GET TO KNOW YOUR FELLOW SIR

This article will be an ongoing feature of our SIR Branch 95 Newsletter. We would like to include a member profile in the monthly newsletter as well as have a member speak about themselves at our monthly luncheons. In this way, we will get to better know about 20 members over the course of a year. This month's profile is on Ken Mahar - the "ladder climbing painter" - who was interviewed by Lew Chapman.



Ken was born in 1946 in San Francisco and grew up on the SF Bay Peninsula. He has been a member of SIR Branch 95 since September 2019. Ken relocated to Serrano from San Mateo in 2014. He has served as

Little SIR and is currently leading our weekly bike riding group, Monthly Texas Hold 'em group and participates in several other SIR activities.

Ken has been married to Jessica Disney for 5 years and has two grown children from his first marriage and two grandchildren ages 9 and 11. His son is a businessman/entrepreneur who lives in Montana, and his daughter is Chemical Engineer at Los Alamos and lives in Santa Fe, NM. Jessica has 1 daughter and two grandchildren ages 8 and 10; together they have a large blended family.

After attending the College of San Mateo, with Vietnam looming, Ken joined the California Army National Guard for a six-year term! He spent 6 months in basic training and then did Advanced Individual Training (AIT), as a (11-b10), which was infantry. Halfway through his term, Gov. Regan reorganized the Guard and made his company a Transportation Company. No more Infantry for Ken. Yeah! Some of his summer annual 'active duty' was spent in the Mojave Desert in 113 deg heat. He used his ingenuity for outfitting the truck with a "beverage cooler" under the driver's seat, becoming a hero to some. He was honorably discharged as a 'Spec Four' in January, 1972. Thank you for your service, Ken.

He began his work life as a teenager at the Purity Stores sweeping, mopping and waxing the entire store's floor - the kind of first job most of us probably had. He began his "ladder climbing" early in life as a painter. He worked for a number of companies over the years.

One of his least favorite projects was working at an AT&T underground substation where he was in charge of the after paint lay-down finish stippling process. He said the smell was overwhelming and made worse by

the lack of fresh air. This becomes relevant to his ladder climbing later in his career.

Over the years, his expertise and experience led to a role with his last company, the Giampolini Group. There he was painter, with a special skill in matching and creating wood stains from scratch (think linseed oil, oil color, mineral spirits, Japan drying agents, a knack for chemistry). Ken recalls one of his favorite projects was doing church renovations. At a church in San Francisco, (think ladders and scaffolding) he completely repaired a church ceiling with new plaster, priming, applying gold leaf, creating stencils and bringing life back as if the damage had never happened. Afterward, looking up at the ceiling in that church, it was a very gratifying outcome. Hence the hidden artist.

His "ladder climbing" eventually led to his job as Safety Director where he was responsible for the safety of coworkers painting SF skyscrapers (scaffolding, hanging Bosun's chairs, davits, etc. and breathing respirators for pungent paints)! After gaining his OSHA certifications, he initiated and implemented safety programs for 300 employees companywide.

Ken has a wide range of interests. Most of us are well aware of his special photography skills. Currently, he is preparing for the El Dorado Hills Arts Spring Studio Tour where he will display his framed photographs in his home/studio May 4th and 5th. He originally got interested in photography in his career doing before and after images of his paint work. He has a love for wildlife and wildlife photography, and most mornings he can be found watching for wildlife in the canyon off the back of his house. He has been on three wildlife photo safaris to Africa.

Interesting side note...in 2009, he took a month long first photo safari with a Kenya safari tour operator who he met through e-Harmony. While there, he had the opportunity to visit Barack Obama's grandmother,

Sarah Obama, who lives in Kenya. Ken was the first American to meet her during the time of his inauguration into the office of President. The African Press were in attendance and he was interviewed by NBC upon his arrival home - his '15 seconds of fame', as they say. Grandma Obama was so impressed with his images, she encouraged him to share his wildlife photos with the world, resulting in his long avocation of showing and selling his work.

Here are a few more things to know and admire about Ken. He has three pet peeves: rain after he just washed his Rivian truck, guys pissing on toilet seats and those who do not follow the rules of the road. At happy hour, you'll find him with a gin and tonic or a Moscow Mule or cerveza. When asked what he wants to make sure his does before he dies, he replied, "Travel and enjoy what I have worked so hard to earn", which ties in with his personal motto, "use it or lose it." Or, it is better to give with a warm hand than a cold one.

