



The LCSs were nicknamed the "Mighty Midgets". You can visit it Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 9:00am to 3:00pm. There is no admission.

You may also want to visit the Vallejo Naval & Historical Museum at 734 Marin Street, which has a lot of displays of navy memorabilia associated with Mare Island and the ships that visited it.

Do you know of interesting places in the area that you have enjoyed, why not let your fellow SIRs know?








We have 40 players signed up and 8 more are interested but not yet paid.



Our Visit to the USS LCS 102 –

Some 20 SIR members and guests enjoyed a visit to the WW2 Landing Ship Support at Mare Island. The LCS 102 vessel saw action in WWII.



We saw how nearly 100 sailors were crammed into this 160-foot ship. These ships did not land material, but rather were specifically designed to give close-in fire support to marines landing on beaches. They had more firepower per foot (including four 40mm, four 20mm, and four 50 Cal guns, and 120 rockets) than any ships, and were nicknamed "mighty midgets".

LCS 102 is the very last of this class and after WWII was transferred to Japan and later to Thailand.

SIR members and guests were shown a video of the history of the LCSs and the transfer ceremony from The Royal Navy of Thailand and subsequent being placed on the deck of a freighter and move 8,000 miles to Mare Island.

Gordon Stutrud is the Executive Officer, and he and two other volunteers graciously answered all questions from our group. The museum ship is maintained by volunteers and supported by the National Association of USS LCS. A good time was had by all.

I was born and raised in Milwaukee. I went to college at the University of Wisconsin Madison and graduated in May of 1969 just in time to get drafted into the Army. Five

months after I got drafted, they started the lottery system. I was hoping that this was not a sign of more bad timing coming my way. But. as I finished my basic and advanced training, my future assignments in the Army came thru and I was going to R.V.N., the Republic of Vietnam. I was in I Corps in Vietnam, Chu Lie, Da Nang, Hai Van Pass and Hue. I really felt like I was on a path of many unenviable hardships. I was not wrong. I got to experience a world that I never would have experienced had it not been for the Army and the Vietnam War. Being in a combat zone pushes hard against your values. Once you cross that line into the unthinkable actions that you are faced with, if you make the wrong decision, you don't forget those actions that you took, ever. The memories stays with you and they are all vours; forever.

When I got out of the Army, I traveled in England and Europe for a year to restart my life. I needed a fresh start, new perspectives and a new beginning. I moved out to California a couple of years later in 1975 and within a couple of months of moving here, I met my future wife. Before we got married, we wound up traveling to India to practice yoga and live in an ashram for four months. India was a transformational time in my life. It helped to create a balance with my life experiences in Vietnam and set me on the course that would shape my life.


We decided to get married as soon as we returned to the states. My wife Rami got a job teaching at Benicia Middle School. It took me longer to find my career path but by 1980, I

owned my own business selling Ergonomic and contract furniture. For the last 20 years I sold performing arts seating found in college lecture halls, concert halls and other similar venues. I retired from the industry in 2016.
