Jackie Boor began her freelance writing career in 1968 as a teen correspondent for two Northern California newspapers. An aspiring screenplay writer, she has worked as a reporter, ghostwriter, and forensic speech and debate coach. Long fascinated by the dynamics of human communication, she has also built a multi-level career as a dispute resolution expert specializing in large group facilitation, problem solving and civic engagement.

She is the co-author of Inside the President's Helicopter: Reflections of a White House Senior Pilot, the memoir of retired US Army master aviator LTC Gene Boyer. Their book chronicles his unprecedented 11-year career as a presidential pilot. He flew for sitting Presidents Johnson, Nixon and Ford, logged some 6,900 flight hours, and commanded nearly 580 missions with either a president or world leader on board, including Anwar Sadat, Willie Brandt and Leonid Brezhnev. A decorated Korean War and Vietnam veteran, LTC Boyer also bunked with John Steinbeck, gave John Wayne a flight lesson and recruited the first and only Africa-American helicopter pilots to fly a U.S. president, one of whom was CW4 Carl Burhanan.
