

ranking the wines was a difficult task. The first and second place wines were virtually tied. However, there was a winner. In fourth place was Iverson Estate 2011 Fair Play (\$28), third place was Stackhouse Napa Valley Cabernet Sauvignon 2018 (\$38), second

place was Daou Reserve 2019 Paso Robles (\$40), and first place winner was Celler Classified 2017 Sonoma Valley (\$30). There was a ringer that was

tossed in to make things interesting. A John Robert Eppler 2010 Howell Mountain from Total Wine and More was spotted on close out for (\$17.95). On Vino this bottle is \$109 if you can find it. It actually ranked above the contested wines. Don't bother to go down to Total Wine and More, because I bought the last two the wines were outstanding and bottles they had.


