Field Training Officer, Search & Seizure Instructor, SFST (DUI) Instructor, Crowd Management Team Member, and the Police Officer's Association Vice President.




The Pitch for Small Business
