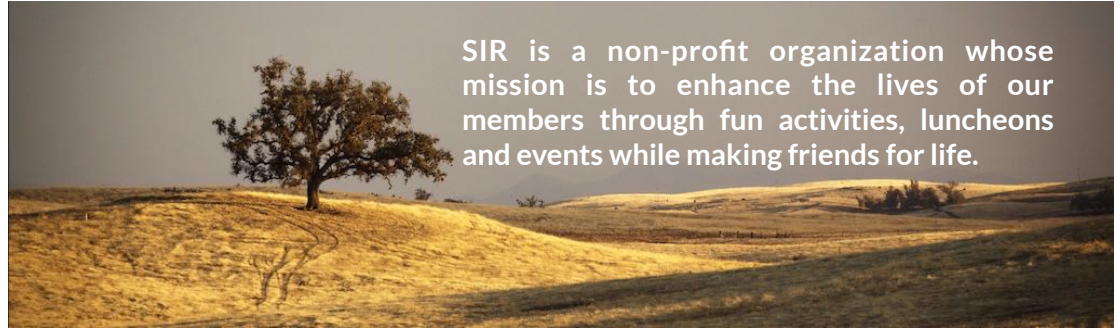

~ From the title sequence of the original Star Trek TV series as Captain Kirk describes the mission of the Starship Enterprise.

I'm not a Star Trek guy. My older brother was into the show way more than I was, but we watched it together on the family TV in the living room when we were in our early teens. I'm also not a space exploration guy. Although - interesting - my first real job (at 18 years old!) was as an electronic technician at NASA's Jet Propulsion Lab in Pasadena, working on the radio systems that communicated with the early deep space (unmanned) flights. Note: I quit that job because I wanted to be around people and not oscilloscopes and soldering irons. But I am celebrating NASA and Artemis II and what it represents.

I had the opportunity to listen to the news conference as officials answered questions after the Integrity's crew's successful splashdown in the Pacific Ocean and the Orion spacecraft's reentry from space. I heard a woman's voice falter as she thanked the team for confirming our need for curiosity. It was different from the other questions that were being asked about

technical challenges and logistics. Actually, it wasn't a question at all. And I found myself nodding my (bald) head and thinking yes, thank you for that, but also thank you, NASA, for once again showing us the value of vision and leadership and proving what can be accomplished with ability, discipline and teamwork. And for boldly going "where no man has gone before" (since Artemis II traveled farther from earth than any previous manned space mission).

The "man" in the phrase implies plurality as if we were all on board with the astronauts; as if they accomplished something for us all (all of mankind), but what if the "man" in the phrase is actually singular and the purpose of the phrase is to inspire me as an individual to go where I have never been before?

I'm there. Totally. At our last meeting, I put up a slide that said, "About the time one learns how to make the most out of life.... the most of it is gone." My point of that slide at the meeting was to try to encourage you, our branch members, to sign up for our activities, but it was a personal admonition. I'm running out of time to do some things I've always wanted to do. I'm running out of time to go to places I've always wanted to see. Another part of Captain's Kirk's speech which relates back to the woman's comment about our natural

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY | Randy Scott 916-834-9475

1792: Two dozen merchants and brokers established the New York Stock Exchange. In good weather, they operated under a buttonwood tree on Wall Street. In bad weather, they moved inside to a coffeehouse to conduct business.

1865: Decoration Day was first observed in the U.S., with the tradition of decorating soldiers' graves from the Civil War with flowers. The observance date was later moved to May 30th and included American graves from World War I and World War II and became better known as Memorial Day. In 1971, Congress moved Memorial Day to the last Monday in May, thus creating a three-day holiday weekend.

1960: An American U-2 spy plane flying at 60,000 feet was shot down over Sverdlovsk in central Russia on the eve of a summit meeting between President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Soviet Russia's Premier Nikita Khrushchev. The sensational incident caused a cancellation of the meeting and heightened existing Cold War tensions. The pilot, CIA agent Francis Gary Powers, survived the crash, and was tried, convicted and sentenced to 10 years in prison by a Russian court. Two years later he was released to America in exchange for an imprisoned Soviet spy. On his return to America, Powers encountered a hostile public which apparently believed he should not have allowed himself to be captured alive. He died in a helicopter crash in 1977.

1937: In San Francisco, 200,000 people celebrated the grand opening of the Golden Gate Bridge by strolling across it.

1992: The 27th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, prohibiting Congress from giving itself pay raises.

