

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY | Randy Scott 916-834-9475

1895: X-rays (electromagnetic rays) were discovered by Wilhelm Roentgen at the University of Wuerzburg in Germany.

1922: King Tut's tomb was discovered at Luxor, Egypt by British archaeologist Howard Carter after several years of searching. The child-King Tutankhamen became pharaoh at age nine and died around 1352 B.C. at age 19. The tomb was found mostly intact, containing numerous priceless items now exhibited in Egypt's National Museum in Cairo.

1938: Irving Berlin's God Bless America was first performed. He had written the song especially for radio entertainer Kate Smith who sang it during her regular radio broadcast. It soon became a patriotic favorite of Americans and was one of Smith's most requested songs.

1947: The first and only flight of Howard Hughes' "Spruce Goose" flying boat occurred in Long Beach Harbor, California. It flew about a mile at an altitude of 70 feet. Costing \$25 million, the 200-ton plywood eight-engine Hercules was the world's largest airplane, designed, built and flown by Hughes. It later became a tourist attraction alongside the Queen Mary ship at Long Beach and has since been moved to Oregon.

1965: At 5:16 p.m., the Great Blackout of the Northeast began as a tripped circuit breaker at a power plant on the Niagara River caused a chain reaction sending power surges knocking out interconnected power companies down the East Coast. The blackout affected over 30 million persons, one-sixth of the entire U.S. population. Electricity also failed in Ontario and Quebec.

another Spanish grape blend, and their special thanksgiving wine, Primitivo. We finished off with a Petite Sirah, notably pruny and overripe, which describes some of us! Following the tasting, we enjoyed lunch from their on-site kitchen while sitting on their patio overlooking their beautiful vineyard.

Krissie is a New York winery attempting to get into the Cali wine business and they are off to a good start. They have an interesting collection of big segments of the Berlin Wall (see photos). Apparently, their owner is the largest collector of Berlin Wall segments in the U.S.. You'll have to visit to get that story.

Overall, everyone had a fun and relaxing day in Amador County wine country.

THE READER'S CORNER | Harry Hall 916-939-7161

The Wager, David Grann 2023 Non-fiction Author of Killers of the Flower Moon

An excellent tale of the British shipwreck, The Wager, in Jan of 1742. Grann used actual manuscripts from men aboard the Wager, plus books written in that era to retell the story about men conscripted forcefully to serve at Her Majesty's pleasure on a journey around the Cape Horn (South America) to capture a Spanish treasure-loaded ship. Part of a fleet of several vessels, the Wager is damaged severely going around the Horn and shipwrecks on Wager Island. Suffering terribly from scurvy and lack of food, some of the men mutiny and leave on a salvaged vessel. The remainder use a makeshift raft to try and find civilization. Eventually, surviving members of each boat finally arrive back in England, where they both accuse the other side of mutiny and murder. The case ends up in the Naval courts. An excellent story of the hardship's men suffered while at sea.


