

The featured varietal this month was Tempranillo. This was George's selection, and it worked well with the Mexican food. Twelve bottles were presented for judging, and picking a favorite



It is a Costco selection costing \$28. In second place was, Vina Marichalar Tempranillo Reserva 2018, also from the Rioja region of Spain. Its cost was \$24.

Want to learn one of the oldest games of skill and chance? Want to have fun while stimulating your brain, sharpen your cognition and memory and have fun at the same time? Want to find out how to improve your odds of winning and hang out with other 'gammon heads like yourself? Join the Gold Country Backgammon Club!

The game of backgammon was invented around 5000 years ago in ancient Mesopotamia. It is a game in which players on two opposing sides use the roll of two dice in a race to get 15 playing pieces around a board with 24 points, bear them off and win. It can be played with one or more players on each side, encouraging social interaction and teamwork. It is a game that you can spend a lifetime mastering, but most people find it easier to learn than chess. What also sets it apart from chess is that your plan of attack (or defense) can change with each roll and how you choose to use it. This keeps you on your feet and makes for exciting turnarounds in the game.

The Gold Country Backgammon Club is open to all skill levels. I encourage you to try out the group even if you've never played the game. Backgammon players love to teach others what they know. I should know, I'm one of them! There are no dues or fees and scoring is up to the players. Bring a board if you have one, but it is not necessary.