Ken's main goal for the next year is to get a pedal powered kayak. Why? Three reasons, 1) he likes to kayak among the wildlife; 2) pedals free up your hands for photography; and 3) his shoulders hurt from all those years of ladders and painting. His other passions include giving his time and money to addressing homelessness, Charity Water addressing the worldwide drinking water crisis, Hope Streams Academy, Pencils of Promise (building classrooms around the world) and the American River Conservancy to name a few of them.

We ended our interview by my asking how Ken wants people to think of him. He said, "Nice guy, willing to lend a hand, good provider." I think we can all agree Ken--we definitely think of you in this way and more. Thanks for spending time to help us get to know you better, Ken.

HISTORY OF FOLDING THE AMERICAN FLAG

With Memorial Day approaching, Dave Chighizola sent the following article about the meaning behind the folding of the American flag.

THE NATIONAL FLAG FOUNDATION



Flag etiquette dictates that every time an American flag is to be stored or presented during a ceremony, its handlers should fold it in half twice lengthwise; then starting with the end opposite the blue field, make a taut triangular fold. Handlers continue to fold the flag in triangles until the flag has formed a triangular "pillow" with the blue field showing on the outside. It's a dignified way to treat the flag and gives a powerful touch to patriotic ceremonies.

This 13-fold procedure was common long before the more modern assigned meanings. The source and date of origin of the meanings is unknown, but for those who participate or witness a formal flag folding ceremony, whether it be

on Flag Day, Memorial Day, July 4th, Veterans Day or at a military funeral, the 13 meanings can create an uplifting experience.

This is what the 13 folds mean:

- 1. The first fold of our flag is a symbol of life.
- 2. The second fold signifies our belief in eternal life.
- 3. The third fold is made in honor and tribute of the veteran departing our ranks, and who gave a portion of his or her life for the defense of our country to attain peace.
- 4. The fourth fold exemplifies our weaker nature as citizens trusting in God; it is to Him we turn for His divine guidance.
- 5. The fifth fold is an acknowledgement to our country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right, but it is still our country, right or wrong."
- 6. The sixth fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and iustice for all.
- 7. The seventh fold is a tribute to our armed forces, for it is through the armed forces that we protect our country and our flag against all enemies.
- 8. The eighth fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day, and to honor our mother, for whom it flies on Mother's Day.
- 9. The ninth fold is an honor to womanhood, for it has been through their faith, love, loyalty and devotion that the character of men and women who have made this country great have been molded.
- 10. The tenth fold is a tribute to father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country since he or she was first-born.
- 11. The eleventh fold, in the eyes of Hebrew citizens, represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies, in their eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.
- 12. The twelfth fold, in the eyes of a Christian citizen, represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in their eyes, God the Father, the Son and Holy Ghost.
- 13. The thirteenth and last fold, when the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost, reminding us of our national motto, "In God We Trust."

WINE TASTING GROUP | Jay Muzio, PBS 650-302-1902



The wine tasting group has been steadily growing each month. The April tasting was held at the beautiful home of Hugh and Faye Thompson. There were eight-and-one-half couples in attendance. The featured varietal this month was Sauvignon Blanc from the Sierra Foothills. Sauvignon Blanc is widely grown in California and is a crisp white wine known for its grassy herbal flavors. It can range from sweet to dry. Because we limited the selections to be from the Sierra Foothills, there was only

a small number of wineries that produce this varietal and make it available in stores for retail purchase. Because of the similarity of flavor profiles, the large number of wines to judge (9 bottles), and the fact that some bottles were duplicates, made for a very challenging tasting indeed.

The winner this month was Bella Grace 2022, Amador Sauvignon Blanc (\$14). Second place went to Sobon Estate 2021, Amador Sauvignon Blanc (\$7.99). There was a duplicate bottle that scored much lower. Go figure! Third place was a tie between Newsom Harlow 2022 Calaveras Sauvignon Blanc (\$15) and Helwig 2022 Amador Sauvignon Blanc (\$16.95). There were two bottles of the Helwig, one scoring much higher than the other. Go figure! Fourth place went to a Helwig 2021 Amador Sauvignon Blanc (\$15). Fifth place went to Boger 2021 El Dorado Sauvignon Blanc. And finally, was an Andis non-vintage, Sierra Foothills Sauvignon Blanc (\$28). So, you can see the tasting was very complicated this month.

The food this month was very fun and creative. The Thompson's theme was fondue. They provided the group with cheese fondue and broths for cooking chicken, beef and lamb. Dessert was a delicious, rich chocolate fondue. The attendees provided dipping items for the pots.

Our next wine tasting will be May 16th at Total Wine and More. Priority will be given to our wine tasting group members, but if there is room, we may have a space or two open for non-members. 
