In the article, Catherine Pearson explores the challenges many men face in forming deep, meaningful friendships. Pearson discusses the reasons behind this struggle, pointing out that traditional gender roles often discourage men from prioritizing relationships. Men are often expected to be stoic and self-reliant, which can hinder their ability to express their emotions and seek support from others. Additionally, the article highlights the societal pressure on men to prioritize work and career success over personal connections, leaving little time or energy for cultivating friendships.

The article concludes by suggesting ways to overcome these obstacles and foster meaningful connections among men. It encourages men to challenge societal norms, express their emotions authentically and actively seek out opportunities to bond with others. By doing so, men break free from the isolation and unfulfilling relationships that are often associated with the difficulty of making close friends.

We are getting closer to the Branch 95 Club Championship. It will be held in October this year, in place of our past time of September. A number of the courses are plugging the greens in September and I took a chance that the rainy season will hold off and we can complete the Championship rounds in cooler, dry weather.

You can track where you stand on the gualification list on the Branch Everyone can play each round, but only those players website. qualified by playing the minimum number of ten rounds during the season will compete for the Club Championship. Everyone playing during these rounds will follow the same rules, all putts will need to be putted out.

NCGA is increasing their dues for next year. We will also have an increase in our golf dues. A few years ago, I reduced our dues from \$55 to \$50 for the yearly golf dues. Because NCGA is increasing their dues, I am setting the SIR 95 Golf dues back to \$55 for next year. Note that NCGA will send out a renewal reminder in October. Do not renew with them. I will send out a renewal notice. If you want to continue your SIR 95 golf membership, send your payment to me. NCGA will be me for the SIR 95 Golf memberships and I will pay all of the dues at the same time.

To be an active member of our golf group you must also be an active member of SIR Branch 95. That means you need to pay your yearly dues to Branch 95 and also should be able to meet the minimum number of luncheon attendance guidelines, which is 50% (see bottom of page 9 for the full text of State SIR's Member Attendance requirements). I know there may be times when travel or health prevents you from participating as much as you may like, but please try to be as involved as you are able.

The Gold Country Cup and Marksmen of the Year battles are still going and will continue until the end of the season in December. Both of these are in close contention as we move closer to the end of golf for the year.

SIR STATE TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP | Ron Wadsworth



"I Just Can't Generate the Power I could when I was Young!"


The above quote is certain to have been uttered by many of us golfers during a challenging round of golf. And it was something we heard variations of all day when we (left to right: Mark Thompson, Rick Willson, Ron Wadsworth and Chad Barrow) stepped foot on the Alister MacKenzie course at Haggin Oaks last month to represent SIR Branch 95.

This was the sight of the 2023 SIR State Team Championship. 55 teams, consisting of 220 golfers, signed up, requiring two days for all teams to complete one round of scramble format (each player hits a drive and then we each continuously go hit the best of each shot thereafter). As luck

would have it, we drew an 11:36 tee time when the temperatures hit 97 degrees with 40% humidity. So we loaded up with cold liquids and headed off.

I (Ron) assumed we'd have lots of excuses (after all it's golf!), so I brought along the little book "501 Excuses for a Bad Golf Shot", and we chuckled at each hole when reading it. (The title of this article is excuse number 226).

When you start off a scramble tournament one over par after three holes, like we did, it's never a good sign. But this team had grit and perseverance (and lots of excuses at our fingertips!) and we slowly began mixing in some birdies, including on three of the last four holes, to finish with a respectable score of 67. Because the scoring system used in this tournament also used an average of the team handicap for 50% of the weighting, our total net was 58.88, low enough for a top five finish!



All in all the team had a great time, and it's definitely something we'd do again!

2023 SIR STATE INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Are you among the best SIR golfers? SIR State Golf is holding it's 2023 SIR State Individual Championship Thursday, October 5th at The Reserve Golf Club near Stockton. This event will use the same format as in prior years. There will be seven flights established by handicap index. Each flight will compete (Medal Play) to determine the winner of their flight who will then be awarded a commemorative jacket as 2023 Champion of their flight. There will also be a tournament prize fund with prizes awarded for the best net rounds of the day. Entry fee for this tournament is \$80 which includes golf, cart, range balls and prize fund.

People proclaim it as a philosophy of life. But Pink says that is nonsense, even dangerous. Everybody has regrets, they are a fundamental part of our lives, and if we



reckon with them in a fresh manner, we can make smarter decisions, perform better and work and school, and deepen our sense of meaning and purpose.

He describes that regret can be categorized into four types. The table to the left briefly describes them and the human need it reveals. The first one, **Foundation** regret refers to a sturdy foundation of material, physical, and mental well-being-- do the work. The second, **Boldness** regret refers to exploring and growing by pursuing novelty and being bold--taking a risk. The third, **Moral** regret is to be good people--do the right thing. The fourth, **Connection** regret, is based on establishing love--if only we reached out.

I'm glad I read this book. I'll put it into the Book Exchange for our upcoming meeting on Wednesday, October 4. And, remember the benefits of the SIR Branch 95 Book Exchange: no cost, no library cards, no late notices, no fines.