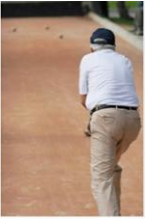

This month, the wine tasting group gathered at the eclectic home of DJ and Judy Peterson. The event was well attended, with 17 members present. The atmosphere was lively and welcoming, creating the perfect setting for an enjoyable evening.

We were delighted to have Bill Chieche and his wife join us for the evening. Bill brought his accordion and treated the group to authentic German music, adding a unique and festive touch to the gathering.

The evening's theme centered on Rhine wines from Germany's renowned Rhine valley. Guests explored a selection of varietals representing the region's distinctive winemaking traditions. Featured wines included the Dr. Heidemanns-Bergweiler 2024 Riesling, known for its crisp acidity and refreshing character. The Balthasar Röss 2019 Rheingau Riesling offered a more mature expression, highlighting the Rheingau's classic style.

Another highlight was the Gerd Anselmann 2024 Riesling Spätlese from Pfalz, which showcased the balance between sweetness and acidity typical of the Spätlese designation. The tasting also included a non-vintage Rheinhessen Liebfraumilch, a traditional and approachable white wine from the region. Completing the selection was the 2023 Dr. Heidemanns-Bergweiler Dornfelder, the only red wine presented, providing guests with a distinct perspective on the Rhine valley's offerings.

The evening began with appetizers like grilled sausages with mustard and sauerkraut, plus spring rolls. BBQ ribs from DJ's Traeger smoker were served as the main course, alongside salads and grilled vegetables. Dessert featured ice cream and carrot cake.

If you have not already joined the wine tasting group and would like to join, contact Jay Muzio at the number above. Besides being able to sample a variety of great wines and have a wonderful meal, the wine tasting group provides a terrific opportunity to get out of the house and socialize with your SIR friends. Surely, You're Joking, Mr. Feynman, Richard Feynman, 1985 Non-Fiction A delightful book by renowned physicist, Richard Feynman. He won the Nobel Peace Prize for Physics (1965) and was a professor at Cornell and Cal Tech. He was always extremely curious about everything and started fixing radios for others at the age of 10. He helped in the creation of the atomic bomb at Los Alamos during WW2. He thrived on outrageous adventures. During his summer retreats from teaching, he would go to Brazil and ended up in a samba band. He loved to play the bongo drums and taught himself (with a little help). To ease boredom at Los Alamos (there were no side relaxations), he learned how to crack safes and combination locks and tormented the secretaries by breaking into "confidential" files. He decided he wanted to learn to draw (as he was terrible at it) and took classes and became good enough that he had a couple of showings. He learned a bit of Japanese when he visited there after the war. In describing Feynman, Albert Hibbs (Caltech) said "A compulsive need to solve puzzles, his indignant impatience with pretention and hypocrisy, and his talent to one up anybody who tried to one up him."

BOWLING | Ray DiBasilio, HLM (Branch 113) 530-558-9727

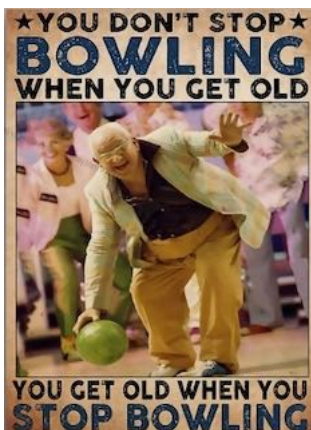

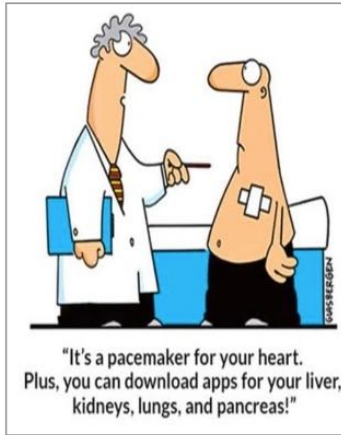

My wife never complained...until I got hearing aids.

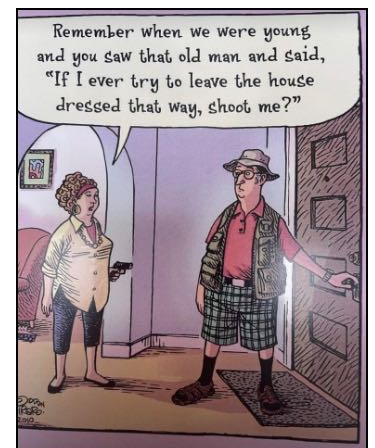
